


The owners of these homes represented about 4% of the population then and were referred to as

JAMES RIVER PLANTATIONS

Among the Finest 18th Century Plantation Houses in America

by Glenne McMonigal

A long the James River just outside Williamsburg, Virginia, a visitor can find and tour some of the finest 18th century plantation houses in America. This wonderful concentration of early mansions is in Charles City County along historic Route 5, (the John Tyler Highway). *Lifestyles* will focus on the James River Plantations of Berkeley, Evelynton, Sherwood Forest and Shirley.

Shirley Plantation, settled in 1613, is the oldest plantation in Virginia. It was founded six years after the settlers arrived in Jamestown in 1607 to establish the first permanent English Colony in the New World. Granted to Edward Hill I in 1660, it offers an intimate view of the history of the Hill and Carter families. The present mansion was begun in 1723 and completed in 1738.

Since colonial times, the Shirley Plantation owners have entertained the Harrisons, Byrds, Lees, Washingtons, Tylers and other notables on their 800-acre estate. It remains "home" to 10th and 11th generations of the Hill-Carter family.

Ann Hill Carter, mother of Robert E. Lee, was born and raised at Shirley. She married Governor Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee in the parlor. Their son, Robert, was educated with his cousins on this plantation.

Shirley Plantation has had, for 250 years, a 4 foot tall pineapple finial in the center of its roof, symbolizing warm hospitality (and wealth) to those who come to call.

Sherwood Forest Plantation has the distinction of having been owned by two US Presidents—William Henry Harrison, the 9th President who inherited the plantation in the late 18th century; and President John Tyler who purchased it in 1842. Since then, Sherwood Forest Plantation has been continuously owned by Tyler's

ntation has been continuously owned by Tyler's direct descendants. Tyler married twice and had 15 children. His grandson and wife are

the current owners.

The house, circa 1730, is an example of Virginia Tidwater in design and is the longest framed dwelling in America (300 feet). The home contains furnishings, heirlooms, silver and paintings which belonged to President Tyler and his family. Sadly, Union troops damaged some of the house and belongings during the Civil War as is testified by marks on woodwork, doors and an Empire table in the hall.

Evelynton Plantation, a splendid example of Georgian Revival, was originally part of William Byrd's expansive Westover Plantation and named for his daughter, Evelyn. Since 1847, the Evelynton has been in the Ruffin family whose patriarch, Edmund Ruffin, fired the first shot of the Civil War at Fort Sumter. This mansion was the original site of many Civil War skirmishes in 1862; the original house and out buildings were burned. The current residence was erected two generations later in 1937. Architect W. Duncan Lee was the designer. This mansion and lush grounds and gardens are available for private occasionsweddings, corporate functions and special events. The site is incredibly beautiful!

Berkeley James River Plantation, built in 1726, was birthplace to President William Henry Harrison and the ancestral home of President Benjamin Harrison.

Early Georgian in design, the mansion is believed to be the oldest 3-story brick house in

Virginia. Benjamin Harrison VI, under the direction of Thomas Jefferson, installed handsome woodwork and double arches in the "Great Rooms" in 1790. Magnificent 18th century antiques grace Berkeley throughout.

George Washington and the succeeding nine Presidents of the United States enjoyed the gracious hospitality of Berkeley.

Of note, the first Bourbon Whiskey in America was distilled at the plantation (1621-1622), President Lincoln

visited Berkeley and reviewed McClellan's Army of 140,000 Union Soldiers (1862) and *Taps* was composed at Berkeley while Civil War Union Forces were encamped at the plantation (also 1862). Berkeley is also the site of the first official Thanksgiving in 1619.




Sherwood Forest Plantation, c. 1730's, was the home of President John Tyler.

Shirley Plantation, c. 1738, a three-storied Queen Anne house, is graced by a four foot pineapple finial on the roof to indicate wealth and hospitality.




Evelynton Plantation was designed in 1937. The original home was the site of fierce Civil War skirmishes and was burned during conflict.



Workshop Teaches Strategies to Conquer Homework Battles

In "Homework: A Parent's Survival Guide," a community service workshop presented by Huntington Learning Center, parents learn key strategies for conquering daily homework battles. The president of Huntington Learning Center, Dr. Raymond J. Huntington, offers this critical workshop through local PTAs because he believes, "A parent's motivation, interest, and support are crucial for a child to do well in school. And, while doing homework teaches a child responsibility, parents need to reinforce the importance of taking this responsibility."

Dr. Huntington adds, "Homework also allows parents to have day-to-day contact with their child's education," a cornerstone of the Huntington Learning Center's

philosophy The workshop begins by identifying seven common homework problems that

- children have, asking parents: 1. Does your child put forth minimal effort?
- 2. Does your child refuse to do homework assignments?
- 3. Does your child fail to bring assignments home? 4. Does your child take all night to
- finish homework?
- assistance from you?

minute to finish assignments?

7. Does your child put off homework if you're are not home?

In the workshop parents are given guidelines to deal with these problems and help their children learn to do homework on their own. As Dr. Huntington points out, "Parents can have a tremendous influence on a child's self-confidence, and can show encouragement by praising their child's efforts." According to him, "The three C's-showing care, concern and communicating are the best way to enforce good study habits."

Throughout the workshop, a Huntington educational professional stresses that by teaching children basic organizational skills and good homework habits, parents can give their children the tools necessary to make wise choices about school work.

It is important to point out, however, that if a child is struggling in school, the problem may be bigger than just poor study habits. Some children lack the reading, writing, or math skills required to comprehend new information and complete harder homework assignments.

Plastic Surgery and People's Fears

by Gary S. Churchill, MD

Many people think and talk about getting plastic surgery for years but fear prevents them from taking that final step and actually carrying through with it. Their concerns are understandable, and undergoing surgery is certainly not something to be taken lightly. Yet many of these fears can be eased with a little more knowledge and some accurate information.

Fear of the Results

A facelift is probably the procedure most feared by patients. One concern they have is that a facelift won't look natural; nobody wants to look pulled or too tight. The goal is to look refreshed and not as if surgery was performed. So how is this accomplished? Rather than depending on extensive skin undermining and pulling as is commonly done, we use a less invasive technique that depends more on tightening the deeper layers beneath the skin. This lifts and tightens the skin in a more natural way, distributing the tension from better sooner than ever before. beneath the skin rather than directly from the incisions. The result is a faster recovery, a longer lasting result and a very resulting in far better healing

Fear of Scars

Patients also worry that their scars will show. Unfortunately, many surgeons still use incisions that result in visible scars. But this is not the case with our incisions. After years of experience and constant refinements, we have developed an incision that is virtually undetectable when it has healed. The uniqueness of our incision is that it preserves the hairline in its Some people are just extremely afraid of natural position. While most surgeons place their incision in a straight line in front of the ear where a telltale scar will be seen, we hide the incisions in all the natural creases around and then just inside the ear. We also use dissolving sutures in all the incisions so no staples or sutures ever need to be removed.







Beneficiary Designations on Qualified by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM **Plans and IRAs**

I would like to thank all my friends who have supported me during the last two months through their kindness, concern and prayers. I am very pleased to be writing my article once again.

Recently, I have been asked on numerous occasions, "What is the best method to distribute IRA and Qualified Retirement Plan assets upon death; i.e., whom should we name as beneficiaries to our plans?" The specific rules pertaining to retirement plan distributions are complex and beyond the scope of this article. However, in my next few articles, I will outline the basic rules to allow you to make decisions concerning your plans.

Generally, opting for the longest period of tax deferral will result in the greatest accumulation over the lives of the participant, spouse and children. In the event of the participant's death, it is generally desirable for the beneficiaries to delay the distributions to maximize tax savings. Keeping the assets in the plan allow the assets time to grow before taxes become

Spouse as Beneficiary

For married couples, the participant will often name the spouse as the primary beneficiary. This offers the couple the greatest flexibility as follows:

 Use the spouse's age in calculating joint life expectancy without regard to age differences to determine the "Required Minimum Distribution."

• If the participant dies before the "Required Beginning Date" (RBD = April 1 of the year following the calendar year in which the participant attains the age of 701/2), the spouse need not begin receiving mandatory distributions from the participant's IRA until the year the participant would have attained the age of 701/2. Or the surviving spouse can treat the IRA as his or her own.

• If the participant dies after the RBD, the surviving spouse can continue to receive the distributions at least as rapidly as the elected distribution of the participant allows. Or the surviving spouse can elect to treat the IRA as his or her own.

· Regardless as to when the owner dies, the entire IRA balance will qualify for the marital deduction. This will defer any estate taxes until the surviving spouse's

Rollover

Selecting a spouse as a beneficiary also provides the spouse with the ability to utilize the Spousal Rollover and treat the participant's IRA as his or her own upon the death of the participant. The surviving spouse can then roll the deceased participant's IRA into a new IRA in the surviving spouse's name. This allows the spouse to select new beneficiaries and change the distribution option to better suit the family needs. In so doing, the mandatory distributions need not begin until the surviving spouse reaches 701/2 and distributions may be made of the joint and survivor life expectancy of the beneficiary (spouse) and his or her designated beneficiary (possibly a child).

Non-Spouse as Beneficiary

If the participant names a beneficiary that is not a spouse, different rules concerning distributions apply. I will discuss non-spousal distributions next month.
