

Close to 1,000 feet are preparing to pound the pavement on October 20 to fight hunger in the Barrington Area's 14th annual CROP WALK. Sister Lorraine Menheer and Sister Margaret Eisele are pictured here posting a sign to remind walkers and sponsors that registration will be at 12:30 p.m. at St. Anne Paror if you prefer a golden mile, walk will begin at 1:00 p.m. with rest stops along the way at various churches, The route will return walkers to St. Anne for a chili supper, fellowship and music by Mark Miller.

Sister Lorraine is always taking whatever steps she can on behalf of the poor and hungry. This year she will literally be walking an extra mile to fight hunger as she is honored as the Grand Marshall of the 1996 Barrington Area CROP WALK. Sr. Lorraine is Pastoral Associate and Director of Pastoral Care, Social Concerns and Project Hope at St. Anne and has consistently been one of the top fund-raisers for the CROPWALK. Her concern for social justice brings her in daily contact with the poor as she tirelessly works on their behalf. She has always walked the CROP WALK route, all 13 of them, a couple of days prior with Sister Margaret and others who are busy on the day of the walk. This year she will walk her ten kilometers on Friday and then typical of her willingness to walk that extra mile for the poor, she'll lead the more than 400 walkers expected on Sunday for an additional mile as Grand Marshall.

CROP WALK is sponsored by Church World Service. Everyone is invited to participate and can even designate sponsorship to a relief agency of their choice. It is an ecumenical effort with many denominations working together to fight hunger. Several civic organizations, scouts and high school ish Center, 120 N. Twentyfive percent of the funds raised fill the shelves at the Barrington Food Pantry, aid Meals with Wheels, Salvation Army, the Carpentersville FISH program and the Bethlehem Food Center. The remaining seventy five percent goes to national and international agencies for food distribution, education in good agricultural techniques and all forms of disaster relief.

The walkers are sponsored by an average of ten people and some walkers join in on the fun by sponsoring themselves. ### Art Associates To View "Degas: Beyond Impressionism"

"Degas: Beyond Impressionism" at the Art Institute of Chicago can be conveniently viewed by participating in a bus trip on Thursday, October 24, sponsored by the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute.

This exhibition, displayed only at the National Gallery of Art in London and the Art Institute of Chicago, focuses on Edgar Degas's art work from 1886, the year of the last Impressionist exhibition, to 1917, the year of his death.

Following a slide presentation by lecturer Jeff Nigro, passes to the exhibit will be distributed.

This is the first exhibition to concentrate on the powerful and beautiful late works created by Degas in the autumn of his life. Degas is well known for his realistic portrayal of the ballet, circus, and racehorses, and for his association with the Impressionists. But for decades, myths of Degas's failing eyesight and self-imposed isolation kept his later works shrouded in mystery. In this exhibition his focus on bathers and dancers-through the media of paint, pastels, and sculpture—illustrates his connection to and anticipation of 20th century art.

### Tax On Retirement Plans

Fall is upon us and the chill in the air reminds us that winter is not far behind. Also, 1996 will soon be a memory and we will be getting even closer to the year 2000. I thought a few rules concerning retirement plans might be useful for year end planning. People participating in qualified retirement plans may be subject to additional excise taxes imposed by the Tax Reform Act of 1986. Qualified retirement plans and IRAs have special tax treatment because they support an important social goal: an adequate income for retired people. Qualified plans permit the deferral of income, generally until retirement. Amounts accumulated under a qualified plan are not included in the employee's gross income until distributed. The IRS has adopted rules that prevent the distribution of benefits from retirement plans to people still in the work force, require the distribution of benefits to people who have attained what has been established as retirement age, require substantial annual distributions once distributions commence and prevent the use of plans to provide excessive annual distributions to plan participants and excessive death benefits for

In 1986, the Tax Reform Act established a rule for taxing early distributions from qualified retirement plans. Early distributions are those that occur before the plan participant reaches the age of 591/2. A 10% excise tax is assessed to these early distributions and the amount received is included in the gross income of the employee.

Thomas, 50 years old, was in the investment business. His business was not doing well, he withdrew \$200,000 from his individual retirement account. Thomas had in-



from his IRA which he would eventually repay. However, Thomas' business continued to incur losses and he could not repay the funds to his IRA. His case went to the Tax Court and the Tax Court held that Thomas was liable for the 10% additional tax on premature withdrawals from qualified retirement plans before the age of 591/2 and the withdrawal must be treated as income and taxed accordingly.

It is very important to closely scrutinize early withdrawals from retirement plans. If distributions are made improperly, the net result might be a taxable distribution coupled with a 10% excise penalty, and an emaciated retirement plan.

Next month we will discuss mandatory distributions and penalties for leaving too much money in your retirement plan when tended to treat this withdrawal as a loan you die. Have a safe and healthy October.







he was raised in South Africa. An outdoorsman and an individualist from a very young age, Wolton became discontented early on with formal artistic training. Back in England however, at the age of 20, a selfguided study of the style and techniques of Britain's nineteenth century landscape artists proved to be the path to developing the powerful, impressionistic style that has become characteristic of his work.

Painting in South Africa, his art met with success in spite of a political and social climate that he describes as 'artist strangulation.' In 1983, exhausted from years of tempering his natural style to pacify agents and critics in that country, he decided to leave for the U.S. Here Wolton has found a sense of "finally coming home"—the rugged scenery of the Southwest with its heat, dryness and brilliant light provides inspiring subject matter, and he

has found the artistic freedom to concentrate on a pure expression of nature's beauty. "I am a man of the outdoors," he says. Through countless hours spent in the mountains and at the seashore, Wolton has "stalked his landscapes, hunting for the most picturesque or dramatic views." His paintings, which are created indoors in his studio, evolve from the mood evoked while in the wild-from a certain sparkle in a mountain stream, ruffled leaves in the wind, or the crash of ocean waves on jagged cliffs. The memories of the initial emotional response he finds in nature typically take time to develop in his mind into a vision of the finished painting. Only when he knows what the final appearance of the painting will be, does he begin to

paint-often feverishly and to the point of exhaustion. "I'm remembering the mood," he says, "the power and the purpose, not the actual linear design." And although Wolton has become known for monumental-sized works, even his smaller paintings express this power.

His impressionist techniques—the use of pure and brilliant splashes of color, and a warm underglow of bright color shining through transparent layers of paint-allow Wolton to powerfully articulate the emotional vibrance and fury of one of his landscapes, he points out that "when you get up close, you'll see these tremendous sweeps of brilliant color and, really, you're not quite sure what they represent. But when you step back, there's a vitality and a suggestion of mood or power within the landscape and if that strength was not there, the painting would not carry."

Wolton dislikes being referred to as an artist. To me, that term immediately implies an arty facade. It is not my concern to present the facade of an artist. I let my paintings speak for me—for themselves. If I must have a label, let it be that I am a painterly poet." Nature's beauty painted honestly and powerfully. ### Meeting The Homework Challenge

When a child is struggling with homework, it's easy for parents to want to step in and help. However, there is a fine line between helping and taking over. "Helping" does not include drafting a research paper or relearning the first three chapters of Algebra I.

Parents sometimes forget that children are learning discipline as well as content. If you do your child's homework, it may create feelings that he or she is not really a capable person.

The primary purpose of education is to outfit children for self-sufficiency," says Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and president of the Huntington Learning Center. "Children need to make mistakes in order to learn. You can help your children accept the fact that the amount of effort they exert determines whether they succeed or fail in school. If you want your child to develop a successful attitude towards the challenges of life, you must not be afraid to let him or her get frustrated."

According to Huntington, there are many things parents can do to help children with homework hassles, without taking over their assignments:

· Show your child how to find important information in a chapter by using introductions, heading, bolded phrases and

• For term papers, help your child break at 459-5939.

down a large assignment into smaller, more manageable tasks. Students can budget their time by creating a "project calendar." Creating an outline, planning research time, taking notes and writing the paper should be scheduled activities. This will help your child learn to structure what needs to be done and learn organizational skills to use in future assignments.

 Remind your child to ask questions in class when the material is being presented. Teachers can provide guidance and will emphasize the most important information.

 Set aside a block of time and a quiet, comfortable place for studying. Make sure your child completes homework assignments during this study time.

Homework is an educational tool, intended to teach children to organize their time and work efficiently without an adult's supervision. You can help your child to handle this responsibility and develop the skills he or she will need for future academic challenges.

If your child is struggling with independent work, it may be more than just poor study skills. Your child may lack the basic reading or math skills needed to handle more advanced work. 
