JULY 27, 1964.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER by President John H. D. Blanke. At roll call Trustees present: David R. Capulli, Robert F. McCaw, Robert J. Long, Paul J. Shultz, J. Frank Wyatt. Also present: May L. Pinkerman, Village Clerk; B.J. Zelsdorf, Treas.; B.S. Matthews, Atty.

MINUTES 7-13-64 approved on MOTION by Trustee Capulli, 2nd by Trustee McCaw; Ayes. Trustee Shultz refrained from voting due to absence that meeting.

COMMENTS FROM AUDIENCE INVITED: No response heard.

BEINHORR WATERMAIN WALTON ST.: Copy contract Beinhoff-Gluth Bros. received & filed.

JEWEL PARK ELM RD. LIGHT RPRS: Several statements, payment estimate (1 copy), 2 waivers of lien & letter received from Cuba Elec. President noted Estimate not signed by Mr. Ahlgrim or Village Engineers; he recommended all papers be referred to Engineers requesting report back to Board and return of papers to Village when properly executed. Concurred in by Trustee Wyatt. 2nd Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes.

ZONING ORDINANCE: Attorney's statement in connection with setback regulations in residence districts received & copies distributed to holders of copies of proposed ordinance.

TRAFFIC DIV. ILL DEPT. H'WYS: Their letter of 7-20-64 to all Police Authorities requests copies of all accident reports now submitted to State Police also to be furnished Traffic Safety Dept.; will entail additional work in Police Depts. Accidents to be reported to nearest Police authority by drivers as well as to State H'wy Dept. for accidents resulting in death, injury or damage to property in excess of \$100.

APPROPRIATION ORD. #849: President's letter to Board of 7-25-64 read requesting reconsideration of ordinance passed 7-13-64, suggesting addition of preamble & closing section. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Appropriation Ord. for fiscal year 5-1-64 to 4-30-65 be reconsidered, seconded by Trustee Long. Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. MOTION by Trustee Long to adopt Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year 5-1-64 thru 4-30-65 as passed 7-13-64 with the following changes: "The annual appropriation ordinance for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1964 and ending April 30, 1965, Be it Ordained by the President & Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook & Lake Counties, Illinois: That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be, and the same are hereby appropriated for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1964, and ending April 30, 1965, to the several Municipal purposes following:" And, on Page 6 to be modified with the addition of Section 27: "This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication, as provided by law." Second by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. Trustee Wyatt asked if this is in proper legal form and after short discussion MOTION by Trustee Long that the motion adopting Appropriation Ordinance for fiscal year 5-1-64 thru 4-30-65 be reconsidered. 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

MOTION by Trustee Long to adopt the Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year 5-1-64 thru 4-30-65 as adopted with the following changes and additions to read as follows: "An Ordinance making Appropriation to defray the expenses of the Village of Barrington, Cook & Lake Counties, Illinois, designated the "Annual Appropriation Ordinance" for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1964 and ending April 30, 1965. Be it ordained by the President & Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook & Lake Counties, Illinois: That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be, and the same are hereby appropriated for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 1964, and ending April 30, 1965, to the several municipal purposes following." And, that Page 6 be modified with the following additions: Section 27: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication, as provided by law." 2nd by Trustee Capulli. It was questioned if this is now in proper form and

Attorney advised "Yes". Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. Trustee Wyatt suggested that Appropriation Ordinance for next year be passed in June instead of July because of technical problems that come up. President noted that in 30 years to his knowledge this is the first time there has been such a difficulty. (#849)

BARRINGTON CAB (Mr. Jake Smit): Mr. Smit in process of purchasing business of late Victor Toynton & by letter asked consideration of ½ yr. fee. Chief of Police stated Toynton insurance runs out 7-31-64 & he requests Toynton cabs be removed from streets at that time. Mr. Smit expects to have 2 cabs fully legal by Aug. 1st and to have a 24 hr. service. Chief Muscarello stated they have received fine cooperation from Mr. Smit when operating out of Lake Zurich. MOTION by Trustee McCaw that we grant ½ yr license to Jake N. Smit on 3 cabs that he is seeking. Trustee Long was advised licenses are not transferable under present ordinance. Second by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

STATE OF ILLINOIS Audit Report #28 on MFT FUNDS for 1963 received, containing compliment on Treasurer Zelsdorf's fine record keeping. To files.

LAKE COUNTY PLANNING NOTES for July 1964 - 3 copies distributed by President.

FIRE SIREN TOWER: ENGINEERS letter of 7-14-64 noted, recommending placing tower on proposed Fire & Police Bldg.; Copies of letter to Trustees Capulli & Shultz also Mr. Millin, Arch. & matter discussed at recent committee meeting.

ORDINANCE regulating "No Parking" on W. Main St. between EJ&E tracks and Raymond Ave. read. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to adopt 2nd by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. #850.

COMMITTEE MEETING called by President for 7-29-64 at 8 PM on Tax sources for local taxing bodies. 65 invitations sent to area groups.

PICKWICK PLACE: Plan changes for utility purposes requested for watermain & Sewer main connection points; drawn by Mr. Westerberg and on 7-17-64 approved by Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to concur in recommendations of our Engineers, 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

REVISED PLAT OF PICKWICK PLACE: 1 copy received and letter of 7-17-64 notes recording numbers for various documents. President suggested Village Clerk request additional copies of final & recorded plat for Village use and files.

POLICE & FIRE STATION PROGRESS REPORT: Committee Meeting called by Trustee Voss & held last Friday with Architect, Chiefs of Police & Fire Depts. and others present. A number of items need action per President: 2 lots zoned residential - Special Use Permit required & President suggested requesting Plan Commission to hold public hearing. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Plan Commission be directed to set date for public hearing for rezoning for Special Use the 2 lots owned by Village on W. Station St. Second by Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

PROPERTY SURVEY: MOTION by Trustee Capulli that Village Clerk be directed to write Surveyor to make up to date Plat of Survey and set permanent stakes on W. Station St. property, 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes. 5

SOIL BORINGS: MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Architect be authorized to have/soil borings made on W. Station St. property at cost not to exceed \$600. 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

CONTRACT WITH ARCHITECT: President noted award of contract was discussed in Committee & copy of standard form contract passed to Trustee Capulli for study. Proposed cost of building about \$184,000. Trustee Capulli not yet ready to make recommendation - letter with contract addressed to Trustee Voss who was absent tonight & document about 6 pages long. Deferred until later in meeting & Attorney to review.

FINANCING: needs special consideration. Noted that at last meeting Trustee Capulli suggested a plan to recoup and reimburse General Fund on which President briefed further.

STATION ST. WIDENING: from Hough to west of Station St. property. Committee felt Engineers should probably be directed to prepare plans to be activated next Spring. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that President be authorized to contact Engineers with respect to requesting them to make report as to what has to be done to accomplish this. 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Ayes. It was noted presumed this will come from MFT Funds.

AUDIT REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 5-1-64 thru 4-30-65 completed by Putta & Kelsey - copies distributed. Treasurer will call them to arrange to go over audit with Board at perhaps next regular meeting. Summary of expenditures for last fiscal years also prepared by Auditors. Trustee Wyatt noted it is customary for Auditors to submit confidential memos on improvements or criticisms - Trustee Long added that because of our methods of record keeping they do not have many further recommendations. Statement also prepared in connection with the \$220,000. Bond Issue - copy to Bond file.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK & TRUST CO. statement received and passed to files.

FACE BRICK SAMPLE for NEW PUMP STATION: received with letter from Engineers. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Board concur in recommendations of Village Engineers, 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

REMOTE READING DEVICES FOR WATER METERS: Ordinance read. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt to adopt, 2nd by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. #851.

D.E.D. TREES: Trustee Wyatt reported that Supt. Public Works & Roth Landscape are having excellent results since last Board meeting in getting diseased elm trees removed, feeling most will be removed at this time. Letter from Attorney received.

SKYWALK: Attorney Braithwaite had received letter from Skywalk Corp. in connection with contemplated school to be erected on Eastern Ave. & pedestrian crossing of RR tracks and Rte. 14. Copies for future consideration of Trustees distributed.

EASTERN AVE. IMPROVEMENTS: Engineers letter of 7-13-64 estimates 28' back to back pavement width under special assessments would cost approx. \$80,000. & if to include sidewalks both sides estimated at about \$95,000. Copy of letter to Trustees. Method of procedure discussed - petition usually presented tho' Attorney stated that not necessary. Trustee Shultz felt Village should move ahead & placement of overpass discussed. President & Trustee Voss recently met with School Board where this was discussed along with improvement of roadway, also revamping of Hillside & Rte. 14 intersection. When school asks for annexation it was noted they should dedicate a 30' strip for roadway for an 80' street. Trustee Shultz suggested Engineers send letter setting forth recommendations on how to proceed on project as to cost, etc. Their estimate is for a 28' back to back and he felt it should be wider. Trustee Capulli suggested 40' for a certain distance. MOTION by Trustee Shultz that the Village Clerk be directed to write engineers requesting their recommendations concerning engineering work to be done on the improvement of Eastern Ave. with respect to the width of street for heavy traffic load type of pavement, estimated cost of improvements and let us have some idea as to how long it would take to accomplish engineering work for such an improvement. Also, what type special assessment suggested; school scheduled for operation Sept. 1965. Mr. Mandernach is reportedly concerned about saving trees on edge of his property. 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

TREE COMPLAINT: received from W. A. Sommerfield, 147 N. Hager Ave. re 2 Chinese Elms. For the record, President stated trees damaged inadvertently when watermain work done. Mr. Roth has doctored trees & it is hoped no permanent damage will ensue. Village Clerk asked to acknowledge letter.

BILLS: After explanation of several bills MOTION by Trustee Long that bills be paid from Funds indicated. 2nd by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

VILLAGE MECHANIC: Chief of Police & Supt. Public Works to check further into possibility of Public Works mechanic working on Police Dept. cars - savings to Village.

OFFICER DETERT REINSTATEMENT: to Police Pension Fund discussed by Trustee McCaw. Meeting held July 19th by Police Pension Fund Board which voted to reinstate Officer Fred A. Detert to Police Pension Fund provided he will reimburse \$1600. he withdrew plus 2% for time he was away. MOTION by Trustee McCaw that Officer Detert be reinstated on the terms recommended by Police Pension Fund Board. MOTION WITHDRAWN. He must appear before the Police Commission & Trustee Long suggested sending a letter in which Village recommends his reinstatement; Chief noted Off. Detert should appear before the Police Pension Fund Board and Fire & Police Commission. MOTION by Trustee McCaw that, in view of the actions of Police Pension Fund Board, a letter be prepared and sent to the Board of Fire & Police Commissioners that we concur in the recommendations of the Police Pension Fund Board to reinstate Off. Detert if their Board so elects. 2nd Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

PARKING LOT GATES: Chief Muscarello reported representative of Gate Co. out to survey & estimate due in soon.

PAINTERS INSURANCE POLICIES: MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Village Clerk be directed to return policies to Messrs. Pomeroy & Robinson deposited with Village in connection with interior & exterior painting of Village Hall. 2nd by Trustee Long. Ayes .
VILLAGE HALL NEW LOOK: Trustee Wyatt publicly acknowledged all compliments received on new paintjobs and improvements noting that plans were set afoot by Trustee Shultz, Chairman Building Committee. Agreed.

TYPEWRITER: President reported to Board he had recently purchased a new machine for use in his office.

TAX RATES & VALUATIONS CUBA TWSHP: Copies distributed by President.
DEFINITIONS APPLICABLE TO WATER & SEWER FACILITIES prepared & distributed by President.

OVERTIME PAY ON CONTRACTS B & C=also PICKWICK PLACE: discussed by President who noted \$2800. not yet deposited by Mr. Brough in escrow to cover inspections. Trustee Shultz asked if any of overtime caused by faulty installation by contractor under "B"?

BARRINGTON MEADOWS SUB. President briefed on Developers plans in 1963 to develop north end; Board approved certain restrictions and agreements to be entered into between Village & Developer. Mr. M. Joseph, Surveyor, has asked about status of job. President briefed on his resume of project; Mr. Carlson ready to develop &, if Board agrees, President will forward copy of his resume to Mr. Carlson.

RECESS

HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION: President expects to have his recommendations ready shortly.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTRACT: Contract checked by Attorney who stated same to be in good form; Millin letter to Trustee Voss read. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that Village President be authorized to sign contract where indicated "owner". 2nd by Trustee Wyatt. Trustee McCaw asked for discussion of signing contract with feeling abroad that not enough information has been given the public on an expenditure proposed of over \$180,000. That we are asking Plan Commission to hold public hearing - why not let public know more about project? By signing contract Village obligating itself for at least \$10,000. in fees. It was stated few people turn out to public hearings and felt by some other Trustees ample information has been in press to keep public abreast of stages of development with ultimate goal of new Fire & Police Bldg. on W. Station St. Trustee McCaw stated he is not fighting project but feels there are some who feel Village has other needs also. It was noted Public not being asked for a bond issue. It was noted that preliminary sketches already submitted to Committee meeting. President noted that thru the years Organizations used to have observers at Board meetings who reported back to their memberships. Trustee Wyatt stated that from time to time he has heard Clubs talk about parking and suggests that if this continues to come up the President advise them and request them to recommend to the Board where they want parking and if they want it and the Board wants it property can be condemned and parking lots made. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that the present motion and second be held for roll call until next regular meeting of Village Board. Second by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. President suggested that Chairman of Architectural Committee prepare, with assistance of Architect, a news release for the Press stating plans. President will consult with Chairman on this & present facts to Press.

TREE COMPLAINT: received from Paul Albert 800 S. Cook St. - that his hard maple had been killed by methoxychlor briefed by Trustee Wyatt. Mr. Roth stated the spray could not possibly have damaged the maple - there are hard maples all over town and none of the others show damage from methoxychlor; he sent samples to Urbana for study & report. Tree is dead and reportedly has been declining for 3 years. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Village Clerk write Mr. Albert advising him that thorough investigation has been

made of complaint and the results disclose that methoxychlor did not cause damage to his tree. If he has any additional facts which he wishes Board to consider they would be happy to receive and consider same. Second by Trustee McCaw. Ayes.

VILLAGE MANAGER: Trustee Wyatt complimented Village Clerk and her assistant on getting out copies of all applications for position of Manager and suggested that Trustees look over applications and be prepared for meeting of the 10th of August as to what next steps should be taken. **MOTION** by Trustee Wyatt that the Village Clerk be directed to send each applicant for Village Manager a short letter acknowledging receipt of his application and advising him his application has been referred to Village Board for consideration. Second by Trustee Long. Ayes.

HEALTH INSPECTOR REPORTS: Trustee Shultz noted our Inspector works in both Cook & Lake Counties and has for about 12 years, is paid for work and we should receive reports concerning his inspections of all places, including violations and disposition of cases that come to his attention, by himself or the Police Dept. or Board of Health. Matter raised at this time for Board consideration. Chief Muscarello stated Mr. DeJong will be requested to make such reports of his inspections if requested by Board; he works closely with Chief on complaints, disposition, etc. Trustee Shultz stated he has heard of certain violations and there are reports in Police files - how often does he check and recheck on certain establishments, particularly restaurants, etc. Chief stated reports not noted in Code or Ordinance. President also desires to know of all complaints. **MOTION** by Trustee Shultz that the Health Inspector file quarterly reports with the Village thru the Police Dept. in which all restaurants have been inspected quarterly, as well as other establishments dispensing food other than vending machines, and that these reports include violations and their disposition correcting violations. Second by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli,McCaw,Long,Shultz,Wyatt.

DeARMAS DRIVEWAY: Chief Muscarello reported he and Supt. Public Works checked premises last week finding facilities for 4 cars to park in back yard where they can turn around. Trustee Shultz feels she should write to Commission asking for a review of the matter by Zoning Board of Appeals, making her request to the Village Board which body will send it on to Zoning Board of Appeals. Chief Muscarello to contact her.

SPEED SIGN on Hough St. south of Hillside - it was suggested it be changed from 35 to 25 miles per hour by Trustee Shultz. Chief stated he has been asking for this for sometime. Also, there will have to be a light set up on Station & Hough Sts. Chief going to Elgin this week and will discuss these items also study of traffic at Hillside & Hough.

SQUADCAR PURCHASE: Car #553 has over 80M miles and costly in repairs. **MOTION** by Trustee McCaw that Village Clerk be authorized to advertize for bids, using specs prepared by Chief of Police and that we purchase as soon as bids are received. Second by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

MEETING ADJOURNED ON MOTION by Trustee Shultz, seconded by Trustee Wyatt at 10.30 PM. Ayes.


Honorable Trustees:

At the last meeting of the Village Board of Trustees, held July 13, 1964, a motion was made and passed by a vote of 5 to 0 "to adopt the Annual Appropriation Ordinance for fiscal year 5-1-64 as submitted." Said ordinance is identified by the Village Clerk as No. 849.

In reading said ordinance Wednesday, July 15, 1964, prior to the act of signing same, your Village President determined in making comparison with the appropriation ordinance passed the last previous fiscal year of the Village of Barrington, that Ordinance No. 849 is incomplete, there being no "preamble" or ordination clause included.

The Village President therefore suggests to Your Honorable Body that the Appropriation Ordinance as passed at the July 13, 1964 meeting be reconsidered at the meeting of July 27, 1964 and then repassed in proper legal form.

New Control for Elm Disease May Help Home Owners in '65

If Bidrin Test Here Is Successful, Sale to Some Tree Firms May Be Approved

Bidrin, trade name for a new chemical Dutch elm disease control, will be made available commercially next year if tests now underway in Milwaukee are successful.

"If we're going commercial with this, we're going next year," said Dr. Dale M. Norris, Madison, University of Wisconsin entomologist who first developed the Bidrin treatment.

Supplying the capsules in quantity will not be difficult, according to J. J. Mauget, head of the South El Monte (Calif.) firm that holds the patents on the injector capsules being used by the city forestry department.

Norris and Mauget were in Milwaukee last week to witness the start of the first large scale test of Bidrin. By the time the test ends Saturday, the city hopes to have injected between 40,000 and 45,000 elms with the chemical, a highly potent insecticide related to nerve gas. It kills elm beetles feeding on the bark before they can transmit a fungus infection that kills the trees.

In cases of severe overdose, some leaves may wither and drop off. However, the tree will recover fully within a month, Norris said.

Any overdose should be visible within two to four days after inoculation.

"Fringe Benefits" Cited

Some "fringe benefits" of Bidrin inoculation might be more important to some people than its prevention of Dutch elm disease, Norris suggested. The chemical kills most of the mites, aphids and other insects that feed on an elm.

"Even the trees that get an overdose should look better at the end of the summer than those that weren't treated," Norris said.

One of the nuisances that the Bidrin injections will eliminate, he has found, is the sticky substance secreted by aphids that live on the leaves. The substance, commonly believed to be the result of the elm "sweating," is difficult to remove from cars, outdoor furniture and clothing.

Other Controls Needed

The Bidrin shots will never replace sanitation, spraying or Vapam treatments in the control of Dutch elm disease, Norris said.

Spraying still is a useful tool to protect trees that cannot be protected with Bidrin, according to Norris. Destroying dead or diseased elm trees and elm wood also remains essential to limit the beetle population. And the few trees that will become infected under the best control system must be isolated from their neighbors with a soil fumigant to break any possible connection through their root systems.

Mowing of a newly sodded lawn starts within the second week. The blades of grass should be dry and the blades formed by the insect larvae feeding between the upper and lower surfaces of the leaf. The two surfaces of blistered leaves can be peeled apart. Control procedures are directed at the adult miner before the damage is noticeable. Malathion, Indane, Sevin or diazinon sprays should be applied in mid-May with repeat applications every two weeks through June. With malathion, mix one cup of 25% wettable powder with three gallons of water. Sevin, in the 50% wettable powder form, should be mixed at the Milwaukee area. This is a Milwaukee area. 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Progress Is Slow

City crews were making slower progress than anticipated last week with the inoculations. With half the time elapsed, only 14,000 trees had been injected with Bidrin, Rayner estimated. However, he said the crews should pick up speed this week as they gain experience in handling the capsules and injectors. The many large trees near the lake also require more time than smaller elms elsewhere in the city.

The crews this week will be working west of the Milwaukee river on the east side and west of S. Pine st. on the south side.

Checks last week reinforced official optimism that the test will be successful. Virtually all trees are receiving correct dosages, Rayner said. Previous tests have shown that Bidrin is completely effective in preventing Dutch elm disease if the dosage is correct.

First Effects Felt

The first effects of the inoculations already are being felt. Most elms are showing a slight browning or wilting

around the leaf edges. This is a good sign, according to Gordon Z. Rayner, Milwaukee city forester. He said it indicated that the trees have received a proper dosage.

Dosage estimation, completed earlier this year on the 45,000 elms the city hopes to inoculate, was spot checked recently by Norris. He concluded, "In general the men did a really good job."

Earlier this year, each of the 45,000 trees the city hopes to inoculate was examined and a dosage estimate made. The record of each tree is then reviewed by the crew chief just before injection in case any last minute adjustment is needed.

Last week, further checks by Norris verified the accuracy of the dosages. He found just the right amount of burning on the leaves of the elms.

Limited Tests Elsewhere

Madison, Beloit and Kansas City, Mo., also are testing Bidrin this year, although on a much more limited basis. Madison's tests, for example, will involve no more than 600 trees.

Bidrin never will be made available to individuals, Norris and Mauget agreed. Carelessly used, it could kill both the person handling it and the tree. Norris said that the chemical probably would be given to a small number of trained personnel from tree service firms. A property owner with prized elms could then hire one of those firms to inoculate his trees.

Licensing details and other

technicalities will not be worked out until the results of the Milwaukee test have been evaluated.

With regard to the provision in the zoning ordinance
