



The artist's dictum, "What I need most are flowers, always, always." "When you go out to paint, try to forget what objects you have before you, a tree, a house, a field or whatever," explains Monet. "Merely think here is a little square of blue, here is an oblong of pink, here is a streak of yellow, and paint it just the way it looks to you..."



The Art Institute of Chicago presents the largest and most comprehensive exhibition ever devoted to the paintings of Claude Monet. *Claude Monet: 1840-1926* brings together 159 works from around the globe, including many from private collections rarely seen and well-loved favorites from major museums world-wide.

Sixty-six institutions and 37 private collections—representing 15 countries are contributing for this once-in-a-lifetime exhibition. The finest paintings from every period of Monet's career are being brought together—flowers and gardens, bridges and cathedrals, sunrises and sunsets, poplars and water lilies, and boating scenes and seascapes. In many cases, works have been selected that Monet himself indicated were among his own favorites, reassembling, for example, approximately 21 pieces that were shown in the major Paris exhibition supervised by the artist in 1889.

Organized by the Art Institute, *Claude Monet: 1840-1926* is not traveling and will be seen only in Chicago, on view now through November 26, 1995.

Among the many highlights of the exhibition will be: 31 water lily paintings, including the rarely loaned triptych from the Museum of Modern Art, New York, and The Carnegie Museum of Art's large-scale *Water Lily Garden*; seven of the *Houses of Parliament* series paintings done during the artist's stay in London at the beginning of the century; the reunion of three panels from a decorative door designed for the Paris apartment of his dealer; the central panel from *Luncheon on the Grass*—a monumental painting intended for, but not

shown at the 1866 Salon—which has never been seen outside Europe and which will never again leave Paris after this exhibition; and a varied group of paintings of Monet's family life, including two tender portraits of his son, Jean. The aim of the exhibition is to gather together the best examples from every period of Monet's 65-year career, sharply bringing into focus the artist's most important achievements and showing that he was not only Impressionism's leading light, but an art pioneer in both the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

The Art Institute of Chicago has a unique claim to undertake such an important project, one that presents Claude Monet

"whole" for the first time in an American museum in 35 years. With 33 of Monet's paintings and 11 of his works on paper—25 of which will be featured in the exhibition—the Art Institute boasts the richest collection of the artist's work outside of Paris and Boston.

Special tickets are required for *Claude Monet: 1840-1926* and advance tickets are strongly recommended. Purchased by phone, ticket prices are \$10.00 for all, Monday-Thursday; and \$12.50 for all, Friday-Sunday; *no Discounts*. Children under six are free. There is a \$2.50 service charge per ticket for phone orders. To order tickets by phone, call 1-800/929-5800.

neous. The Club gave the first graders a trowel and certificate for "Gardening" graduation.



Focus On Botox . . . An Alternative To Surgery

Dr. Churchill specializes in plastic and reconstructive surgery of the face and neck. Dr. Churchill is board certified and on staff at a number of local hospitals and surgery centers. The following is an excerpt from an upcoming newsletter.



Many people have very active frown lines between their brows and would love to have a simple way to reduce them. These lines are the result of corrugator muscles. These muscles lie horizontally under the central eyebrows. When they contract these muscles wrinkle the central brow into a configuration similar to corrugated cardboard, hence the name corrugators for the muscles. A number of options are available to treat these lines. Collagen has been used to fill the resulting depressions and more invasive surgeries have been devised to interrupt the muscles and weaken them. Now a simple injection is available that can weaken these muscles and significantly reduce the frown lines. The injection is done with Botox, a protein derived from *Clostridium botulinum*, the bacteria responsible for botulism.

What is Botox and How Does it Work?

Botox is a highly purified form of the protein botulinum toxin. When it is injected into a muscle it blocks the nerve signals coming into that muscle resulting in complete or partial paralysis lasting from 3 to 6 months. Although it sounds scary, Botox is very safe and has been used effectively for years to treat spasms of the eye and face. Over the last few years many studies have been conducted and many patients treated with good results in reducing the frown lines and crows feet at the outer corners of

the eyes.

How is a Treatment Done?




The Botox is mixed from its freeze dried state and diluted to the strength desired. Usually two injections are done on each side of the eyebrows to reduce frowning or on the sides of the eyes to reduce the crows feet. The effects are not seen immediately but take place over two to three days. Over that time the muscles will gradually become weaker until there is almost no ability to frown. If the crows feet area is injected the crinkling of the skin in that area will be reduced as well. If further weakening is desired, a second injection can be done after one week. This is rarely necessary.

Who Is a Candidate for Botox?

There are no absolute contraindications for using Botox. Allergic reactions are virtually nonexistent. To see if you are a candidate for Botox, please schedule an appointment with our office by calling (708) 304-1000.

Extra Inches Count

All airlines are not the same when it comes to seating comfort. We recently reported that Delta Airlines was ranked first among major carriers in a recent consumer poll. Perhaps one reason is extra legroom: in coach, Delta spaces seats 33 inches apart on all its aircraft except for the 737. In contrast, most of American's seats are 31 inches apart and Continental spaces its seat rows 31 or 32 inches apart. We reported recently that a couple of car rental companies have been experimenting with discounts for advance-purchase rentals. In effect, they levy a charge if you cancel your reservations without sufficient warning. So far, that trend hasn't spread industry wide. Most firms do require a deposit, which is only refundable if you cancel within a set time period on their most popular car types, such as four-wheel drives and convertibles. Now the hotel chains are revising their "no show" policies. Many are experimenting with more stringent rules to guarantee room reservations. Inter-Continental Hotels now permits individual hotels to require a credit card deposit on all bookings (before it was optional). Previously, guests had until 6 p.m. to cancel a reservation without penalty. Some hotels are now experimenting with 4 p.m., 12 noon, as well as 72-hour cancellation policies. Most credit cards stipulate a 6 p.m. "hold," so these new hotel-imposed restrictions are causing some confusion and conflict in the hotel industry.

What was that grinding sound? A booklet called "For the Airline Passenger: Passenger Questions and Pilot Answers," tells you everything you ever wanted to know about airline travel, including what some of those odd noises are during flight. Want to know just what pilots carry in those big black cases? You'll have to buy a copy at the airport newsstand or order one (\$5) from the pilot-author, John Cronin, at P.O. Box 1204, Edison, N.J., 08818.

Air Canada Offers Bereavement Fare

Most airlines offer bereavement fares (when a family member dies) at 50 percent off the regular full coach fare. Air Canada is the latest carrier to do so, and also extends the privilege to those visiting terminally ill family members. To qualify, you should have pertinent facts on hand when making a reservation: the name of the deceased, funeral home, funeral director, and appropriate phone numbers, etc.

Triple Miles from Alamo

Alamo rent a car is offering triple miles for every third rental with most major airline frequent flyer programs, including those of American, Northwest, Delta, United, and US Air. That means you'll receive 1,500 frequent flyer miles every third time you rent, using Alamo's Express Plus, a free service permitting faster rental transactions.

Odds & Ends

Northwest Airlines has changed its baggage check in policy for the Denver Airport. The Airline assumes no liability for luggage checked in less than 15 minutes before departure time at all other airports. But at trouble plagued Denver, Northwest now insists that baggage be checked at least 25 minutes ahead of time.







- 1) *Is the teacher well organized and pleasant?*
- 2) *Is he/she knowledgeable? (Check the school brochure for teachers' backgrounds.)*
- 3) *Are the teacher's corrections made clearly and in a positive way?*
- 4) *Are the students well behaved and attentive for their age?*

Performing Opportunities—As dance is a performing art, it is imperative that the



students get the chance to dance for an audience. However, a good school should stress education and not detract from that for the sake of performing. A fancy costume will never cover up poor dancing!

Facts About Oral Cancer

As we have all heard, early detection gives a patient the best chance of surviving cancer once it has started. Oral cancer frequently starts in areas where it can be seen and felt by your dentist and dental hygienist. This is why your dentist feels your neck, lips and cheeks, looks under your tongue, and may gag you with a mirror peering at the back of your throat. While in training at Northwestern and Cook County Hospital, I saw the disastrous consequences of ignoring early signs of cancer.

You can help yourself. The American Dental Association lists six changes that may alert us to patient trouble:

- 1) A persistent sore or irritation that does not heal
- 2) Color changes such as development of red or white spots on larger areas
- 3) Pain, tenderness, or numbness anywhere on the mouth or lips
- 4) A lump, thickening, rough spot, crust or small eroded area
- 5) Difficulty in chewing, swallowing, speaking or moving the jaw or tongue

- 6) A change in you bite

One or more of the above symptoms is reason to consult your dentist, but for the best chance of avoiding oral cancer and enhancing your general health, avoid the use of snuff, chewing tobacco, and cigarettes.

Kitchens That Work

by Ed and Lisa McCauley of R. K. Tech

We've made our reputation on visually striking kitchens like the washed pine and black granite showplace that you see this month in our ads; but here we'd like to emphasize some of the hidden values that make your kitchen a source of satisfaction day in and day out.


1. Intelligent Counter Planning

Ed loves to cook; and at six feet four inches tall, he finds that conventional counter heights don't work for cutting and chopping. In our own kitchen plan, which is now under construction, we've designed a workspace that's six inches higher than standard, allowing Ed to chop garlic or ginger extra fine without putting unnecessary strain on his back.

That added height also lets Ed check his recipe book without bending over and makes it easy to transfer ingredients from the chopping area to the cook-top, which we've set a few inches lower than standard so Lisa can peer into the pots on the back burners.

We've added a small sink for washing vegetables and a stainless steel refuse drawer for conveniently gathering up the husks. Now the countertop works; but we can't stop there.

2. Integrate Counters and Storage



A good work space design requires considerable thought about storage. In Ed's chopping area we've specified refrigerated drawers so that perishable vegetables are stored where they are prepared. We've also incorporated smaller open drawers for dry storage and plenty of space for utensils. On open shelves just below the counter we keep our collection of small bowls for pre-measured ingredients.

3. Connect work areas

Where do we put the spice rack, the kitchen sink, and the dishwasher? There are a variety of options; but we always try to work with the ideal of no more than two steps between most tasks.

In our kitchen design we've moved from left to right: preparation, cook-top, sink. This arrangement works in part because we're both right handed, so we tend to think left to right and up to down. Now we arrange the spice rack between the preparation area and the cook-top, so that Ed doesn't have to walk across the room when he needs to add something. Dish storage goes between the cook-top and the sink, with a convenient landing area between.

Now everything Ed needs to prepare a meal is within one step of his chopping area; and there is no overlap between food preparation and cleanup.

4. Making It All Work

Last year we won an award for a particularly grand project in Oak Brook which illustrates some of the primary design ele-

ments that we like to see in our kitchens. In the illustration you can see how the double oven and refrigerator are arranged to create a doorway into the paneled butler's pantry, which itself leads into the formal dining room.

It is vital to create flow and interplay between the spaces of the home, while at the same time showing some respect for the overall architectural style. In Oak Brook there is a physical connection between the formal dining room and the kitchen. When the door from the dining room to the kitchen is opened, all the guests see is a paneled passage; but the butler's pantry serves as useful transition point between the two rooms.

Looking at the illustration, you can also see a very important principal of modern kitchen design: think twice before you use the traditional arrangement of wall cabinets over base cabinets. More counter space is not necessarily better counter space. If you don't require counter space for a specific task, then your counter is likely to become a de facto storage area. And countertop is rarely the best storage option.

A lot of people look at their kitchen and feel vaguely dissatisfied with how it looks. That reaction may very well be a response

to poorly conceived use of counter space and wall cabinets. Those horizontal rows of wall cabinets are at odds with the more vertical orientation of traditional architecture.

In the illustration you can see a more vertical orientation. Quite apart from enhancing the visual values of the room (which we'll show in more detail in future columns), the vertical cabinets provide better storage for brooms, wine, and even a television.

This is where Lisa's architecture and interior design background gives us a real edge over most people who sell cabinets. Integrating the functional and stylistic elements of a room requires true design professionalism. A great kitchen design is a practical work of art—a kitchen that looks great, and works.

Items are displayed at both inside and outside locations.




