Sapphire is of the corundum family and consists of any color except red (ruby). Red, light red and red with a violet overtone is always ruby. All other colors of corundum are sapphire. The word Sapphire is derived from the Latin word Sapphirus, Greek (Sappheriros), and He- Arlington Heights. brew (Sappir). Historically, sapphires have been called many names. Saphiros

Lapislazuli, green sapphire was called "emeralds," and purple sapphire was called "amethyst.'

Sources include Burma, Thailand, Sri Lanka, Africa, Australia and U.S. (Montana). Kashmir, India produced some of the most beautiful sapphires in its day, but little since World War II.

Colors include blue in various hues, colorless, pink, orange, yellow, green, purple and black. The hardness is 9 (same as ruby), toughness; good. Sapphires are commonly heat treated to produce color in colorless sapphires or to intensify color, make color uniform or to lighten stones.

Star Sapphires are sapphires that are never completely transparent, because they must have enough silky, needlelike inclusions to produce a star. They occur in almost every color ruby and sapphire that exist, although orange and yellow are almost unknown and green is very rare. The most common is black. Today most of the Star Sapphires bought in jewelry stores are synthetic (most colors other than black which is usually genuine).

## What You Should Know **About Liposuction**

#### What is tumescent liposuction?

While liposuction has been very popular since its introduction, advances in the last decade have dramatically improved the postoperative recovery and ultimate results. We can now achieve excellent results in patients who previously would not have been considered good candidates for liposuction. Undoubtedly, the most significant advance has been the introduction of tumescent liposuction. This technique is known by many names, the most common of which is liposculpture. It is performed by injecting large volumes of a dilute salt water solution containing lidocaine and epinephrine into the fatty tissues. The lidocaine numbs the tissue and diminishes postoperative pain, while the epinephrine constricts the blood vessels, diminishing bleeding and postoperative bruising. The large volume of salt water distends the fatty tissues, thereby increasing the space between the nerves, blood vessels and fibrous tissues. The fat is then suctioned through a very small blunt metal tube called a cannula. Modern cannulas are much smaller than those used in the past. Consequently, fat is removed with finer control resulting in a much smoother contour than with older techniques. Additionally, the use of smaller cannulas and epinephrine in the tumescent solution

"Being able to "grow" a patient's own cartilage cells and then successfully implant them into an injured knee is a real medical breakthrough," states Dr. Saltzman. "Many of the patients who have shown long-term benefits because of this procedure were injured while participating in sports or at work. Pain and loss of mobility is difficult for anyone, but especially for those who are accustomed to a very active lifestyle. My goal is to help patients with specific knee injuries regain mobility and return to optimal function."

significantly reduces bleeding allowing greater safety and precision than in the past. Virtually any area of the body may be sculpted using tumescent liposuction including the neck, abdomen, back, sides of waist, hips, buttocks, thighs, knees, ankles and arms. Men and women in overall good health with good skin elasticity are the best candidates for liposuction.

#### Does liposuction need to be performed in a hospital?

Liposuction is almost always performed as an outpatient procedure. The surgery may last from 30 minutes to several hours depending on the amount of fat removed. Because liposuction does not involve large incisions and because of the use of lidocaine during surgery, pain is minimal to moderate and easily controlled with oral medication. Preferably,

sent to the laboratory where the cartilage is grown, increasing the number of cells approximately 15 times. The patient then undergoes a second surgical procedure several weeks later that involves implantation of the cultured cells into the injured area, where they multiply and produce a

durable joint surface. Developed and tested at the university of Gotenborg in Sweden, the new technique and its promising outcomes were first described in the New England Journal of Medicine (10-6-94). The procedure was first performed in the United States in 1995 and Genzyme Corporation began providing the cartilage cell laboratory service to orthopedic surgeons here. Orthopedic surgeons complete special training in order to perform the procedure.

The Medical breakthrough has been performed by Dr. Saltzman more than any of the handful of surgeons in the Chicagoland area that are trained in this procedure.

Dr. Saltzman completed his residency in orthopedic surgery at Loyola University Medial Center and is board certified by the American Board of Orthopedic Surgeons and the Arthroscopy Board of North America. He has been in practice since 1984. He currently is at the Woodfield Orthopedic Center in Schaumburg, and is on the medical staffs of Columbia Hoffman Estates Medical Center and Alexian

## Are Hardy Mums, Really Hardy?

Every year the employees at **Pittas Greenhouse**, in Barrington, are asked "Are hardy garden mums really hardy?" According to Greg Pittas, owner and grower at **Pittas**, "yes and no." There seems to be two important factors in determining the hardiness of the fall garden mums; time of year and hybridization of varieties.

Due to the demand for longer blooming times, new colors, and more compact varieties; garden mums have been extensively hybridized, and re-hybridized. This hybridization has generated all the beautiful characteristics that we find in today's fall mums; but, this has also caused a great inconsistency in hardiness between varieties. Pittas said he has found some varieties consistently winter over, while others never do, so experiment, and plant the varieties you have had success with.

Planting late in the summer and early fall also has a big impact on hardiness. The mums are grown from cuttings, planted early June, and spend almost the South Seas black pearl and baguette diamonds in a platinum mounting.

entire summer in these pots. These plants develop dense root systems, and thus, often require watering and fertilization everyday during the growing season. When the consumer brings these plants home and plants them in their gardens, they continue to care for them through the blooming season. "After blooming, is the most critical time for your garden mums" says Greg. Keep watering the plants into fall, and remember that the roots probably have not had time to spread into the surrounding soil, and will need more water then your plants you planted early in the year. In late fall use leaves or shredded bark to mulch your mums and perennials, about 1" to 2" deep. The mulch will protect your plants from heaving when the ground freezes and thaws in late fall and early spring. Remember mums and other perennials come up late in spring so be patient. Following these guidelines and selecting good varieties, should prove that the answer is "YES."

#### **Recent Tax Reform**

In late July, Congress enacted a tax cut that appears to be beneficial to most taxpayers. As a result of the President's utilization of the line item veto, the official tax document has not been made available. As is generally the case, Congress has filled the tax bill with complex rules that effect the phase outs, phase ins and cut offs. Following is a brief overview of some of the bill's highlights.

#### **Capitol Gains**

The new law cuts the top tax rate on long term capital gains from 28% to 20%. Further, single taxpayers with taxable income of less than \$24,651 and couples with a taxable income of less than \$41,201 will enjoy a 10% long term capital gains rate. The new definition of "long-term" is now 18 months. In addition, any assets purchased after January 1, 2001 and held for a minimum of fine (5) years will enjoy a capital gains rate of 18%.

#### **Personal Residence**

The new tax law allows home sellers of any age to save capital gains on the sale of their residence in which they resided two (2) of the five (5) years preceding the sale. Singles will not incur capital gains tax if their new profits do not exceed \$250,000 and couples will not incur capitol gains tax if their new profits do not exceed \$500,000. This capital gains relief can be utilized every two (2) years.

#### **Estate and Gift Tax**

The new tax law increases the estate tax exemption from \$600,000.00 to \$1 Million by the year 2006.

The \$10,000 annual gift tax exclusion will be indexed for inflation beginning in 1999.

#### **Retirement Plans**

A very important change that the new tax law has created is the repeal of the 15% excise tax on excess distributions from retirement plans.

The new tax bill has created a new IRA named the "Roth IRA," named for the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Senator William Roth Jr. To be eligible for the Roth IRA, you must be single with an adjusted gross income of \$95,000 or less or married with an adjusted gross income of \$150,000 or less. Beginning in

1998, you can put away up to \$2,000 annually after tax (\$4,000 per couple), hold it for five years, and never pay tax on the money earned if it is spent on the purchase of a first home, used after reaching the age of 59 1/2 or becoming disabled; or is paid out when you die. In addition, you are allowed to withdraw an amount equal to your after tax contribution at any time, for any purpose, tax free.

Beginning in 1998, the new tax law allows a spouse without a personal pension plan to invest in a deductible IRA if the couple's adjusted gross income is equal to or less than \$150,000.

#### **Education Savings Accounts**

Beginning in 1998, you will be allowed a \$500 per year education IRA for a child under the age of 18. The money placed in the IRA is after tax dollars, but the funds withdrawn are tax free when used for college. The phase out for contributions for singles starts at \$95,000 and for couples the phase out starts at \$150,000.

The new tax law creates tax advantages for all taxpayers. However, as will all Congressional tax reform, the politics of compromise creates complex rules and regulations. We will keep our ears and eyes on Washington. Have a safe and prosperous September and see you next month.

#### **Breaking the Failure Chain**

Failure is a learned habit, and it may be keeping your child from reaching his full potential. Taking specific action to remedy a child's failure usually nets the best results. Parents and teachers need to do two things to improve a child's performance: strengthen basic skills and rebuild self-esteem.

Dr. Raymond J. Huntington, founder and president of the Huntington Learning Center, refers to this strategy as breaking the failure chain.

"The failure chain is the proverbial 'vicious cycle.' A child, faced with poor school reports, becomes frustrated and loses confidence. He literally shuts down his mind to avoid the uncomfortable feelings of frustration and failure. This can lead to disruptive classroom behavior, or excessive daydreaming or doodling," says Dr. Huntington.

To break the failure chain, Dr. Huntington says that the child must fill the gaps in his education. He must learn to feel better about himself in order to regain the motivation to succeed.

#### Traveling... with Carlson Wagonlit Travel All You Need to Know About Passports

If you're going to take a trip outside North America, you're going to need a passport. And while most Caribbean islands, Canada for adults and \$40 for children under 18. and Mexico do not require a passport for U.S. citizens, you may find showing immigrations agents a passport simpler than making sure you have one of the acceptable forms of identification-typically a U.S. birth certificate or a voter's ID card.

Additionally, once you have a passport, planning a trip to Europe, South America, the Orient or elsewhere becomes much easier.

If you have access to the Internet, you can download all passport forms at the Department of State web site (http:// travel.state.gov). However, most travelers will find all the information they need at a U.S. Passport Office or their local clerk of court.

Here are a few tips from various sources that will make getting your passport easier:

· Passports are issued by the Department of State. There are 13 Passport Offices across the U.S. You may apply at a U.S. Passport Office or simply mail in the appropriate form. You also may find them at some post offices.

• After filling out the form, you may you to appear before an official (the clerk or a passport agent), do not sign the form mail it, along with the required photos until you are told to do so.  If you must have your passport within two weeks, you will need to pay an additional \$30 expedite fee and provide proof of the need for this service.

• If this is your first passport, you will have to appear before a deputy clerk of court of a passport agent to answer a few questions, and take an oath certifying the information you give to be true. If you are renewing or are under 13 years old, you can do everything through the mail.

• One of the biggest reasons passport applications are rejected by the Passport Office is that the proper form was not used. There are several different formsone for first-timers, one for renewals, one for lost passports and one for mutilated passports. Make sure you have the right one

#### How Do I Work with a Kitchen Designer?

come to remodel your kitchen. You're facing a multitude of decisions to make your dream kitchen become a reality. What wood, style and finish to I want for my new cabinetry? Should I choose a freestanding range or a built-in model? Would I like solid surface or laminate for the countertop?

You know you should contact a kitchen designer but you're not sure how to work with one. Many potential remodelers have questions about the role of a designer, according to Star Norini-Johnson, CKD, ASID, owner of Distinctive Kitchen Designs, Inc. in Wauconda IL. Her answers to some of the most common questions might help you in achieving your dream kitchen.

1) Will a designer try to sell me what I don't really need? "Most good designers won't oversell. They'll try to make you aware of the options available to you," Norini-Johnson says. And there will be more than you may realize: cabinets packed with ingenious storage aids; new labor-saving, high-tech appliances; and a broad range of revolutionary countertop materials, just for openers. "Your designer should present different ideas to help you make the right decisions."

2) Suppose my designer won't do what I want? "When a designer disagrees with what you want, the professional designer will usually discuss the pros and cons of the issue." says Norini-Johnson. "Perhaps the designer is concerned about a safety issue, such as proper clearances. However, it's your money and you have the final decision. If, on the other hand, you feel that the designer is not interpreting your needs or ideas, it may be a good idea to look for another professional to assist you.

You've decided that the time has finally Johnson, is so you won't end up with an elaborate commercial-type installation if you're interested in a simple, family kitchen. The designer also has to know your family's special needs. What about a baking center or a snack counter for toddlers? Or an island with a vegetable sink to allow more than one person to participate in food preparation? A good designer is usually very practical and should make recommendations as to which cabinets or finishing materials may best maximize your budget.

> 4) If I use a designer, how can I be sure what my kitchen will look like? "Only a few clients can visualize what their kitchen will look like from a floor plan. As a rule, I will often draw a perspective rendering of the finished kitchen. If you are not certain, or do not understand any element of the design, be sure to ask the designer to clarify the design concepts before placing the order for cabinets or other materials."

> 5) Will my kitchen cost more if I use a designer? "Quite often, the very opposite is true," says Norini-Johnson. "As mentioned before, designers can usually maximize the client's budget and avoid costly mistakes. However, don't be surprised if the designer has the policy of asking for a retainer at some point prior to your commitment for a purchase. After all, our time is valuable too, and we all have to make a living. The retainer usually covers the drawing and design time that the designer will invest prior to your ordering the kitchen. The retainer can usually be applied as part of the deposit for the order. It is a good idea to ask the designer about the billing policy during the first interview."

Owning a home is part of the American Dream-a very expensive part. Whatever you do, you always want to add to the value of your home, your investment. Now that we are in the fall season, it's time to review, critique and act on what improvement is necessary to put your home in an A+ condition.

One interesting thing happened when my friend Napoleon thought about putting his home on the market for sale. The first thing he did was "unclutter." First the closets, then the basement and on to the garage.
