Public Service Co. INCREASE DOUBLE RATE FOR NATION

an annual rate of 500 kilowatt-hours to 550 kilowatt-hours. The average consumption for the Public Service Company's household customers rose from 534 kilowatt-hours to 585 kilowatt-hours.

Farm Patrons Increase

The company has also made considerable progress in the electrification of farms, the report shows. During 1930, the number of its farm customers increased 42 per cent as compared with the average increase of only 18 per cent for the entire country. Although only 12 per cent of the farms of Illinois are located in the company's territory, at the close of 1930 the company had on its lines 28.5 per cent of all the farms of the state which receive electrical service

from central station companies. A substantial increase in the company's gas business also is revealed in the report. Despite the noticeable slack in homebuilding activity, 35 house heating customers were added to the company's mains during 1930. In spite of a decided falling off in industrial gas business generally, the total gas sales for the past year probably will exceed those for the previous year by nearly two per cent, says the report. The total gas sent out on Thanksgiving day this year exceeded by more than four per cent the total sent out for Thanksgiving day, 1929. "All indications point to a steady

gradual improvement in the utility business," declared S. B. Cushing, secretary of the Public Service Company, in summarizing last year's operations. "Large customers of the company seem to have kept their expenditures down, and have gone ahead with considerable improvements of

their own equipment, preparatory to filling orders rapidly with general resumption of business.

All signs of the time indicate that the company, because of its present excellent condition, and the fundamental service that it renders, will enjoy a prosperous year in 1931."

I. G. A. STORES SALES APPROACH 600 MILLION MARK

Total sales of more than 10,000 independent owned I. G. A. grocery stores in 27 states will approach the \$600,000,000 mark for 1930, an increase of ten percent over 1929, according to the reports of I. G. A. jobbers who have been pooling their resources at Chicago headquarters since the alliance started in 1926 with a unit of 70 stores.

"Cooperative sales operations of the I. G. A. have enabled our members to meet competition on merchandise," said J. Frank Grimes, president and founder of the alliance, but the most notable improvements made by stores in all parts of the country last year were in the reduction of overhead expenses, brought largely by a closer adherence to a cash and carry basis.

"Several of our jobbers now report as many as 40 per cent of their I. G. A. accounts on a strict cash and carry plan."

More than 175 agreements have been signed with Cook and Lake county retailers since the Chicago unit of the I. G. A. opened in November.

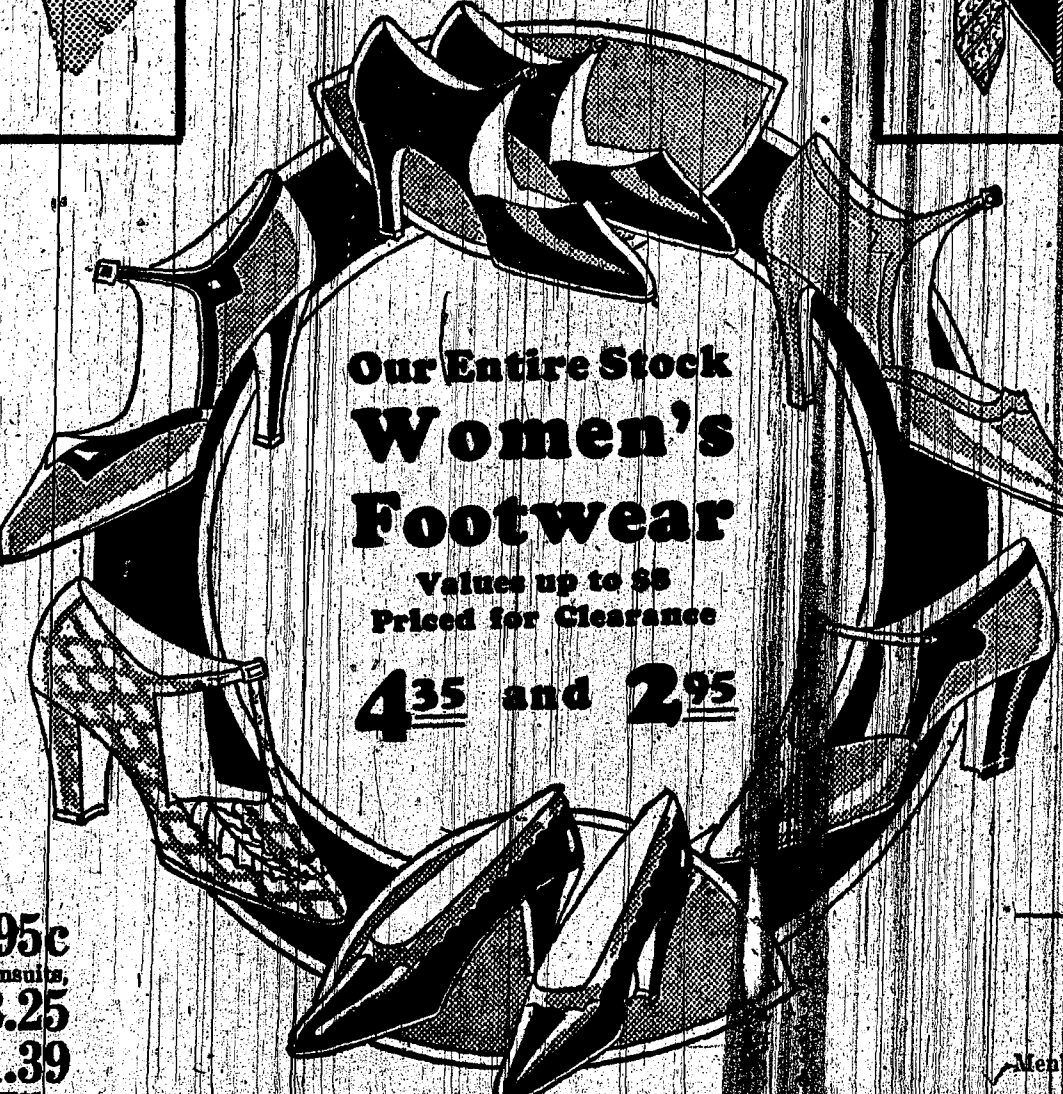

Ambulance Ditched on Ski Jump Run; Motorist in Court

Kurt Meister of Melrose Park, a motorist, who swung out of line on Northwest highway in ski meet traffic Sunday and forced the Danlesek ambulance into the ditch, was fined \$25.00 and costs this afternoon by Justice of the Peace Harry L. Hammond of Barrington on charges of violation of section 33 of the motor vehicle laws. Meister's attorney announced that the case would be appealed.

The accident occurred about 2:30 Sunday when R. E. Willmering, of Danlesek's ambulance was hurrying to the scene of the ski tournament at Fox River Grove to answer a call. "At that time the ambulance was stuck in the ditch and the ambulance was forced to crash into it. There were passengers in the Meister car, and Mr. Willmering chose the ditch."

Meister denied hearing the siren or observing the approaching ambulance. He later told a man riding with Willmering that he did hear the siren. "I was going to show that bird he couldn't come through here as he pleased," Meister is reported to have said.

Mr. Willmering has filed suit against Meister for \$125 to cover damages to the ambulance. "This case will come up in Justice Hammond's court next Tuesday."

Take Three to Hospital

With the aid of other motorists the ambulance was extricated from the ditch and continued to ski hill where a ski jumper and two spectators were picked up and taken to the Northwestern American Hospital, Chicago. The injured persons were:

Rietzen Andersen, 3723 Fullerton avenue, Chicago, ski jumper, who had a fractured arm and shoulder blade.

Miss Grace Lindstrom, 2220 N. Keeler avenue, compound fracture of the right leg.

Santo Lamura, 4120 N. Francisco street, fractured leg and cuts and bruises.

The national ski tournament at Fox River Grove Sunday brought out one of the largest crowds that has ever attended a ski meet at the Norge Ski Club hill. Long before noon, Northwesterers from all over the state in a close packed stream of automobiles, and at one time the line was blocked as far south as the Plains. Many of those who arrived for the ski meet were unable to reach their automobiles in which about five inches of heavy damp snow fell, made traveling very difficult. Nevertheless no serious accidents were reported. There were numerous collisions, bent fenders, and automobiles in the ditch, but the crowd was, in the main, orderly and careful.

The attendance was variously estimated at 10,000 to 15,000.
