#### Minutes of July 23, 1979

The regular meeting of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held at 8:00 p.m. at the Village Hall on July 23, 1979. President Hansen called the meeting to order at 8:09 p.m. Roll call.

Mrs. Hansen asked for approval of the minutes of the meeting of June 25, 1979. Motion for approval was made by Mr. Tucker. Mr. Hamill seconded. Minutes approved.

#### FINANCE - Norman Tucker

Mr. Tucker reviewed the Treasurer's Report for the first two months of Fiscal 79-80. Mr. Tucker noted that while the total tax levy is up, the rate is down for 1978. There being no questions, Mr. Tucker asked for approval of the Treasurer's Report. Mr. Kempe seconded. Report approved.

Trustees reviewed the list of bills to be approved for payment and Mr. Tucker then motioned for approval of the bills in the amount of \$28,535.27. Mr. Hamill seconded. Roll call.

Mr. Tucker then noted that some very minor changes had been made in the proposed Appropriation Ordinance for Fiscal 79-80. Mr. Tucker motioned for approval of the Appropriation Ordinance and Mrs. Wellington seconded. Roll call.

Ordinance 79-13 passed.

Mr. Tucker then asked the Trustees to review the proposed Levy Ordinance for Fiscal 79-80 since it is scheduled for action at the meeting of August 27, 1979.

### PLANNING - Jonathan C. Hamill

Rolling Hills Subdivision - Mr. Hamill noted that Messrs. Glyman and Scapin were in attendance. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval of the preliminary plat of this subdivision comprised of 29 lots on approximately 150 acres on Bateman Road in Cook County. Mr. Tucker seconded the motion. Roll call.

Rolling Hills Preliminary Plat approved.

### PUBLIC SAFETY - Chief Schuld

In Mr. MacArthur's absence, Chief Schuld reviewed the monthly activity report. Chief Schuld reported the timing of 139 gravel trucks over a ten-hour period with the result that 92 were moving at 50 mph or less, 29 between 51 and 52 mph, 13 at 53 to 54 mph, 2 at 55 to 56 mph, 2 at 57-58 mph and 1 at 59 mph. It was reported that our truck traffic has almost doubled due to the repair work being done on Edens Expressway. Representatives of the Secretary of State's office will meet with the Police Department on Thursday, July 26 in an effort to alleviate this problem. The gravel pit in Algonquin is open 24 hours a day which adds to the problem of trucks traveling during the night hours. Chief Schuld noted that everything possible is being done and an increased number of tickets are being issued.

#### 8:30 p.m. PUBLIC HEARING - Rolling Hills Subdivision Annexation Agreement

Mrs. Hansen officially convened the public hearing on the above matter. Mr. Richard Houpt, representing Rolling Hills, stated that annexation was desired subject, of course, to the conformance of both preliminary and final plats to all ordinance requirements. Considerable discussion took place with regard to the procedures for the phasing process. It was noted that the state allows one year for phasing, the Village ordinance allows two years, and the proposed annexation agreement indicates a ten-year period. The trustees requested clarification and Mrs. Hansen asked Mr. Houpt to rework the agreement to comply with trustee suggestions. Mr. Houpt was requested to have the revised agreement in the hands of the Village Board at least five days prior to the next meeting scheduled for August 27, 1979. 8:45 p.m. Mr. MacArthur arrived.

#### 9:05 p.m. PUBLIC HEARING CLOSED

Mrs. Hansen then resumed the Public Safety report.

An ordinance amending Title 8, Chapter 2 of the Village Code dealing with battery and assault on a police officer was presented for consideration by the Trustees. After discussion in which the wording was objected to by several Trustees, it was agreed that the proposed amendment should be reviewed and considered at the August meeting.

### ZONING AND ENFORCEMENT - James A. Kempe

Soil Overlay Ordinance - Mr. Kempe reported that the Zoning Board is of the opinion that this proposed ordinance should be reviewed by the Plan Commission since it is their feeling that it rightfully belongs in the Subdivision Ordinance. It was concluded that the Zoning Board should complete its public hearings before asking the Plan Commission to hold a public hearing on this matter.

Building Department - 12 permits were issued during the period June 16 through July 15, 1979 consisting of 2 houses, 3 pools, 2 horse barns and 1 each of remodeling, septic, house moving, barn rebuilding and additions.

ZBA Appointment - Mrs. Hansen noted that she has been looking for an appointee who is both an attorney and someone who does not have a conflict of interest to serve on the Zoning Board of Appeals. She submitted the name of John A. Ward, a resident of Meadowhill Road, who is with the firm of Chapman & Cutler in Chicago as her choice and asked for Trustee approval. All Trustees were in agreement.

### ROADS AND BRIDGES - Louis J. Klein, Jr.

Mr. Klein noted that Liberty Asphalt has informed the Village that road maintenance work on Village roads should be started by the middle of August.

Highway Safety Project (Sign Inventory) - The Illinois Department of Transportation has informed us that the ratio of reimbursement has been changed from 70/30 to 75/25. 49% of our signs are in need of replacement and the program involves \$4,894.00, not including the cost of labor for installation. Mr. Klein then motioned that the Board accept the sign inventory as prepared by our Village Engineers and that we proceed with the work, plus whatever labor costs are involved. Mr. MacArthur seconded. Roll call.

### INSURANCE, LEGISLATION AND HEALTH - Marjorie J. Wellington

Mrs. Wellington informed the Trustees that we are currently up-to-date with our insurance coverage and that the Trustees will be advised regularly as to the status of our insurance.

#### ATTORNEY - Thomas Donohoe

Mr. Donohoe noted that public hearings are required to discuss changes in the ordinances dealing with signs, stables and determining front and rear lot lines.

Mrs. Hansen then presented a resolution requesting the Zoning Board of Appeals to hold a public hearing on possible amendments to Section 5-5-11 and 5-6-9 and 5-7-17 redefining the definitions and requirements pertaining to signs. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval of the resolution. Mr. Klein seconded. Roll call.

Mr. Kempe then motioned for approval of a resolution requesting the Zoning Board to hold a public hearing on a proposal to amend the Zoning Ordinance insofar as it deals with the boarding and stabling of horses. Mr. Hamill seconded. Roll call.

Mr. Kempe then motioned for approval of a resolution requesting the Zoning Board of hold a public hearing on possible amendments to the definitional sections of the ordinance to determine the location of the front yard lot line on certain interior lots. Mr. Klein seconded. Roll call.

#### ADMINISTRATION - Barbara P. Hansen

Barrington/Barrington Hills Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement - Mrs. Hansen presented a resolution amending the previously-approved agreement to require a setback from Northwest Highway of 135 feet instead of 200 feet. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval of this amendment and Mrs. Wellington seconded. Roll call.

Resolution 79-R-18 passed.

Mrs. Hansen acknowledged the presence of Sydney G. Craig and expressed appreciation for more than eight years of dedicated service as Village Attorney. Mrs. Hansen expressed regret that, due to health problems, Mr. Craig is no longer able to serve the Village, and wished him well in the future. Mr. Craig commended the Trustees and staff for their dedication and interest in Village affairs. Mrs. Hansen volunteered to prepare a resolution of appreciation and the response was unanimous approval. Resolution 79-R-19 will be prepared and sent to Mr. Craig.

Route 14 Location Studies - Louanne Majewski appeared before the Board and stressed the importance of voting in local elections. She asked for comments on land use from representatives of Barrington Hills, and noted that public hearings would be held sometime in August. During discussion it was noted that the state's plan does not accommodate the gravel trucks as much as the route suggested by McHenry County. Mrs. Hansen expressed appreciation to Mrs. Majewski for her assistance and cooperation.

Mrs. Hansen recessed the meeting at 10:55 p.m. to convene the executive session for the purpose of discussing the employment of legal counsel for the Village.

The regular public meeting reconvened at 11:15 p.m. Mr. MacArthur motioned that the Village retain the services of Ross, Hardies, O'Keefe, Babcock & Parsons as Village Counsel effective August 1, 1979. Mr. Kempe seconded. Trustee approval was unanimous.

Mrs. Hansen adjourned the meeting at 11:20 p.m.

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# REPORT OF PRELIMINARY FEASIBILITY STUDY OF A NEW BRIDGE OVER THE FOX RIVER BETWEEN CARY AND ALGONOUIN

On April 18, 1978 the County Board appropriated \$10,000 for, "a. preliminary feasibility study, consisting of alternate locations, for the construction of a new bridge spanning the Fox River with approaches leading to the existing highway system." Collins and Rice, Inc., Consulting Engineers, have completed a preliminary study at two locations (Location "A" and Location "B") and this report summarizes their findings to date. Attached is a map showing Location "A" and Location "B" as generally considered by the consultant.

#### LOCATION "A"

This project would be constructed entirely within the corporate limits of Algonquin. It would commence near the intersection of Ill. 31 and Cary Road; cross the river in a southeasterly direction intersecting with Spring Creek Road; then run south to III. 62 near the Algonquin water standpipe.

This project would be constructed mainly in the unincorporated areas of the County except for the south approach road which would be in the Village of Barrington Hills. It would commence at the intersection of III. 31 and Klassen Road; run east along Klassen Road to a new intersection with Cary Road; cross the Fox River in a southeasterly direction to an intersection with Algonquin Road at Haegar's Bend Road; then run south along Haegar's Bend Road to Cook Line Road just north of Ill. 62.

# ENGINEERING AND RIGHT OF WAY

It is difficult at this time to estimate with any degree of accuracy the engineering costs for either of these projects. If Federal Funds are used to finance any portion of the work I am sure the project will be considered a "major action" requiring a full and complete corridor study, alignment study and environmental impact study. In general I feel that engineering costs for the project could approach \$1,000,000.

Because this is a "preliminary feasibility study" it is not intended to deliniate right of way requirements for either location. It is obvious that property values are high at both locations. Placing a dollar value on the right of way required is not possible at this time.

#### FINANCING

If the alignment for either Location "A" or Location "B" is added to the County Highway System of roads and designated as a Federal Aid Secondary Highway the following funds could be used to finance the project. (Figures are per year based on the FY 1979 Budget).

\$200,00 <b>0</b>	Federal Aid Secondary Funds
250,00 <b>0</b>	MFT Funds (Note 1)
450,00 <b>0</b>	Matching Funds (Note 2)
300,00 <b>0</b>	County Highway Funds (Note 3)
450,00 <b>0</b>	County Bridge Funds (Note 4)

- NOTE 1: Currently this amount could be available without jeopardizing our maintenance programs. However, with diminished gas consumption and increased maintenance costs the continued availability of MFT funds for construction is in doubt.
- NOTE 2: Would require levying a Matching Tax of 0.05.

  This tax has not been levied in the past five

  (5) years and would have the effect of increasing the total County rate.
- NOTE 3: Would require increasing the County Highway Fund rate by 0.03 which would have the effect of increasing the total County rate. Also, as maintenance costs increase, the availability of County Highway Funds for construction is in doubt.
- NOTE 4: Would require continued levy near the maximum rate of 0.05. Local funds for Rawson Bridge would come from the County Bridge Fund and the committment of all of these funds for a single project would have a detrimental effect on our continuing Township bridge replacement program.

## MUNICIPAL APPROVAL

Section 5-408 of the Illinois Highway Code reads in part as

"The county board, with the approval of the corporate authorities---, may construct or maintain with county funds a highway or street, or part thereof, lying within the corporate limits of any municipality within the county---." (Underlined for emphasis.)

Therefore, approval from the Village of Algonquin would be necessary prior to constructing the project at Location "A" and approval of the Village of Barrington Hills would be required prior to constructing the project at Location "B".


#### CONCLUSION

McHenry County is well into a comprehensive countywide transportation study. The study, due for completion in 12-18 months, will outline transportation problems throughout the entire County and afford the opportunity to establish improvement priorities for the total transportation system. Since a project of the magnitude outlined in this report would drain County highway and bridge construction resources for many years it is recommended that further action on this project be deferred pending completion of this comprehensive study.



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

Many of the areas are only partially developed because waste water treatment facilities are not adequate to service the entire site. A later section will discuss the lack of bonding power on the part of many of the County's cities. It is this deficiency which is at present the most serious handicap to the County's economic expansion.

#### Bridges

The Fox River divides McHenry County from Lake County and the Chicago area. There are several bridges across that river. They are listed below by route and by political subdivision.

McHenry has two bridges across the Fox River. Since traffic jams were frequent with only one, a second bridge was completed in 1977. With the opening of the second bridge, traffic patterns have shown significant improvement. For present traffic levels, the existing bridge facilities in the area of McHenry are now adequate. However, the expansion of industry in this area might necessitate additional crossings in the long range future.

The expansion of industry in McHenry County may in the future necessitate still other crossings on the Fox River. At the present time, the congestion of traffic on Route 31 is such that IDOT and CATS are studying the feasibility of an alternate link across the Fox between Algonquin and Cary at Haeger's Bend Road in Algonquin.

### Airport Facilities

There is adequate existing and future capacity in the airports which serve McHenry County. However, all the airports are privately owned, a circumstance which may pose a major threat to the provision of local air travel facilities. The national experience is that many private airports are being forced out of existence as land values skyrocket and taxes rise accordingly. The absence of a tax differential for private general aviation airports in Illinois is hurting such airports within the State and within the County.

At present, in 1978 there are three public use airports located in McHenry County at the cities of Crystal Lake, Harvard, and in Hebron Township. In 1977, there were four public use airports, but one of them Larson Airport at Woodstock was forced to close because of a zoning problem. Table 26 lists the length of the runways the number of aircraft based out of each of them. In 1975, Crysta Lake was the most frequently used airport, with 50,291 flight operations. Literas followed by Galt in Hebron Township with 49,185 operations; by Dacy near Harvard, with 34,243 operations; and by Larsen near Moodstock, with 1233 operations. The map on p.72 shows the approximate locations. Public purchase of Crystal Lake Airport is recommended by CATS, Northeastern Illinois Airport System Plan (June, 1976).
