



CLEOPATRA of Egypt



Excavated in the ruins of a Roman villa on the Appian Way, this portrait may have been created in 46 to 44 BCE while Cleopatra lived in Rome as the mistress of Julius Caesar. One of two surviving sculptured heads generally accepted as representing Cleopatra in the Hellenistic Greek style as she appears on her coins, this portrait bust may closely reflect her actual appearance.

Was she the most beautiful woman in the world? A seducer and destroyer of great men? One of the shrewdest political minds of her day?

The answers to these questions are matters for debate. But one conclusion is undeniable; more than 2,000 years after her death, Cleopatra stands among the most famous women—and men—who ever lived.

Now, an intriguing new exhibition explores the many faces of this multifaceted woman, her life in Egypt and her liaisons with the two great Roman leaders of the day, Julius Caesar and Mark Antony. *Cleopatra of Egypt: From History to Myth* brings together more than 350 objects on loan from The British Museum and museums in Alexandria, Cairo, Rome, the Vatican, New York, St. Petersburg, Naples and more. Sculpture, coins, metalwork, jewelry, ancient frescoes, mosaics—through these priceless archeological finds and masterpieces of ancient art, the exhibition examines Cleopatra's origins, her tumultuous life and the changing attitudes and myths that have surrounded her from ancient times to the present.

Will the exhibition resolve the many mysteries surrounding the charismatic queen? Discover the truth—or truths—for yourself. Visit *Cleopatra of Egypt: From History to Myth* at The Field Museum from October 20, 2001 to March 3, 2002. Cleopatra ruled Egypt for more than 20

years, fighting to preserve her nation's independence against the rapidly expanding Roman Empire. *Cleopatra of Egypt* evokes the spirit of this extraordinary era, grounding visitors in the history of Rome and Egypt as those cultures laid the ground for the world we know today. Above all, the exhibition brings Cleopatra to life, not merely as a legendary figure but as a living, breathing woman.

"This is a show about a woman, a queen, a historic figure of great complexity," says exhibit developer Barbara Ceiga. "But it's also a show about getting to the bottom of things. It's about myth and history and propaganda, about looking closely at something we think we know and seeing it in a very different light."

A Fine Art Exhibition "After 9-11"

The Old Court House Art Center is pleased to present an art exhibit titled "After 9-11," a show of fine art created in response to our national tragedy.

On Sept. 11, the day that changed America and the days, our society had the strange experience of witnessing, live and in replays, the destruction and collapse of New York's World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Those unforgettable images of the terrorists' attack dominated our televisions for the next four days.

Most Americans found it difficult or even impossible to return to life as it was. The artists in this show were invited to express those changes and share their feelings through their artwork. Approximately 15 artists will be showing almost 30 pieces of art produced after Sept. 11. Some of the titles of the artwork in this exhibit include: *Shattered (with a ray of hope)* by Jane Johnson, *Twin Towers* by Sarah Hahne, *Collateral Damage* by Jade Catlinoliver, *Orphan of War* by Susan Fosnot and *Please Guide Us* by Nancy Steinmeyer.

Sarah Hahne of Bull Valley has taken a feminist approach in her mixed media on paper piece titled *Twin Towers*. In this two-panel piece, she has depicted each tower separately. The panel on the left represents the north tower, which was hit first. Here, Hahne has created a silhouette of a woman in profile. She is waving her arms trying to warn her sister tower, the left panel. On the second tower (or panel), a female form stands unsuspectingly with her back to us.

Hahne explains, "I'm trying to represent the fact that after the first tower was hit, some of the people in both towers were told they were safe and didn't need to evacuate. This was wrong."

The negative space in Hahne's work is covered with large flowers that seem to be stenciled on the surface. She explained

the background represents the burqa worn by the Afghani women. Hahne feels that U.S. women and children lost their lives so the burqa could be raised.

Woodstock artist Nancy Steinmeyer has developed a technique she calls three-dimensional painting. This allows her to show two images at the same time, much like a hologram. In Steinmeyer's piece *Please Guide Us*, she has made a detailed painting of the south tower just after impact while the north tower is burning. Suspended over this background painting is a screen with a painting of Uncle Sam praying for our guidance in the aftermath of this terrible event.

Steinmeyer said, "I conceived the idea for this piece and began to work on it about a week after the attacks. In the original plan, I was going to put the traditional Uncle Sam pointing his finger in revenge and retribution. During the three weeks it took me to paint the burning towers, I learned more about the Afghani people and their plight and poverty. By the time I was ready for the over painting of Uncle Sam, I just couldn't paint revenge. So I changed it to Uncle Sam praying for guidance."

The "After 9-11" exhibit will be on display at the Old Court House Art Center from Jan. 10 to Feb. 24. The gallery is open Thursday through Saturday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m. There will be a reception on Sunday, Jan. 20, from 2 to 4 p.m. The public is welcome. The Old Court House Art Center is located at 101 N. Johnson on the Woodstock Square.

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
North Barrington Run Through the Woods



In a diamond that is cut too deep, much of the light is reflected to opposite facets at the wrong angle and is lost through the sides. The diamond may appear black in the center. In a diamond cut too shallow, light "leaks" through the bottom, and the eye may see a dull reflection in the diamond.

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
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
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
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French Art in the 18th Century

Evaluating Workplace Harassment

To determine whether a legally actionable claim for workplace harassment exists, the facts of the situation must be evaluated in connection with the state and federal laws that prohibit discrimination.

The most common form of illegal harassment is known as "hostile work environment harassment." Hostile work environment harassment is defined as an intimidating or offensive working environment which unreasonably interferes with an individual's ability to perform their work. Sexual harassment is the most well-known form of a hostile work environment claim and is defined as "unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature which unreasonably interferes with an individual's work performance or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment." Sexual harassment can occur in a variety of circumstances, and the victim as well as the harasser may be a woman or a man. The victim does not have to be of the oppo-



site sex and the harasser can be the victim's supervisor, an agent of the employer, a supervisor in another area, a co-worker or a nonemployee. The victim does not have to be the person harassed but could be anyone affected by the offensive conduct.

It is helpful for the victim to directly inform the harasser that the conduct is unwelcome and must stop. The victim should use any employer complaint mechanism or grievance system available.

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

Facelift Surgery

Most people who are familiar with modern facelifts and other facial cosmetic procedures are aware of their important benefits, in terms of improved appearance as well as self-esteem. However, many people who are good candidates for these procedures may be reluctant to actually have them out of fear of the process itself.

They fear that they might experience pain during the surgery, or that recovery might bring pain or discomfort, or that it might take too long to heal, or that they might find some other aspect of the surgery unacceptable. The truth is that virtually every one of our patients reports that their recovery was faster and more comfortable than they expected.

In this context, I would like to share with you the comments of one of our recent facelift patients, a 53-year-old female. She was asked to respond to some very direct questions we posed about her experience with the facelift surgery. While some patients may report more difficult recoveries, this patient's experience is fairly typical.

The following is our interview with W.S. three months following her facelift surgery.

• *Did you experience any fear before your surgery?*

No, I would say that I had very little fear, if any. I recall having slept totally comfortably the night before. In fact, I had a photograph taken of me when we were leaving for the doctors' office, and I was smiling and looked very relaxed.

• *How long did you think about having surgery before going through with it?*

I had it on my agenda for about two years. I was looking for a time frame which was much longer than what I ac-

tually needed, and I had to juggle some other things in my life.

• *Was the procedure itself painful?*


No, I didn't feel anything. I really don't recall a thing about it.

• *What was your recovery like?*

I think that my recovery was phenomenal. I had the surgery on a Tuesday and we had a family party the following Sunday. I will admit that it was in a kind of controlled light, evening situation. But my daughter, who is a young woman, didn't notice anything, so I think that's a pretty good indication. By seven days, I was totally, totally functional. I had a little bit of concern about sleeping in a balanced way. I would sleep on my back. And then, after I slept on my left side, I would try to sleep the same amount on my right side. Other than that, I would say that I had barely any discomfort. I had very little bruising—very, very little bruising. It was a very positive experience, both spiritually and in a more concrete, tangible way.

• *Would you go through it again?*

In a minute. There is probably not a whole lot that I would do differently, except that I wouldn't tell anybody up front. Because in four or five days, no one would ever know.



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


La Bohème in a Nutshell



Windfall has been in business in Bar-



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

REMODELING 2002...

When Todd and Tamara Tabel decided it was time to remodel the kitchen of their 1970's Barrington home, they were anxious to incorporate as much light and openness as possible while adding much needed storage space. The couple wanted to retain the peninsula dividing the kitchen from the eating area, but to remove the upper cabinets over the peninsula. This made sense in that it would visually open up the space—but could they recoup the lost storage space elsewhere? They approached designer Neil McDuffie of **Barrington Kitchen & Bath Studio** to help them plan their new kitchen. Neil suggested reframing the wall of their adjacent basement stairway to reclaim some unused space. This allowed pantry cabinets to be installed on each side of the refrigerator. He also added an extra-deep cabinet over the refrigerator. *Voila!* The previous refrigerator niche became a hard-working storage area. The Tabels also wanted to replace their old eye-level range with a separate cooktop and double ovens. Neil worked with the Tabels to put the ovens into the corner and place a 6-burner gas cooktop on the peninsula to allow Tamara to interact with her two small children while cooking. An eating bar behind the peninsula was raised for safety and to block the view of pots and pans from the table.

The piece de résistance of this kitchen is the beautiful storage hutch that Neil designed to set off the eating area and provide even more storage. While the Tabels had selected Crystal cabinets in a warm finish on maple for the cabinetry in the main working area of the kitchen, Neil requested Crystal to produce a special green stain on cherry wood for the hutch. Crystal then hand-distressed these cabinets to allow the natural wood to show through. That detail, combined with a beaded cherry backsplash and countertop, gives the hutch a vintage antique look. Since prevention is the best tool to eliminate sexual harassment in the workplace, employers are encouraged to take steps necessary to prevent sexual harassment from occurring. The employer should clearly communicate to employees that sexual harassment will not be tolerated. They can do so by establishing an effective complaint or grievance process (distributing a written policy against harassment) and taking immediate and appropriate action when an employee complains. Such a policy can aid employees by instructing them to voice complaints regarding unwelcome conduct without the fear of retaliation. Additionally, the policy can help protect the employer from legal action in certain circumstances when an employee fails to bring a claim of harassment to the employer's

attention.

If you believe you are being subjected to harassment or that your employment rights are being violated, I encourage you to acquire information regarding your legal rights. You may start by visiting our Web site at www.joettedoran.com for further information.

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
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
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
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
