



United States Supreme Court Decides Reverse Race Discrimination Case

The United States Supreme Court recently issued a decision holding that white firefighters were unfairly denied promotions because of their race. In Ricci v. DeStefano, No. 07-142, the majority said that the city was wrong to disregard a promotion exam because no blacks and only two Hispanic firefighters were likely to be made lieutenants or captains based on the results. The city said that it had acted to avoid a lawsuit from minorities. The decision arose from the city's need to fill vacancies for lieutenants and captains in its fire department. It hired an outside firm



to design a test that was given to 77 candidates for lieutenant and 41 candidates for captain. Fifty-six firefighters passed the

exams, including 41 whites, 22 blacks and 18 Hispanics. But of those, only 17 whites and two Hispanics could expect promotion. The city eventually decided not to use the exam to determine promotions because it might have been vulnerable to claims that the exam had a "disparate impact" on minorities in violation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The white firefighters said the decision violated the same law's prohibition on intentional discrimination. The lawsuit was filed by 20 white plaintiffs, including one man who is both white and Hispanic. Writing for the majority, Justice Kennedy said, "Fear of litigation alone cannot justify an employer's reliance on race to the detriment of individuals who passed the examinations and qualified for promotions. The city could be liable for disparate-impact discrimination only if the examinations were not job related or the city failed to use a less discriminatory alternative. We conclude that there is no strong basis in evidence to establish that the test was deficient in either of these re-

spects." In her dissent, Justice Ginsberg, stated "Until this decision the civil rights law's prohibitions on intentional discrimination and disparate impact were complementary, both aimed at ending workplace discrimination." Ginsburg stated, "Today's decision sets these paired directives at odds" and she predicted that the court's ruling "will not have staying power."



Chicago History Museum Presents Bertha Honoré Palmer

Exhibition Explores One of the Most Historically Significant Figures of Late 19th-Century America

On the anniversary of Bertha Honoré Palmer's 160th birthday, the Chicago History Museum has opened an exhibition featuring a selection of her clothing and personal effects that will honor this remarkable and influential Chicago woman. The exhibition explores Bertha Honoré Palmer's efforts to promote women's lives and achievements and her later career as a successful business woman

"The exhibition will tell the stories of her magnificent achievements and how she built relationships that allowed her to make such an important impact on Chicago and the world," stated Gary T. Johnson, museum president. Palmer achieved positions of great responsibility, influence and social stature by wearing traditional but exquisite attire of the period and thinking like a modern woman. A gown that she wore at the World's Fair of 1893 as president of the Board of Lady Managers will be on display. In this position she was able to secure The Woman's Building featuring 47 nations, many obtained through Palmer's personal acquaintances with political leaders and royalty. Of the 14 ensembles on display, two are from the World's Columbian Exhibition of 1893 and seven gowns she wore to the Paris Exposition of 1900, where she was the only female member of the U.S. Commission. Two of these gowns featured Palmer's proud Midwestern heritage through a design of wheat and corn embedded in the silk velvet, which earned her the title, "princess of the prairie." Palmer played crucial roles in both world's fairs. Supported by immense wealth, this Victorian grande dame promoted women's achievements, was a champion for her city, and became a great celebrity of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

"The gowns worn by Palmer on display in the exhibition are the most opulent examples of dress of the late 19th and early 20th century. Palmer took her social positions very seriously and realized how she dressed and who she knew would help her make significant strides for women," stated Timothy Long, exhibition curator.

Bertha Honoré Palmer and her husband Potter traveled internationally and purchased a large number of Impressionist paintings. They were among the first Americans to enjoy these works of art and built relationships with artists such as Renoir, Cassatt, Degas, and Monet. They exhibited many of these pieces at the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition to expose

this new style of painting to the masses. The Palmers' collection is the keystone of the current French Impressionist collection at the Art Institute of Chicago.

After her husband Potter Palmer's death in 1902, she lived in London and Paris where she socialized and built close friendships with royalty such as King Edward and Queen Alexandria. She then moved to Florida where she invested and developed the land in Sarasota County. "At this point in her life, Palmer relaxed socially, dropping her queen-like image, and began to apply the business knowledge she had obtained throughout her life," stated Long. As a shrewd and smart business woman, Palmer was so successful in cattle ranching and real estate that by her death in 1918 she had doubled the fortune left by her husband, Potter Palmer, just 16 years

The exhibition will showcase Bertha Palmer not only as a politically powerful and successful business woman, but also as a social force in the world. There were headlines and photographs of Palmer and her lifestyle in all the major newspapers. "She was the woman the world watched -an American who became the center of Parisian and London societies. She was successful, wealthy, and a supporter of the arts and women," stated Long.

The exhibition closes on Jan. 4, 2010 and will be displayed in the Costume and Textile Gallery.





Back to School

One focus of this month's Barrington Lifestyles is "Back to School."

Ah, the pursuit of wisdom! So let's discuss wisdom, or more specifically, wisdom teeth, since wisdom is not my area of expertise.

Just the words "wisdom teeth" are synonymous with pain and suffering. But why are these teeth a problem? Wisdom teeth are the third and last molars to erupt into our jaws. If they grow into proper position behind the second molars, they can be useful and cause no problems.

In modern man, however, our jaws are usually not long enough to accommodate these teeth. Some have speculated that this is because our jaws do not develop to their fullest due to softer diets than primitive people were forced to cope with.

For whatever reason, these teeth frequently grow in sideways or only erupt part way out of the gums. In this position, they are trapped behind the second molars in a fluid-filled sac. This sac accumulates bacteria, resulting in a painless, chronic infection. This infection destroys good bone around the second molar, eventually causing loss of both teeth.


The problem may develop into a tumor or acute infection with pain, swelling and fever. This seems to occur at inopportune moments like before school exams or



weddings. Wisdom teeth may even grow directly into the second molars causing direct damage.

In most cases, it is a good idea to have these teeth evaluated and usually removed during adolescence. If these teeth are not fully developed, they have shorter roots and removal results in fewer complications. In my practice, patients are referred to an oral surgeon who is a dentist that specializes in wisdom tooth removal and other surgical procedures. Comprehensive dental examinations followed by action, not procrastination, will save adolescents a lot of time and suffering.







Dr. James Baird Addresses Common Foot Problems

Dr. James Baird is a local Podiatric Physician and Surgeon and is now accepting new patients in his Barrington office. Here are a few solutions from Dr. Baird to some common foot prob-

I have noticed a small spot on the bottom of my son's foot. The spot is white and hard. He has not complained of any pain but I am concerned that it may be a wart.

Warts are one of the most common infections in children. A plantar wart is a flat, rough, hard lump on the bottom of the foot. It can often look like a pimple or callus but if the skin lines go around the lesion, it most likely is a wart. Warts will also have pin point spots of blackness and tenderness when squeezed from the sides. They are caused by a virus that can enter the skin through cuts or scratches and they are usually picked up in moist environments such as pool decks and locker rooms. A wart should be treated to prevent the virus from multiplying or spreading to others. There are no quick treatments for warts. The typical treatment course is about six weeks long and involves application of medication in the doctor's office followed by nightly application of a prescription medication at

I am training for the Chicago Marathon and I am having a lot of pain in my big toe. The toe is red and has a bump on the side.

Most likely you are developing a bunion. A bunion is a growth on the outside of the big toe. It is a progressive deformity that will get larger with time. Running has likely irritated the bunion and the pain is caused by swelling around the joint. When a bunion develops, it affects the alignment of the joint and leads to the development of arthritis. You should start to treat the area by wearing wider shoes, applying a pad to the area to protect it, and icing the area after every run. An antiinflammatory medication may also help reduce the swelling and pain. Customized inserts for you shoes may help the joint work more efficiently and reduce the pain and swelling during your training. Ultimately if the bunion becomes larger and more painful it may require surgical correction. It is best to get the pain evaluated early in order to make changes to your daily activities to slow its development.

As I was shopping with the kids for backto-school clothes, I came to two conclusions. First, it would be much easier to buy clothes for our 7- and 9-year-old daughters if they weren't along with me. Apparently what I think is cute isn't cool enough for their maturing fashion senses, and I'm sure that will only get better as they enter their teen years... Also, I can't help but think of all the little outfits that they got last fall that are too small, worn through in the knees or elbows and maybe a little faded or stained. If you have an older vehicle that falls into the "worn-out" category, it may be eligible for up to a \$4,500 rebate toward a new, fuel-efficient vehicle under a program called the Car Allowance Rebate System (CARS), also referred to as "Cash for Clunkers." For instance, with the CARS rebate, a 2009 Jeep Patriot with an M.S.R.P. or \$19,550 would have a sales price of \$12,399 plus tax, title and license. Some of the CARS Act guidelines include:

• Your vehicle must be less than 25 years old on the trade-in date

· Only purchase or lease of new vehicles qualify

· Generally, trade-in vehicles must get 18 or less MPG (some very large pickup trucks and cargo vans have different re-



quirements)

· Trade-in vehicles must be registered and insured continuously for the full year preceding trade-in

· You don't need a voucher, dealers will apply a credit at purchase

• The program runs through Nov. 1, 2009 or when the funds are exhausted, whichever comes first

• The program requires the scrapping of your eligible trade-in vehicle and that the dealer disclose to you an estimate of the scrap value of your trade-in. The scrap value, however minimal, will be in addition to the rebate, and not in place of the

thieves were deterred from home invasions by the presence of a moat. 




