MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT & BOARD OF TRUSTEES  
APRIL 22, 1963.

Meeting called to order by President John H. D. Blanke. Present at roll call were Trustees: David R. Capulli, James H. DeBolt, Robert J. Long, Paul J. Shultz. Also present were: May L. Pinkerman, Clerk; B.J. Zelsdorf, Treasurer; S. Axelrood, Attorney.

PRAYER was offered by Rev. Herbert Heinemann, St. Matthews Lutheran Church.

MINUTES OF APRIL 8, 1963: In Par. 1 on Page 4: "at Hough St. & Hillside Ave. and Hough St. & Lincoln Ave." to be inserted. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to approve minutes with this addition, seconded by Trustee Shultz. Ayes. Trustee Long not voting due to absence from that meeting.

CENTENNIAL: President Blanke commended Illinois Bell Tel. Co. for reference to this 100th year thru design on new phone directory; copy of letter sent to Manager Berryhill read. It was noted this insignia is a civic contribution to the Centennial and not an official Village crest.

MEMORIAL DAYPARADE: Invitation thru President to Board of Trustees to participate.

PLAN COMMISSION APPOINTMENT: Letter of resignation from Chairmanship of Zoning Board of Appeals received from Arnold H. Sass and read. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to reaffirm appointment of Mr. Sass to fill vacancy on Plan Commission, seconded by Trustee Long. Ayes.

SALES TAX for month of January 1963 reported as net to Village of \$8165.58. ✓

ZONING HEARINGS set for 8 PM on 4-24/Decker; DeArmas; Rieke; briefed by President.

ILLINOIS MUNICIPAL LEAGUE LEGISLATIVE BULLETINS received and passed to files.

PLAN COMMISSION: complimentary letter from Mr. C.H. Forbes on conduct of hearing 4-17 received and read.

POLICE DEPT. EXAMINATION RESULTS: CAPTAIN: Joseph L. Muscarello. SERGEANT: Ronald Hemmingson. Police Commission recommended appointments. President stated Chief of Police Muscarello would be promoted to Captain - a rank he might have upon retirement from office of Police Chief and would receive same salary as Chief of Police at the time of retirement, also that Officer Hemmingson would be appointed to Sergeant #2. MOTION by Trustee DeBolt to concur in recommendations of the Police and Fire Commission, effective May 1, 1963, seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

BILLS: Several items discussed by Trustee DeBolt; after review MOTION by Trustee DeBolt that Treasurer be authorized to pay these items from funds indicated, second by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

ZONING BOARD VACANCY: Since Arnold H. Sass resigned from Zoning Board and was appointed to the Planning Commission, President Blanke appointed Thomas L. Johnson, 225 Skyline Drive to Zoning Board of Appeals (1965). MOTION by Trustee DeBolt to concur in recommendation of President, seconded by Trustee Capulli. Ayes.

POLICE PENSION FUND BOARD: Thomas L. Johnson presented his letter of resignation therefrom.

VILLAGE TREASURER President Blanke reappointed Bernard J. Zelsdorf Village Treasurer

for year 1963-64, commending him on doing an excellent job. MOTION to concur by Trustee Long, seconded by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

DEPOSITORY RESOLUTION: after reading, MOTION by Trustee Capulli to adopt same designating as Village of Barrington depositories: First National Bank & Trust Co. of Barrington; First Federal Savings & Loan Assoc. of Barrington; Harris Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago, seconded by Trustee DeBolt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

NEW WELL: President briefed on water supply survey made by Village Engineers 4-26-63. One of 4 suggested test areas was in north park re which Village received letter of stipulations from Park Board; studied in detail by Committee of Whole and it was stated it would not be possible for Village to enter into this type of agreement. It was further stated another site was located and was surveyed by President and Committee: a lot on Bryant Ave. north of alley on west side of street - 90x300 priced at \$3900.00. It was reported an option was placed on lot; Mr. Johnson of C.T. & Assoc. checked lot and Miller Artesian Well Co. made test which proved site good for well. Mr. Johnson tonight read and presented letter to Board recommending site be purchased for well. Miller Artesian Well Co. bill to be placed on next list of bills. Mr. Johnson briefed on proposed location or extension &/or enlargement to 12" main which would supply improved pressure and supply for area; alternate routing also discussed. Letter of recommendation from Trustee Jackson read. Mr. Johnson suggested further meeting to resolve several items; legal aspects discussed with Attorney. MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Village enter into an option (for consideration of \$1.00) with Robert A. Miller & Caroline W. Miller, owners, as outlined in option contract form dated April 6, 1963, in amount of \$3900. with the privilege of purchasing on or before May 15, 1963. Seconded by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz, Blanke.

RESOLUTION - WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENT: prepared by Attorney Matthews, read; authorizes notification to Engineers to prepare plans and specs for the waterworks improvement per their report of 4-26-63 and to Attorney to prepare necessary ordinances, resolutions and other documents for issuance of revenue bonds to finance such cost as cannot be paid out of funds on hand available for the purpose. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to adopt and pass Resolution seconded by Trustee DeBolt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz, Blanke. Purchase of property recommended by President.

RECESS.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY ON BRYANT AVE.: Trustee Capulli recommended and so <sup>motioned</sup> that Village purchase property with the funds appropriated in the General Fund for the purchase of property in amount of \$3900. and that Treasurer be authorized to issue check on delivery of clear title. Realtor Nance stated this price includes clear title and full price. Second by Trustee DeBolt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz, Blanke. (It was stated, for the record, that clear title and deed are synonymous)

COMMITTEE OF WHOLE MEETING to be set by Trustee Jackson, it was stated.

LEUKEMIA SOCIETY INC. ELGIN, ILL:CHAPTER: Request for ordinance, etc. read; after discussion Trustee Capulli felt this information should be given by our Attorney and so requested - agreed.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS: John C. Cadwallader, member, was appointed to Chairmanship of this Board by President. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that Board concur, seconded by Trustee DeBolt. Ayes.

**EXPERIMENTAL AIRCRAFT INC. ELGIN WINDSOCK:** Request received to operate a stationary amplifier in Village to promote program to be held in DeKalb July 6 & 7 from R. Irvine of Elgin. Brochure checked by Trustees. MOTION by Trustee Long to inform group they will be required to pay fee in accordance with Village Code of \$100. per day or any part thereof for stationary equipment or \$25. per day or any part thereof for mobile equipment. Seconded by Trustee Capulli. Ayes.

**ANNUAL AUDIT:** Trustee DeBolt noted Putta & Kelsey have audited for Village for several years and MOTIONED to use same firm again; it was noted further that amounts paid in past to this firm cover only basic costs which should begin to decline since several new procedures are now in effect. Estimated cost of audit has been given at about \$1375. Second by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Shultz, Long.

**ROTH LANDSCAPE ADJUSTMENT:** Trustee Long projected matter-decided to hold over until next meeting.

**MOTOR FUEL TAX 1963 PROGRAM - 21CS:** Trustee Long read C.T.&A. letter covering this. MOTION by Trustee Long that Resolution covering MFT work: Elm Rd. from Walnut Rd. to Hough St. & North Ave. from Liberty to Northwest Highway, be approved, seconded by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

MOTION by Trustee Long that Consoer, Townsend & Assoc be authorized by letter from Village Clerk to proceed with Plans and specs to cover above. Seconded by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

MOTION by Trustee Long that Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. be authorized by letter from Village Clerk to proceed with plans and specs necessary in connection with 1963 Maintenance program in Village, seconded by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes; Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

**BOY SCOUT PROGRAM:** Homecoming for Scout Troop 21 with special recognition scheduled for May 5th at North Park Fieldhouse.

**PROPOSED LICENSE FORM:** universal form presented; Trustee Capulli felt time not yet right to adopt this. Hold.

**DOWNTOWN STREET LIGHTING PROGRAM:** It was reported that contractor was advised on status of sales tax ruling, also that better lighting and barricades necessary - now complying. Trustee Long noted job is being watched closely and is running pretty much on schedule. *Long*

**POLICE PISTOL RANGE:** Letter received from Engineers on present status, from their position, in reply to letter from Clerk; Trustee Shultz feels they are awaiting word on this, suggesting Police Committee outline what is desired - held until return of Trustee McCaw. Chief Muscarello said he would be in accord with this being in Park if it was strictly a Police handled project-in answer to a specific question.

**PUBLIC WORKS BUILDING:** Trustee Shultz presented pictures showing progress; wall forms now going up. Supt. of Public Works to check on insurance coverage for contracts #2 & #3.

**WATER COOLER FOR 2nd FLOOR VILLAGE HALL:** Trustee Shultz briefed on survey made by Treasurer Zelsdorf; discussion had. MOTION by Trustee Shultz that purchase be authorized for installation of 1 Oasis cooler at cost not to exceed \$200. seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz.

**REMOVAL AND REINSTALLATION OF VILLAGE SIREN:** Trustee Shultz asked for opinions on this, feeling it should be on a steel tower, possibly on reservoir rather than on Village Hall building. Supt. Johansen asked to bring in estimates or bids on such

a project; it was thought this should be an engineered design; types of installation to be checked into and if possible report to come in at next meeting.

GASOLENE PURCHASE-POLICE DEPT.: Trustee DeBolt reported for Trustee McCaw that a local gas station had approached this department for consideration of agreement to supply gas, service, etc. It was felt this should go to Committee for study since Village might ask for bids on combined requirements of Village.

BARRINGTON MEADOWS - ORIGINAL LOTS 1-2-3-Harry Johnson: President Blanke noted that Plan Commission informally considered lot division acceptable as presented; ordinance deemed necessary; easement necessary for private sewer; stated no public hearing is necessary. Trustee Long asked if sidewalk is built on E. Main St. should an allowance be made at this time? Attorney agreed this a good time to consider matter. Discussion followed; blueprints checked. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that we concur with the recommendations of Plan Commission in the revision of these 3 lots into 4 parcels west of Wesley and Sharon Drive - original lots 1-2&3 in Block 1, per plats submitted. Seconded by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz. In further discussion it was stated 1 permit could be issued at this time. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to advise Attorney to draw necessary ordinance to cover re-division of above mentioned parcel. Seconded by Trustee Shultz. Ayes. (letter to come in from Plan Commission on above)

CANVASS OF VOTES CAST IN ELECTION HELD APRIL 16, 1963: The Village Clerk reported that election officials had delivered to her the returns and ballot bags in proper condition. Upon canvass it was noted a correction was necessary in tabulation of ballots returned unused from precinct 2. (Correction ordered & later made). Resolution read. MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Resolution showing that 3 Trustees were elected as follows: David R. Capulli; Robert F. McCaw; J. Frank Wyatt. Also, that 2 Directors of Library Board were elected as follows: Catherine M. Sturtevant and Robert A. Colburn, be adopted. Seconded by Trustee DeBolt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, DeBolt, Long, Shultz. (Copy of Resolution filed with these minutes.) OATHS OF OFFICE: administered by Justice of Peace Arthur J. Haggenjos; President Blanke presented Trustee badge of office to J. Frank Wyatt; Trustee DeBolt retired and Trustee Wyatt was seated. President Blanke made Committee Appointments and assured the Board of Trustees he will cooperate with all members and committees to the best of his ability. List of Committees made part of these minutes.

COMMITTEE OF WHOLE MEETING suggested for May 6th - dinner meeting.

Gentlemen:

On Wednesday, April 24, 1963 the Barrington Plan Commission held a public hearing on the petition of Spencer E. Rieke for rezoning from R-10, multiple family dwelling district to an M-2, manufacturing district, of the following property:

Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 in Block 1 and Lots 1 to 11, inclusive, in Block 2 in the Kainer Block, a Sub-division of the North 10 Acres of the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 Section 35, Township 43 North, Range 9 East of the 3rd Principal Meridian, in Lake County, Illinois.

After due consideration of the petition and testimony presented, the Commission recommends that the following changes in zoning be granted:

Lots 1 to 11 in Block 2 (Property between Cummor and Home Avenues facing Northwest Highway) be rezoned from R-10, multiple family to M-2, manufacturing district.

Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 in Block 1 (Triangular property on West side of Cummor Avenue) be rezoned from R-10, multiple family to B-3, Business services and wholesale district.

On Wednesday, April 24, 1963 the Barrington Plan Commission held a public hearing on the petition of Dr. N. DeArmas Knudsen for rezoning from R-9, two family dwelling district to B-1, business district, limited retail, of the following described property:

The South 60 feet of Lot 3 in Block 4 in the Village of Barrington, in the Northeast quarter of the Northwest quarter of Section 11, Town 42, North, Range 9 East of the 3rd Principal Meridian, in Cook County, Illinois.

After due consideration of the petition it is the opinion of this Commission that this petition be denied. Gentlemen:

On April 10, 1963, we wrote to Cuba Electric requesting that they provide us with the amount of sales tax that had been included in the contract for referenced project, with copies to President Blanke and Chairman Long. 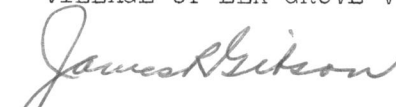

Dear Mr. Dutelle:

We wish to express our concern regarding the directive we received (copy attached) from Mr. Marshall Suloway.

It is our opinion that this directive imposes a needless hardship upon our Village and that it could, under certain circumstances, increase our costs.

We are in complete agreement with the wisdom and necessity of obtaining bids and quotations on what might be termed major expenditures. However, we point out that if a maintenance program required two items, one of \$950 and the second of \$55, the directive requires bids or quotations for both.

The low bidder on the \$55 item could be twenty miles away, and the seven cents per mile adjustment permitted is far less than would be the labor, gas and wear and tear costs of our sending a truck to pick up the item.

In addition, the preparation and securing approval of bid forms of small items creates a needless delay in completing the necessary work.

We urgently recommend that municipalities be permitted to purchase items of \$200 or less without meeting the requirements specified in the directive. If it were considered necessary, such items could be shown in the proposal, but on a "memo" basis only.

We believe the wisdom and justification of our recommendation is borne out by the fact that to the best of our knowledge, few municipalities require bids for items of \$200 or less for expenditures from corporate funds.

Gentlemen:

The MUNICIPAL ESTIMATE OF MAINTENANCE COSTS, submitted with the MFT maintenance appropriation, must be accompanied with a material proposal (forms BLR 278 & 288) to provide for receiving bids or quotations on all materials listed in the estimate. In the past, this District has checked the material proposal to know that the major material items were included, but we have been cautioned by our central office in Springfield of the need for a more complete call for bids. I am therefore writing this letter to clarify the Department's position with particular emphasis concerning the \$200.00 limitation on "over the counter" material purchases.

It is the intent of the law that all materials be purchased at the best price that can be obtained for materials meeting the specifications. It is the contention of the Department that "over the counter" purchases up to \$200.00 was not intended as a means of circumventing the intent of the law, but merely as a means of allowing the purchase of very small quantities of material or to buy materials which are needed on an emergency basis and for which there is not time to get quotations or advertise for bids. It is therefore felt that, except for very small quantities and for emergency purchases, bids should always be taken and that in no instance should a material item be left out of the proposal merely because it is estimated to cost \$200.00 or less.

It is not the wish of the Department to insist on the receipt of bids when only one item of material, estimated to cost less than \$200.00, is to be purchased; however, if there are two or more items, either formal bids (form BLR 287 and 288) or quotations (form M-1012) should be obtained. For materials whose total cost is estimated in excess of \$1,000.00, it is mandatory that formal bids be received, but quotations can be received if the cost is less than \$1,000.00. A supply of the above mentioned forms are available in the District Office.

Dear Miss Pinkerman:

Your letter of April 11, 1963, on these intersections has been received. A vehicle volume count for the Illinois 59 and 63 - Hough Street and Hillside Avenue intersection was made in July, 1961, and a copy is attached. At the time of the count this intersection did not show sufficient cross street traffic to justify traffic signals on the basis of minimum vehicular volume. No information is available in our files on the other intersection.

Your letter referred to the possible installation of "hand controlled traffic lights at these school crossings". If you were referring to the old Illinois Standard School Crossing Beacon (signal), with two section heads showing flashing yellow and flashing red to the principle street only, and controlled by pedestrian push buttons, I must inform you that a recent ruling by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Public Roads prohibits the installation of this type of signal on Federal Aid highways, and Ill. 59 and 63 - Hough Street at these two intersections is Illinois Federal Aid Route 23.

However, it is believed that standard full vehicle and pedestrian actuated traffic control signals with pedestrian indicators may be installed if the following minimum volumes, given in the national Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways are met at these two school crossing intersections.

1. Pedestrian crossing volumes at a designated school crossing on the major street exceed 250 pedestrians in each of 2 hours; and
2. During each of the same 2 hours vehicular traffic through the designated school crossing exceeds 800 vehicles; and
3. There is no traffic signal within 1,000 feet of the crossing.

By copy of this letter to Mr. M. K. Lingle, State Engineer of Traffic, in Springfield, this office is requesting confirmation of the above.

It would be appreciated if you would send us schedules of the times school children are crossing Ill. 59 and 63- Hough Street at these two intersections before our traffic counts are scheduled. In this way, it will be assured that our counting period will include the peak pedestrian movements at the intersections. You will be sent a copy of the results of our traffic counts when they have been completed.
