MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS - April 26, 1976

The regularly scheduled meeting of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held at 7:30 P, M. at the Village Hall. In the absence of the Acting President, a motion was made and seconded to have Mr. J. Kempe act as President Pro Tem. Motion carried. Roll call.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes from the March meeting. Motion carried.

TREASURER: Miss Olsen reported \$ 18,000 in receipts to the General Fund. She noted receipts from Cook, and Lake Counties. McHenry taxes will be late as the bills were readjusted and mailed late. A motion was heard and seconded approving the Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

FINANCE: Mr. Kempe presented the following list of unpaid bills (attached to the minutes) to the Board for approval. A motion was made and seconded to approve the bills for payment. Roll call. 4 ayes, no nays, 3 absent. Bills were approved.

Mr. Kempe then presented Ordinance 76-2 which is a levy for the collection of Municipal Use Tax. After discussion, a motion was made and seconded for approval. Roll call. 4 ayes, no nays, 3 absent. Ordinance was adopted.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Butler noted that the MFT program **a**s outlined by Bleck Engineers will be somewhat different this year. It was felt that many of the problems on the roads are due to poor drainage and the work this summer will concentrate on improving drainage. He will ask for a written report from them outlining the program.

Mr. Lenzinni will meet with Mr. Butler later this week to see about lifting the overweight restrictions from the roads. We have 90 days in a calendar year to use weight restrictions. Ours went into effect March 13, 1976.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. MacArthur noted the "new look" of our Police squad cars.

Chief Aldrich reported the successful ϖ mpletion of courses at Northwestern by Robert Swenson. Several officers have participated in the driving school. He also noted receipt of aletter commending officers Kelhi, Schuld and Meyer.

Due to the illness of the Police Clerk, a monthly report was not presented, however he briefly noted 2 fatalaties on Route 59 and a burglary of one of our residences. Generally Chief Aldrich commented on the continued arrests where drugs are involved being alarming. Finally he noted that the Merten's suit is coming up and there has been a request for duplicates of everything on file.

PLANN NG: Mr. Hamill reported in the absence of Mrs. Hansen.

Approval of the Mizock Subdivision was again deferred. Although Mr. Mizock testified that the final plat received the approval of Mr. Lenzinni, a formal letter indicating such approval had not yet been received. The Board concurred in Mr. MacArthur's recommendation that approval of the subdivision be delayed until such a letter was in hand.

Mr. Hamill presented a resolution authorizing the Village to demand reimbursement for engineering fees relating to private roads **p**rior to approving a subdivision, and moved its adoption. Motion seconded and sdopted unanimously.

Mr. Hamill reported that the Plan Commission terms of Messrs. Cassell, Alberts and Schultz would expire on April 30th and, reflecting the recommendation of Mrs. Hansen, he moved that they each be reappointed. Due to reluctance to act on the part of Mr. MacArthur, action was deferred temporarily.

Mr. Hamill also moved that the Plan Commission be instructed to review the adequacy of fees presently provided for in the Subdivision Ordinance, and to hold a public hearing on any proposed changes. Motion seconded and adopted.

Concerning the Cloisters Development, Mr. Hamill reported that Mrs. Hansen and he had appeared at the second public hearing on the matter in Barrington and had again voiced strong opposition to the development as presently conceived.

Mr. Hamill alerted the Board to public hearings on the Hemphill (1 May 13) and DiMucci (May 14) proposals, and urged Village officials and residents to attend.

Mr. Hamill presented a resolution proclaiming May 1st as Law Day. At Mr. MacArthru's suggestion the resolution was amended to read "democratic republic form of government." Motion seconded and carried unanimously.

Finally, Mr. Hamill reported that he had prepared aletter to NIPC strenuously objecting to their recently published population forecast for the Village through the year 2010. He indicated that the letter had set forth an alternative forecast which reduced the NIPC numbers by as much as 70%. Mr. Hamill noted that the letter had been signed by Mr. Denton and forwared to NIPC. Copies have been sent to each Trustee.

ZONING: Mr. Hamill reported that the term of Mr. Hansen, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, expires April 30. NOting the recommendation of Mr. Denton, Mr. Hamill moved that Mr. Hansen be reappointed. Motion seconded and carried unanimously.

Mr. Hamill next presented Ordiance 76-3 granting a special use for a pond 4/26/76

at the Torstenson residence in Hawley Woods. He reported that the ZBA at a hearing held on April 19, had unanimously voted to recommend the granting of such a special use. Motion made and seconded to approve. Roll call. 4 ayes, no nays, 3 absent. Ordinance was adopted.

With respect to the proposed new building ordinance, Mr. Hamill stated that, because of a number of revisions had been made which the Trustees had not yet had an opportunity to review, he did not recommend taking action tonight. Copies of the amended ordinance were distributed, and the significant changes were commented upon. Three members of the audience (Messers. Helfrick, Lageschulte and Zaleski' spoke out in opposition to the proposed new fee schedule. There was also some concern expressed about the procedure for appealing decisions of the building inspector. Mr. Helfrick suggested that a public hearing should be held on the matter. Mr. Craig noted that a public hearing was not required under the Law, and he also noted that the appeals procedure is not nearly as cumbersome as had been suggested. Finally, Mrs. Blanchard and Mr. Criag joined in Mr. Hamill's contention that the present fees are inadequate. In this conccection, it was noted that the total costs of administering the building ordinance are substantially in excess of the expenses of the building inspector alone.

Mr. Craig noted that Illinois law requires that electrical codes and permit fees be recommended by a duly appointed Electrical Commission. Mr. Hamill moved adoption of Ordinance 76-4 establishing such a commission. Motion seconded. Roll call. 4 ayes, no nays, 3 absent. Ordinance was adopted.

BUILDING: Mr. Kempe noted that permits had been issued for two hoems, one garage, one barn and one porchenclosure for the month of April.

At this time Mr. Thompson who lives on Keen Lake asked that the Board check into the problem of drainage from a ditch dug by Barrington Twonship across private property, some in Barrington Hills, into Keene Lake. He noted that the lake is becoming silted up and at each rainfall turns yellow with runoff. Mr. Thompson was asked to discuss it with Mrs. Hansen and then present the Village Board with a petition to aks the Twonship to"cease and des ist". The Village would then be able to epetit on Barrington Township and ask them to act volurtarily.

Mr. Kempe than presented a resolution to reappropriate funds as follows: (To be attached) Motion was made and seconded approving the reappropraition. Roll call. 4 ayes, no nays, 3 absent. Motion carried.

At this time Mr. Kempe asked for a motion to reappoint the following mem bers to the Plan Commission, Mr. Cassell, Mr. Schultz and Mr. Alberts. Motion was made and seconded. Motion carried.

There being no further business, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Motion carried.
