Folk Art—It Touches The Heart



We have all, at least once in our lives, experienced the feeling. You are browsing at a craft fair or antique show. Something catches your eye and there is an immediate emotional reaction. You feel yourself almost physically drawn to it.

You run your hand over it's surface, and it almost leaps into your hand. You find it impossible to put it down. You have been touched by it's spirit and a connection has been made.

Whether the piece is contemporary folk art or antique. You have just made a connection with the hands that crafted it. Reaching across miles and perhaps decades, you have been touched by the spirit of its creator.

A ramshackle barn or aging Victorian porch that touched their heart has been rendered and offered to you, and you begin... was the farmer who owned the barn prosperous? Why did he choose that particular style of roof? Perhaps boat builders lived in the area, so the graceful curve of the porch or barn was second nature to them. What ships did they build? What parts of the world did those ships see? And on and on.

Folk art touches the heart because there is so very much of the artist in each piece. The use of old materials, the thoughtful way it was put together, unusual mixes of materials, colors, textures, insights-the very spirit of the individual is what is reaching out to you.

by the meter, however, when leaving Manhattan for JFK.

To qualify, you must have bought a ticket on or before December 31, 1995 for travel occurring on or after January 1, 1996. If you paid by credit card, you should get your refund automatically posted to your account. If you paid by cash or check you must fill out a simple form (available from Northwest ticket offices). Strength Training

What is strength training? Strength training is a method of strengthening muscles using a resistance. This resistance can be weights, rubber tubing, body weight (i.e. pushups) or even soup cans. By using a resistance, an individual puts stress on a muscle causing muscle fibers to break down. These muscle fibers then repair and become more efficient.

What are some of the benefits of strength training? Strength training can speed your metabolism (your ability to burn calories), improve your posture, increase your strength thereby decreasing your risk of injury and/or increasing recovery time from an injury or surgery, alleviate back pain, increase bone density and the list goes on.

Won't strength training make me bulk up? Very few women have the capacity to "bulk up." Although programs can be designed to help men increase the size of their muscles, the degree to which this can be done will vary from person to person. There is a fat layer on top of the muscle. at Pro-Fit, Inc. (708) 261-1013.

The feeling of bulking can happen if a person works the muscle underneath, making it firm, and does no aerobic exercise to burn the layer of fat on top. What happens is that you end up with "hard fat" which appears bulky.

How often do I need to strength train? For general fitness conditioning, most people need to strength train 2-3 days per week. Remember to skip a day in between workouts to allow the muscles to repair themselves. More serious weight trainers may need to work out 6-7 days per week, working individual body parts each day.

Facial Plastic Surgery, Looking Your Best

Laser Resurfacing **To Remove Wrinkles**

Everyone knows that as we age we get more wrinkles. This starts in some people even in their late twenties. There are many remedies for this. Lotions, creams, and moisturizers have been used for years. More recently alpha-hydroxy acids have gained popularity. Yet the only permanent improvement that can be made in wrinkles requires some method to resurface the skin; to actually remove the outer layers of skin and allow a new and smoother skin surface to form in the healing process. Good results have been obtained in the past with both dermabrasion and chemical peeling. Now, an exciting new advance in laser technology makes it possible to safely and effectively resurface the skin using the laser.

What Type Of Laser Is Used And How Are The Treatments Done?

A carbon dioxide laser is used for skin resurfacing. When this type of laser is applied to the skin it barely penetrates and therefore vaporizes only a minute layer of the surface. The laser is passed over the skin a number of times to remove the amount of surface skin necessary to smooth the wrinkles. As this is done the laser seals any blood vessels so there is no bleeding. This makes the visualization superb allowing a very controlled depth of skin removal. The skin will look raw for approximately a week while the new skin resurfaces the area where the old skin was removed. After a week, the area is healed but will still be pink. This fades gradually at (847) 304-1000.



as the skin forms new collagen and elastin fibers beneath the surface further tightening and smoothing the skin. Makeup can be worn over the area after one week to camouflage the pinkness.

What Type Of Anesthesia Is Used?

A local anesthetic is usually used for small areas but if the entire face is being resurfaced a twilight sleep is more comfortable for the patient.

Can This Be Used For Scars As Well As Wrinkles?

The smoothing of scars has traditionally been done with dermabrasion. Laser resurfacing is definitely another option to be used. The two procedures heal similarly and will get similar results. The advantage to using the laser, though, is that the procedure is bloodless and that makes it easier to see the depth to which the skin and scars are removed.

Where Can This Be Done?

We are now performing laser resurfacing in our accredited center in Barrington. This is an outpatient procedure so it requires no hospitalization. For more information call (847) 304-1000.

Thumb-Sucking

Illinois Law Update

Spring is here and we survived another Illinois winter. Time to get the tennis rackets and golf clubs out of storage and try to lose those extra pounds that magically appear during the winter months.

This month I will share some of the new Illinois legislation that has been enacted and case law recently decided. The area of family law touches most of us either directly, or as a result of friends and family involved in issues of divorce, child custody, or child support. Recent legislation shows Illinois' "get tough" policy on those who fail to pay child support. Recent amendments to various Illinois Acts give the Department of Revenue authority to collect delinquent support payments. This became effective December 31, 1995. In addition, if a person is licensed to do business in the state of Illinois and is delinquent in child support payments, the licensing agency may refuse to renew a license and may revoke or suspend the license. Also, amendments to the Vehicle Code state that a driver's license may be suspended if the driver is ninety (90) days or more delinquent in child support payments and has been found in contempt of court for failure to pay.

April is "Tax Month." The following case discusses possible tax consequences for failure to timely reinvest the proceeds from the sale of a home incident to a divorce. In Murphy Vs. Commissioner of Internal Revenue, 103 T. C. III (1994), a recent Tax Court case, a husband was held liable for taxes on his ex-wife's share of gain from the sale of the marital residence because they elected the two-year deferral on their joint tax return. In this case, a married

their joint tax return. Subsequent to the joint filing, the couple divorced. The husband purchased a new residence during the twoyear period, but the wife did not. The husband reported to the I.R.S. additional income equal to one-half (1/2) of the proceeds of the sale of the old residence minus the cost of the new residence.

The Court held the husband could defer a portion of his one-half (1/2) share of the total gain, but he remained jointly and severally liable for the taxes on his ex-wife's share of the total gain since she failed to purchase a new residence within the two years and the couple had deferred the gain on a joint return.

Boxelder Bugs—A Nuisance Pest

The boxelder bug is apparently making a that hatch from these eggs feed throughout bid for homeowner nuisance pest-of-theyear award, according to Gary Bretthauer, Unit Assistant, Crops/IPM with the Kendall County Extension Office. Based on the number of calls we have received this year, 1995 must have been a very good year for boxelder bugs, continues Bretthauer.

Boxelder bugs are about 1/2" long, brown or black with conspicuous red markings on their backs. There are two generations of bugs each year, but the completion of the second generation depends on temperatures in the summer and fall. The adults of the second generation are the ones that hibernate in and around the house and cause problems during the winter and early spring. They overwinter in protected areas, frequently entering houses where they live in cracks, crevices and within the walls of the home. Once they get into the walls, they usually hibernate. Some, however, move right inside and start to bother the residents. They feed on neither food nor cloth, nor do they reproduce indoors, but on occasion they will feed on some houseplants. Perhaps their most annoying habit is soiling curtains and wallpaper with fecal deposits and showing up on the kitchen table.

During spring, the boxelder bugs will move outside and lay eggs. The nymphs

British Architecture's Cutting Edge

An eye-opening overview of contemporary British architecture can be seen at The Art Institute of Chicago now through May 5, 1996, in the Kisho Kurokawa Gallery of Architecture. Contemporary British Architects: Recent Projects from the Architecture Section of the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition presents three years' highlights from the Architecture Room at the Summer Exhibition held annually at the Royal Academy of Arts, London. A showcase for both established and up-and-coming British architects, the Architecture Room has been called "the place to find out what is happening" on the architectural scene today. Organized by the Royal Academy, the exhibition travels to Chicago following a critically acclaimed run at the National Academy of Design in New York. The Chicago showing of the exhibition has been funded principally by the Financial Times of London.

Contemporary British Architects surveys the work of 50 architects, represented by 80 architectural drawings, models, photographs-and even paintings-in a provocative setting designed especially for the Art Institute by the office of Nicholas Grimshaw. Mr. Grimshaw is the famed London architect known for, among other designs, the new International Terminal of the English Channel Tunnel high-speed railway at Waterloo, London, and the British Pavilion at Expo '92, Seville, as well as the new Stock Exchange in Berlin. The former two are represented in the exhibition.

Since its inception in 1768, the Royal Academy of Arts has supported and cel- downtown Chicago Public Library build-

ebrated architecture along with painting, sculpture, and printmaking. Contemporary British Architects presents a selection of the most distinguished projects shown in annual exhibitions between 1991 and 1994, some realized, some remaining in the design phase. A wide range of building types-airport, stadium, train station, library, cathedral, corporate office, and others-highlights the variety of the commissions represented, and is echoed in the breadth of media on view. Moreover, the exhibition reflects both the diversity of British architectural thought and of its influence, with designs for projects from Berlin to Cairo, and from Hong Kong to Stonehenge-by architects from "A" (neoclassicist Robert Adam) to "Z" (conceptual architectural painter Zoe Zenghelis).

The exhibition offers a cross-section of current trends, seen in its selection of works by younger practitioners as well as internationally acclaimed architects. Among the latter is Peter Cook and his proposal for Breitscheidplatz in Berlin, the result of a commission from the German magazine Geo. Sir Norman Foster, acclaimed as an eminent practitioner on the international stage, is represented by four projects, among them the enormous new airport on the man-made island of Chek Lap Kok, in Hong Kong. Eva Jiricna's remarkable interior design and lighting for Joseph makes the clothing store a highlight of London's famed Sloane Street fashion district. Sir Richard Rogers is known for his design, with Renzo Piano, of the Centre Georges Pompidou, in Paris, and for the landmark Lloyd's building in London. The exhibition features three of his other projects, including the Zoofenster Building, Berlin, and the K1 Tower Exhibition Space in Tokyo.

The untimely death of Sir James Stirling in 1992 deprived Britain of one of its most eminent and talented architects. A rich array of his projects designed with Michael Wilford has been seen recently in the Royal Academy Summer Show, including the five on view here: the Venice Biennale bookshop; Los Angeles Philharmonic Hall; the Kyoto Centre; the Music School and Theatre Academy, Stuttgart; and the Temasek Polytechnic school, Singapore. Colin St. John Wilson might be known to Chicagoans for his consulting work on the

ing. His grand design for the new British Library in London has sparked considerable debate, with its imposing red brick exterior, spectacular interior spaces, and its homages to Alvar Aalto.

Other leading architects, such as Eldred Evans and David Shaley (the new Tate Gallery, in Cornwall), and Jeremy Dixon and Edward Jones (a major new bus station on the Piazzale Roma), are seen alongside various younger practitioners. These include Allies and Morrison (the Thames Path Footbridge, London); Future Systems (the Stonehenge Visitor Centre); Armstrong Architects (Maison de la Culture du Japon, Paris); and David Marks and Julia Barfield (a design for the Berlin 2000 Olympic Stadia). The range of contemporary interpretations of English neoclassical architecture is conveyed by, for example, Robert Adam (the Manor Farm in Weston Patrick, Hampshire) and Quinlan Terry (the New Brentwood Cathedral, Essex). Restoration and landscape projects are also featured, as well as super-realist paintings by Ben Johnson celebrating the detailing and effects of light in contemporary British buildings.

Contemporary British Architects: Recent Projects from the Architecture Section of the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition was organized by the Royal Academy of Arts, London, and curated by Peter Murray, edi-

with odds and ends from the holidays. After that's done, look around. Is the sump pump in need of TLC? Or what about the water softener and the water heater. Would a coat of paint on the basement stairs and floor brighten up that lower level? Yea.

Before we go outside on our spring cleanup, it's time to think about setting up a reserve fund for maintenance and remodeling and/or updating if you find this necessary. Why I bring this up now is because when we go outside, the first thing we think about is the roof. We know if the home is 15-20 years old, it will probably need a roof soon. That means you will need lots of ready cash for this project. So, it's time to begin on that reserve fund.

The roof and gutters need to be clean. Check the gutters, downspouts and check the roof for loose shingles or possible leaks. Clean out gutters and down spouts with a garden hose. Note any foundation cracks and get those cracks filled. Clean out basement window wells. Clear away debris from the house, deck, outbuildings and airconditioning compressor. Trim away any limbs or shrubs that touch the house. Examine septic system for any "red flags." Get all garden tools readied-sharpened, cleaned, oiled, etc. How is your lawn mower? Probably needs a tune-up after the winter.

I'm never wild about spring cleaning, but these chores are maintenance prescription for keeping your home working at peak performance and thereby making your home your friend.
