

MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT & BOARD OF TRUSTEES  
APRIL 27, 1964.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER by President John H. D. Blanke. Present at roll call were Trustees: Robert F. McCaw; Paul J. Shultz; J. Frank Wyatt; Frederick J. Voss. Trustee Long arrived immediately after roll call. Also present: May L. Pinkerman, Village Clerk; B. J. Zelsdorf, Treasurer; Byron S. Matthews, Attorney.

INVOCATION by Rev. Arthur M. Knudsen, Lutheran Church of the Atonement.

MINUTES OF APRIL 13, 1964, approved on MOTION by Trustee Voss, 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes. Trustee McCaw refrained from voting due to absence that date.

INQUIRIES FROM AUDIENCE INVITED: No response heard.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY MAP: President distributed copies to Trustees & briefed on peat-marsh areas.

PUBLIC HEARINGS (3) to be held by Plan Commission 5-6-64 at 8 PM; Council Chambers.

3rd MUNICIPAL COURT DIST. meeting 5-14-64 Circuit Court, Courtroom, Niles, 8 PM.

ANNUAL SALARY SURVEY BY ILL. MUN. LEAGUE: 1 copy received & filed with Treasurer.

BARRINGTON PUBLIC LIBRARY PROPOSED BUDGET passed 4-6-64 received. Treasurer asked to make comparative report and Library budget to be considered with Village budget.

LAKE COUNTY MUN. LEAGUE meeting in Zion 5-21-64.

LAKE COUNTY REAL ESTATE TAX BILLS not to be out until Sept. of Oct. this year.

LAKE COUNTY PLANNING NOTES for April '64 received; available copies distributed.

N.W. MUN. CONFERENCE meeting 5-20-64-Palatine; (new Police & Fire bldg. ready.)

ILL. MUN. LEAGUE NEWSLETTER 64-4 received & filed with Village Clerk.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CONF. Peoria, Pere Marquette Hotel, 9.30AM to 4.15PM, 5-13-64.

Chambers of Commerce & Municipal Officials invited. President to attend.

CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE & COMMITTEE OF WHOLE met 4-18-64; report not yet ready.

ST. JUDE'S RESEARCH HOSPITAL FUND DRIVE: asked for reconsideration of their request. Trustee Long reported the BAUFDC committee just completed its most successful fund-raising year to date; after discussion Village Clerk asked to inform St. Jude's representative that Village stands firm on previous decision. (invited to join BAUF)

PROPOSED MOVING OF A RESIDENCE: Structural Engineers of CT&A stated more time needed for study of peat, etc. area; Trustee Long questioned who will pay for study? Trustee Wyatt suggested letter go to Engineers stating report desired for next Board meeting.

CONSTITUTIONAL HOME RULE-LONG RANGE PLAN-NW MUN. CONF.: President reported on Resolution adopted at last meeting of NWMun. Conf. & it was suggested that copies be presented to all member Boards for possible adoption of similar form. Trustee Voss read from copy and Trustee Wyatt felt there are other sides to this question making MOTION that copies of all information be distributed to Trustees by Clerk, 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK & TRUST CO. OF BARRINGTON 4-15-64 Statement passed to files.

COMMUNITY CHURCH SET BACK ORD.: Attorney B. Matthews reported it would be in next mtg.

JUNE TERRACE CURB & GUTTER: Copies of Agreement provided by Attorney C. Canby on behalf of residents on June Terr. requesting installation of combined C&G and a proposal from Eppers Improvem. Co. of \$2.20 pr. fr. ft. received. President briefed request of petitioners for Board approval of project. Agreement read by Treasurer. It was noted entire June Terr., except narrow corridor being considered; it was noted Village MFT funds would pay for blacktopping from Rte 14 to North Ave. -

-corrected to "sealcoating" & not blacktopping. Trustee Wyatt questioned item #3 Page 3. Supt. Public Works noted "alley" not included in MFT current program since it is presently concrete. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Village adopt this Agreement with deletion in Par. 3 Page 3 by placing period after "improvements" and ending paragraph there, deleting "and shall, in addition, surface June Terrace without additional cost to First Parties." Bonds discussed. Trustee Wyatt questioned who bears engineering cost? Was advised that Village has from time to time. Second to Motion by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

MOTION by Trustee McCaw that Engineers set line grade after sufficient funds in escrow with Treasurer, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

CONTROL OF AIR POLLUTION: copy of Public Law to Trustee McCaw for study.

23CSMFT PAVING IMPROVEM: copy of plans and proposal received. President noted Village Clerk should be authorized to publish Notice to Bidders as soon as State Highway Dept. has approved P/S. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that the Village Clerk publish Notice to Bidders concerning MFT23CS CT&A No. 64-050 upon receipt of approval of plans and proposal from State Highway Dept. 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

LARGE FRAMED ZONING MAP: President noted that Evert Kincaid & Assoc. authorized to update this map last year, however, since Zoning Ordinance is now being updated, all of the items could be included in the map. President has discussed this with Planner; draft of base map submitted and 12 corrections sent to Planner by President; it was felt he should update Zoning map with additions for the last year and hold base map until later in the year. Planner's bill for services rendered explained by President & it will go on next list for payment. Upon being questioned Attorney B. Matthews stated he recommends public hearing on redrafted Zoning Ordinance.

BILLS: MOTION by Trustee Long that bills be paid from Funds indicated, seconded by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

NOTICE TO BOND BIDDERS (WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS): Copy submitted by Attorney & President recommended that Attorney be authorized to have same published in a bond magazine. Discussion had on notice; bids to be received until 8 PM CDST 5-11-64. MOTION by Trustee Long that the Village Clerk be authorized to publish Notice of Sale of \$220,000. Village of Barrington Waterworks & Sewage Revenue Bonds, Series of 1964 and that bids are to be received at the Village Hall up until 8 PM Monday May 11, 1964; notice to be published in the Bond Buyer. 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Chairman will deliver copy to Attorney Tues. AM. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

DIV. B-AWARD OF CONTRACT RESOLUTION #201: President reported contracts in proper form and ready for signatures of President & Village Clerk. Treasurer read Resolution covering awarding of Contract to W. F. Fitzsimmons & Co. Inc. of Arlington Heights, with total base bid of \$189,642. MOTION by Trustee Voss to adopt Resolution as read. 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss.

DIV. C\_AWARD OF CONTRACT RESOLUTION #202: Treasurer read Resolution covering awarding of Contract to Gluth Bros. of Woodstock, Ill. with total base bid of \$93,465. MOTION by Trustee Voss to approve and adopt Resolution as read, 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss. It was noted that all remaining bid checks will be returned to contractors.

EASTERN AVE. CONNECTION CHARGES: Ordinance drawn by Attorney for repayment to the Village of certain sums expended on Div. C before building permits given for certain lots on Eastern Ave. between Warwick & Northwest Highway. President briefed on how figure arrived at, suggesting matter be studied by Committee. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt

that this Ordinance go to Water Committee for study; 2nd by Trustee Long. Ayes. President to meet with Committee on this.

F. BERGHORN BILL: Mr. Berghorn submitted bill to Village for rodding sewer & cleaning bill - briefed by Trustee McCaw. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that this be referred to Sewer & Water Committee. Supt. Johanesen stated Village not called in on this. Trustee McCaw stated this is second time this resident has had problem and Rieke informed him that roots were out beyond property line; Mr. Berghorn feels Village should pay bill, it was reported. Trustee Wyatt suggested this go to Committee for study as to liability, etc. Copy of Rieke bill, etc. to go to Trustee Voss for recommendation at next meeting.

STORM WATER DRAINAGE CORRECTIONS-PROJECT #1: copies of a plan by President distributed to Trustees. Trustee Voss noted CT&A not yet ready to begin flow test, etc. President stated certain illegal connections are known and corrections must be made - use smoke test system. Supt. Johanesen spoke on illegal connections and infiltration particularly a job done last week on W. Station St. where men went down 17½ ft, finding a foot opening between sub and street without base, from one side to another, briefing also on type of tile found. President noted this is a difficult subject and briefed history of area. Supt. will investigate any area known by President. Trustee Voss reminded that it was agreed to do this under Engineers aid to map out sewer system, area by area, feeling an orderly program should be followed. President urged that Project #1 be followed, these are obvious matters and will be corrected by Superintendent. Johanesen.

JEWEL PARK LIGHT REPAIRS: Supt. Johanesen reported on meeting with Trustees Wyatt & Voss with Mr. Ahlgrim on site. It was noted it looks now as tho there will be considerable savings to Village due to method being used by Contractor - lights should be on in a few weeks. Reason why temporary connections not made was explained.

PARKING LOTS: Supt. Johanesen reported tile now on hand and drainage problem in Lot #2 and holes in Lot #1 will be taken care of. Repaving & meters, etc. questioned by Trustee Shultz. Trustee McCaw stated he would be glad to reopen this matter again giving figures which he felt should be rechecked; Lot 2 - 85 dual head meters and 4 single head meters previously considered with 53 additional wheelstops at total cost of around \$9000. He felt matter should be disposed of one way or other. Trustee Wyatt said he thought meters should be authorized for Lot #2 & Turntable area should be placed in condition to be used as part of Lot #2 - that meters be installed there and, if this is done, that rate be increased to 35¢ per day in Lots 2 & 3. Trustee Shultz reminded it was decided not to widen #2 but to use what land we have and install meters, the cost need not be immediate or there is a 5% discount for cash. During discussion Trustee Voss suggested hiring temporary help and having work done by Village Department. Trustee McCaw will discuss this with Chief of Police & Supt. Public Works before next meeting. Discussion had on contacting Railway again as to platform improvements, etc.

FEASIBILITY & ARCHITECT SELECTION COMMITTEE REPORT: Trustee Voss reported that Committee recommends that architect selected be a local man and that he should be directed to work with Kincaid and that together they work on feasibility of whether area presently being considered is right and, if so, what can be done. President noted that Kincaid & Assoc. are planners and not engineers. If area found suitable they type of building studied. We pay Kincaid a monthly retainer. President asked for this report in writing from Chairman. Trustee Long advised we must be careful in use of Planner and preliminary expenses involved. President reported that when he consults with Planner Village is charged and it works differently with Attorney and Engineers. Trustee McCaw reminded he has previously expressed himself and is opposed to just designing a building, preferring to have experts study growth pattern, etc. Fire Dept. being Volunteer must be considered, as to location. Trustee Voss

said he would get figure estimates and this was just presenting the philosophy of the appointed Committee.

GLENDALE AVE. ADD'N TO WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM: President reported Engineers will draw up supplemental contract to cover this.

WALTON ST. WATERMAIN - BEINHOFF: Trustee Voss reported Mr. Beinhoff has verbally requested information, asking if this could be included in present project and made subject to connection charges? President noted Glendale was requested in time for plans but Walton St. job would need letter to Engineers asking if it could be included in "C" , which he will write.

VILLAGE MANAGER: Trustee Wyatt noted that several months ago discussion had on this; Attorney has been contacted on various types of ordinances; that, with no reflection intended on the President or any Trustee, he felt Village should be run like any business, with a Chief Executive, and that by putting in a manager the President would have more time and supply more effective methods whereby he and the Trustees can run Village. It was proposed that an amount be placed in budget to cover salary of a manager and that Attorneys be directed to place before Board at first meeting in May an ordinance similar to the one of Deerfield, with exception that such manager would be appointed by President and members of Board of Trustees voting jointly; Board to set the policies. Trustee McCaw stated a manager could handle day to day administration of Village, Police, Fire & Public Works Depts. and bids and analysis of same, bringing them to Board for action, which duties are now being done by a number of people, feeling this would not affect our present system, but would relieve the Trustees of the administrative work now necessary. Trustee Voss felt Board should set policies and plan for future development of the community. With less administrative work it was felt the President & Board would be better able to study and provide for future growth as a Board of Directors. President Blanke stated he felt the offices of the Village Clerk, Village Hall, Police Dept. being well handled and details worked out. Trustee Shultz said he felt a manager could relieve the President of a lot of detail work he is now doing and in case he could not perform same there would be a back up team. President Blanke stated that if a manager comes in he would move out to which Trustee Wyatt replied he had nothing but praise for the Village employees, this should not affect anyone of the Village and this is all meant not to be a criticism of anyone with the Village. It was stated that 4 out of 14 member Villages of the NW Conference have managers. Trustee Long stated having a Village manager is a modern technique and way of handling Village business and asked President Blanke not to take this matter personally. If Village engages a manager it should be a compliment to the President & his devoted work for the Village, -Tr.Voss.

MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that the Finance Committee be and is hereby directed to include in the budget for the fiscal year 5-1-64 thru 4-30-65 an amount to be determined by said Committee to cover salary of a Village Manager, seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes:McCaw,Long,Shultz,Wyatt,Voss.

MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Village Attorneys be and are hereby directed to prepare and submit to the Village Board at first meeting in May an ordinance creating office of Village Manager and set forth duties, such ordinance to be similar in form to Deerfield, which has been furnished Trustees for study, except that the Village Manager here would be appointed by President and members of Board voting jointly. Seconded by Trustee Voss. Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss. MOTION by Trustee Voss that Attorneys work closely with Trustee Wyatt in preparation of this ordinance, seconded by Trustee Shultz. WITHDRAWN.

SIGN ORDINANCE: Attorney advised Trustee Shultz his office will endeavor to have copies to Trustees prior to next meeting.

TRUSTEE SHULTZ briefed on several items on which bids have been requested for general maintenance, including painting of Village Hall; removal of frame tower and steel tower for rear of Hall, etc. Since only few bids received they will be held until next meeting. IN THE CIVIL DEFENSE FILES, now in hands of Chief of Police, is some data on Sirens on which a study was made by Chief and Coordinator. President suggested perhaps this could be incorporated in plans for proposed Police & Fire building.

APPROPRIATION: Trustee Long reminded each Committee Chairman and Dept. Head that departmental budget proposals for next fiscal year should be submitted to Treasurer prior to May 15th.

HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION: Trustee Long suggested Committee of Whole meeting to consider names submitted and other matters for this Commission - tentatively May 18th.

STREET LIGHT-PRAIRIE & HILLSIDE AVES.: Trustee McCaw suggested survey with idea to having high lumen intensity light installed, recommending same to Street Committee. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Village Clerk direct letter to Public Service Co. on this matter, seconded by Trustee Long. Ayes. (study & report requested for Board from P.S.Co.)

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR: President noted that since resignation of JJJoswick as of April 1st. Chief of Police is handling files and business until new appointment made. Chief Muscarello stated this is a vital time in Civil Defense, urging that Village make appointment at earliest possible date in order to maintain Village standing in C.D.

HOUGH ST. SCHOOL EMERGENCY CONTINUES: It was stated since pupils are to be transported to Grove Ave. & Roslyn Rd. Schools the traffic pattern has been changed - suggestion made that the Hough-Hillside light matter be reactivated. Chief will again contact State on this. Discussion also had on a 35 mph sign in area.

VILLAGE MANAGER cont'd: Trustee Voss suggested that at the Committee of Whole meeting tentatively set for May 18th Village Managers from other areas be invited to visit and explain how they operate in their Villages and perhaps the staff of the Village Hall should sit in at such a meeting. He will check on a speaker for the meeting - possibly from Deerfield.

MEETING ADJOURNED on motion by Trustee McCaw, seconded by Trustee Wyatt,

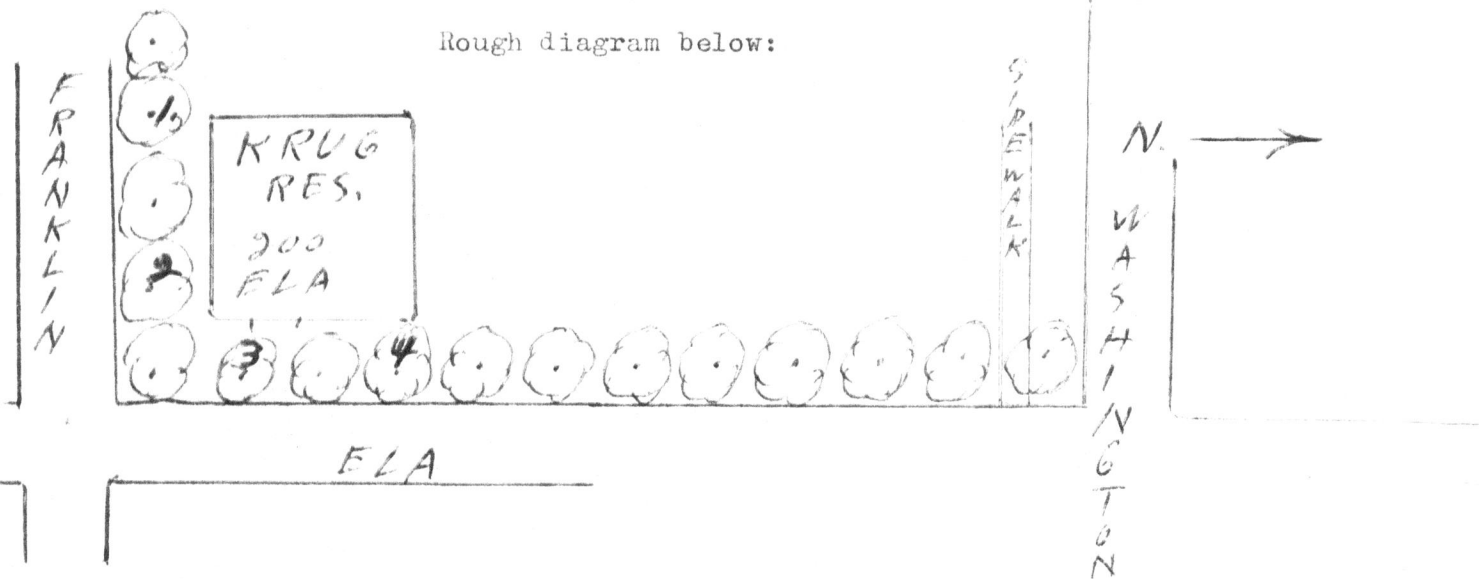

Dear Mr. Johannesen:

In regard to Mr. Krug's March 23rd letter, I looked at the elm trees in question. They certainly are very large with a distance of only 15 feet between them. I would suggest removing every other tree rather than having the crowded crowns thinned and trimmed which would cost about \$ 250.



The estimated price to remove these 4 elms would be \$ 75 each or a total of \$ 300. Mr. Dale Hendee agrees that, if anything were to be done to rectify Mr. Krug's problem, the removal of every other elm would be the most satisfactory solution.

There are also 8 crowded elms north of the 8 which border the Krug residence. To remove every other elm of this group would also be beneficial to the remaining elms.

Subject: Residential Street Maintenance

Gentlemen:

There are a number of beautiful but very tall and closely spaced trees bordering our entire corner lot. The trees along the streets appear to be public property. I wish to submit my request to have these trees either pruned or thinned out in the crown, or a few of them eliminated entirely for the following reasons:

1. They represent a constant hazard due to their enormous height and age to house and its occupants, property and people using the side walks in case of falling branches or should trees getting uprooted in case of storms.
2. Although we would like to enjoy a certain amount of shade in the summer the very closely spaced trees allow no sun light to penetrate and they allow no proper ventilation of the house through the roof which causes the second story bedrooms and attic to smell musty and appear damp. Under these conditions the life of the roof will be shortened considerably. Besides, a tremendous amount of leaves clog up the eaves and gutters of the house.

This time of the year should be excellent to remedy the situation, so please have a qualified person come and check the condition and location of the trees. We shall appreciate your conscientious consideration in this matter.

general taxes to general fund: 1958 \$42,800, 1959 \$49,500, 1960 \$67,700, 1961 \$63,300, 1962 \$68,200, 1963 \$76,100.  
street lighting (excludes ornamental lights): 1958 \$3,800, 1959 \$4,100, 1960 \$4,200, 1961 \$4,300, 1962 \$5,900, 1963, \$11,500.  
Note: appropriation ordinance passed July 8, 1963 for fiscal year starting May 1, 1963 allows \$92,000 for salaries in police department, \$15,000 for street lights; salaries and wages were increased ten percent above those of previous year. Police pay into police pension fund. Other employees are afforded social security coverage and hospitalization plus life insurance policy.  
Most dollar figures given above are rounded numbers; for full accurate figures refer to village records.

Gentlemen:

In compliance with the Board's desire, we have obtained from Scherf House Movers, 300 Dundee Avenue, Barrington, Illinois, a sketch of the dolly arrangement to move a 45-ton residence from the southeast corner of Grove Avenue and Lincoln Avenue south on Grove to Russell, east on Russell to Summit, and south on Summit to a point approximately 200 feet south of its intersection with Russell. Our structural engineers have analyzed the resulting stresses to the pavement and the underground installations under the pavement over which the load is to be moved.

In our opinion, it is unlikely that the house moving operation would result in any damage to the underground installations, provided it is done in a careful manner by an experienced mover, although we do not have at our disposal necessary information on the elevation of all underground installations to establish the precise amount of stresses to any given stratum below the pavement elevation.

In reply to your specific question in regard to the amount of bond, as far as damage to the pavement is concerned, it is our opinion that the amount of escrow or bond be based on potential damage to the pavement requiring 1-1/2 inch bituminous resurfacing over the entire length of street between curbs. On this basis, we recommend the establishment of bond or escrow arrangement in the amount of \$3,000. ✓



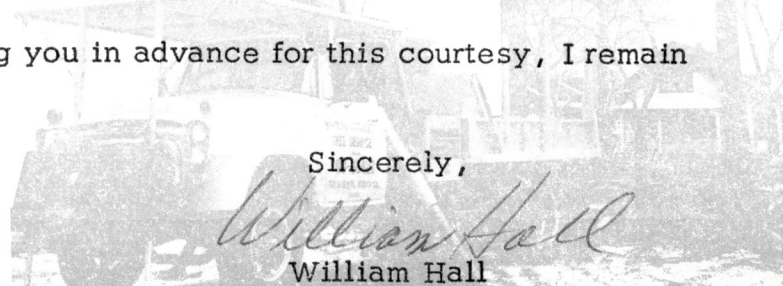
