

MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT & BOARD OF
TRUSTEES, AUGUST 12, 1963.

Meeting called to order by President John H. D. Blanke. Present at roll call were Trustees: David R. Capulli; Robert F. McCaw; John M. Jackson; Robert J. Long, Paul J. Shultz; J. Frank Wyatt. Also present were: May L. Pinkerman, Clerk; B.J. Zelsdorf, Treasurer; Seymour C. Axelrod, Attorney.

MINUTES of 7-22-63: 1 sentence struck from Par. 2 on Page 2. MOTION to approve with this change by Trustee Capulli, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes.

INQUIRIES FROM FLOOR INVITED: No response heard.

CENTENNIAL CLEAN UP DAYS: Proclamation read & approved with copy to Press.

SALES TAX FOR MAY 1963: reported as net to Village of \$7982.37. ✓

PARKING METER RECEIPTS FOR JULY 1963: briefed by President.

PANKER PETITION FOR REZONING: Requests change from B-1 to R-10 of lots 7-8-9 in Block 7 of A.T. McIntosh E. Main St. Addition, for purpose of erecting a 14-Apt. building. MOTION by Trustee Long that this petition be referred to Plan Commission for study, hearing and recommendation; that Plan Commission set date for hearing; Trustee Capulli requested that plat of survey be supplied Plan Commission for the hearing and seconded Motion. Ayes.

SPRING & LAKE ST. WATER MAIN EXTENSION (Whitney-4 Apt.) Plans & specs prepared by Village Engineers, received 7-25-63; President reported State permit received and he felt Village should approve plans; work to be done at expense of developer of apartment building. Trustee Capulli felt Sewer & Water Committee should study this with respect to a loop instead of dead end; to be checked further at Recess.

MIDWEST CONFERENCE OF BUILDING OFFICIALS: MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Building Commissioner attend Conference Sept. 12 thru 18, 1963, to be in Decatur, at Village expense. Seconded by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

PUBLIC WORKS PLAQUE: Changes in original sketch discussed by President.

BILLS: MOTION by Trustee Long that bills be paid from funds indicated, seconded by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

LEVY ORDINANCE: MOTION by Trustee Long to adopt Ordinance as presented, seconded by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. #821.

PUBLIC HEARING-DAVIS: Recommendations from Zoning Board of Appeals dated 8-2-63 to grant permission per petition request read. Trustee Capulli stated, for the record, he felt Village Board should be notified by members of Zoning Board of Appeals and Plan Commission of number of members attending meetings with ayes and naves - that this could be included in recommendations submitted, without names. Discussion followed. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that Village request that, in the future, the Plan Commission & Zoning Board, in their reports on any changes in zoning, note number of members in attendance and record of dissenting and affirmative voting in information given to the Village Board. Seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes. Clerk asked to write both Boards. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that Village Board concur in recommendations of the Zoning Board of Appeals, seconded by Trustee McCaw. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

CENTENNIAL PARADE=STATE PERMIT: President reported permit received to reroute Route 59 traffic; Chief of Police has cleared with all interested Committees; officers to be stationed to direct traffic needing to detour and that needing to enter town; Supt. Public Works to be advised on needed signs; copy of permit has been delivered to Chief.

CENTENNIAL OPERATIONS - INSURANCE: President noted certificates of insurance have been delivered covering Barrington Centennial Incorporation; John B. Rogers Prod. Co.; Indiana Flag & Decorating Co. and Illinois Fireworks Co. Inc. and passed to Attorney Axelrod for checking.

UNIFORM TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES: Information recently sent to Supt. Public Works; followup letter referred to Trustee Wyatt & Street Committee.

PUBLIC HEARING-BEINHOFF: Recommendations of Plan Commission dated 8-2-63 received and read, followed by reading of letter from Barrington Home Owners Assoc Inc. Discussion followed. MOTION by Trustee Capulli that copy of Plan Commission recommendation be given Petitioner to report back on to the Village Board at next regular meeting. Seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli,McCaw,Jackson,Long, Shultz,Wyatt.

CENTENNIAL - INSURANCE POLICIES CONT'D: Briefed on by Attorney Axelrod. Trustee Capulli requested further study to insure Village adequately covered, with legal opinion in writing with return of certificates.

COMPLAINT: FROM RESIDENT ON GROVE AVE. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that this matter be referred to Chief of Police for investigation of possible violation under #9.121 of Municipal Code, seconded by Trustee Long. Ayes.

CHANGE IN NAME - PRESIDENT TO MAYOR: MOTION by Trustee McCaw that Village Attorney be directed to prepare ordinance for approval of Board, changing title from President of the Board to Mayor. Seconded by Trustee Jackson. Ayes.(Senate Bill 232)

1963 MFT MAINTENANCE Sealcoating contract with State for approval.

RECESS

SPRING ST. WATER MAIN CONT'D: MOTION by Trustee Jackson that we accept plans for water main extension on Spring St. Seconded by Trustee McCaw. Trustee Capulli commented he did not feel this should go thru without further study and is against this type of procedure (explanation of vote to follow). Roll call-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. Noes: Capulli.

DUTCH ELM DISEASE: Chicago Dept. of City Planning requested report on results of systemic treatment; reply prepared by President & Rowland Roth with copy to Street Committee Chairman and 1 to files

NORTHERN ILLINOIS GAS CO. HEARINGS set before I.C.C. 8-20-63 at 10 AM in Chicago re installing 8" gas main in several surrounding townships. Copy on file.

21CSMFT: Bids opened today at 3 PM in presence of President, Clerk, Treasurer, Supt. Public Works, Engineer from Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. and Engineer from State Highway Dept. and others in audience. Copy of Clerk's report attached to these minutes. Low bidder was Liberty Asphalt Products of Grayslake, Ill. at \$32,025.02 with deposit check of \$2500. Engineers estimate was \$34,714. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that the contract be awarded to the lowest bidder under 21CSMFT, Liberty Asphalt Prod. Inc. Grayslake, Ill. in amount of \$32,025.02, **subject to State approval**, and that checks of 2 low bidders be retained; checks of the 3 highest bidders to be returned. second

by Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

BARRINGTON CENTENNIAL INCORPORATION PERMIT: Blanket permit to cover all activities engaged in for the Centennial celebration covered in Resolution submitted by Attorney Matthews and was read. All fees waived. Discussion had on amount of power covered by such a resolution and fact that no alcoholic beverages to be dispensed by any-one other than those already licensed under Liquor Ordinance by Liquor Commissioner. Agreed that only thing waived to be fees - all powers under ordinances remain intact. **MOTION** by Trustee McCaw to adopt Resolution as read concerning Barrington Centennial Incorporation permit. Seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. (Certified copy to Centennial Comm. by President.)

PARKING METERS vs GATE PARKING LOT #2: Letter of opinion from Village Attorney on use of parking meter funds for purchasing meters read. Trustee Capulli questioned further since meters would replace a gate; legality questioned further and matter held over until next meeting for additional legal interpretations. ✓

SPECIAL POLICE REIMBURSEMENT - CENTENNIAL DUTY: Fox Valley special police to work as well as Village specials for traffic control and police protection - total cost for approximately 300 manhours at \$2.50 per hr.=\$750. Trustee McCaw recommended that Village appropriate funds for paying this, feeling it our duty to provide protection. Trustees Wyatt and Long did not understand why the Centennial Inc. cannot contribute this amount for protection, considering this a legitimate expense. Trustee Capulli felt if they have funds available they should pay but if not Village should. **MOTION** by Trustee McCaw that funds, not to exceed \$800. be approved for employment of Barrington and Fox Valley Special Police, under direction of Chief of Police of Barrington, for the 4 days of the Barrington Centennial, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call- Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. **MOTION** by Trustee Wyatt that Barrington Centennial Inc. be asked to reimburse the Village of Barrington for the cost of the special police mentioned above, seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

JAPANESE GUESTS: At recent meeting of Barrington Womens Club President Blanke presented a Centennial plate to Miss Akiko Nakata to be delivered to Mayor of Amagasaki, Japan, Hon. Kazuya Usui, with letter of greeting. Copies of letters exchanged filed in Minute book .

CENTENNIAL RESOLUTION-STATE OF ILLINOIS: Copies of corrected copy distributed.

C&NWRR FENCE MATTER: Meeting to be set after middle of Sept. (Committee & RR Att'y) ✓

BLDG. & USE MAP: President noted this not yet authorized; stated he had offered to do survey work in this regard - Trustee Shultz felt this an imposition on President's time, wondering if another way could be found. To be discussed further in Committee.

121 & 127 W. STATION ST. President reported bldgs. razed and insurance policies cancelled, ground levelled and graded, ready for parking & centennial operations; snow fence erected around property; Attorney asked to write County Assessor to remove properties from tax rolls.

ILL. RETIREMENT FOR MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES: Trustee Long requested meeting of Committee of Whole with representatives be set for after Labor Day and Treasurer asked to set this for a Monday night after this date. ✓

LILL ST. IMPROVEMENTS: Trustee Wyatt reported on meeting of Street Committee with Supt. Public Works last Saturday; Engineers original estimate about \$14,000. Committee suggests that grading and scarifying be done by Village, that machine be hired for the grading at cost estimated by Supt. at about \$200. Engineers could check

grading, it then could be sealcoated - 2 coats estimated to cost \$175. Trustee McCaw asked about this being done as other projects are handled - by professionals under contract? He and Trustee Capulli felt this should be let, perhaps with Village paying a certain amount and balance by property owners; money to be put in escrow. It was noted that adjacent owners are going to pay for curb & gutters. Discussion had. Clerk asked to write Engineers for 3 copies of plan #61-178. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Engineers be requested to prepare working drawings, plans and specs, including curbs & gutters on separate specs, with respect to the paving improvements on Lill St. referred to in their files as #61-178, on Lill St. from Lincoln Ave. to Coolidge Ave. Seconded by Trustee Long. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. ✓

CROSSING GUARDS: 2 Part-time special police crossing guards requested, in writing to President, consideration for paid vacations; copies to Trustee McCaw & Chief Muscarello.

COMPLAINT: Letter of 7-28-63 from W.A. Sommerfield, 147 Hager Ave N. read, re debris weeds & general condition of property at Laverne & Raymond; Trustee Capulli suggested weeds be cut. It was noted property in distress.

REPORTED TARRING ACCIDENT: received from S.P. Carroll, RR1, Box 246, Fox River Grove, reporting accident to child in car during tarring process recently done on S. Cook. Trustee Wyatt to discuss with Supt. of Public Works.

DOWNTOWN LIGHTING PROGRAM: Letter of 8-12-63 from Engineers delivered tonight by Mr. C. Bowen, read. MOTION by Trustee Long that copy of this letter be sent to Cuba Elec. Shop with a covering letter, requesting Cuba Elec. Shop (Mr. Ahlgrim) to submit necessary information to our Engineers, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. MOTION WITHDRAWN & REPLACED: MOTION by Trustee Long that Village Clerk write Cuba Elec. Shop requesting that it submit the desired information to our Engineers as outlined in their letter of August 12th, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Ayes.

S. HAGER AVENUE: Oiling cost estimated at \$85. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Hager Ave. be oiled from Main St. to S. end, seconded by Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

ALLEY N. OF 14: Estimated cost sealcoating \$210. Held for next meeting=Tr. Wyatt.

SCHOOL CROSSING LIGHTS: Trustee Shultz reported Police Dept. was requested to re-activate request to State for survey after school is again in session. (S. Hough St.)

PUBLIC WORKS BLDG. Trustee Shultz noted work not yet completed & President felt building should be accepted before Department moves in.

MOTEL (CUMMINGS): Building Commissioner noted in letter he feels building to be a nuisance, unsightly, etc. Trustee Shultz recommended that this letter go to Attorney and that he direct letter to property owner or owners with request they comply with ordinance on buildings in this condition. (letter to Attorney)

INSURANCE: Trustee Long/meeting held Saturday about Village coverage; copies of recommendations distributed; briefed by Trustee Long. MOTION by Trustee Long that property insurance be purchased in amount of \$10M on Pumphouse and contents at cost of about \$37. per yr. and that comprehensive property damage insurance on the steel water tanks in amount of \$50M be purchased at yearly cost of about \$30. Seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE asked for a survey of contents of Fire Dept. and items on vehicles for coverage. Treasurer requested to check ownership of all hose and it

was suggested we have adequate insurance protection on all Village property. President suggested Trustee Capulli & Fire Chief Martens sit in with Treasurer on this; all policies are to be made to come due on the same date. *oct 1.*
BODILY INJURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY: It was recommended comprehensive general liability insurance be had against all hazards at a cost of about \$3450. first year with decrease in premium if favorable records are enjoyed. **MOTION** by Trustee Long that Village purchase this Bodily Injury and Property Damage liability insurance in amounts of \$100M B.I. for each person; \$300M each accident; \$50M property damage; at cost of approximately \$3450. ^(An.) plus additional coverage in amount of \$50M to reimburse policemen (up to \$50M per judgment.) Seconded by Trustee Wyatt. Trustee Capulli asked that fire & extended coverage on Public Works Bldg. be checked into Replacement of valuable Records: Trustee Long stated coverage can be had when we survey all Village properties in this regard.

VOLUNTEER FIREMAN PROTECTION discussed and further action to be taken.

OUTSTANDING BONDS - further report to come in next meeting.

NEW WELL: Trustee Jackson had discussion with Wm. Townsend & Arthur Lewis of Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. on size of proposed ground level reservoir; it was hoped plans will call for substantial storage facilities on site. Plans/Report next meeting.
PUMPING RECORD for a month distributed.

SPECIAL POLICE FORCE: Applications received from Marvin M. Kaiser, 223 Sharon Dr. & Dellis Wilbert Lauing, 213 North Ave. Chief Muscarello recommends appointment. **MOTION** by Trustee McCaw that these appointments be approved by Board seconded by Trustee Capulli. Ayes.

PARKING LOT #2. Trustee McCaw requested Treasurer compile list of expenses on gate.

SUGGESTED ADJUSTMENTS IN ZONING ORD. Trustee Capulli discussed letter from President to Evert Kincaid & Assoc. of 3-5-63, which is to be checked on status of items.

PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED ON REPLACEMENT OF RETIRING TRUSTEE: Copy of excerpt from Statutes distributed by Trustee Wyatt.

MEETING ADJOURNED on motion by Trustee Wyatt, seconded by Trustee McCaw, 11.40PM. Ayes.


WHEREAS, August 22, 23, 24 and 25 mark the centennial celebration of Barrington in Cook and Lake Counties; and



Dear Mr. Dean:

Since you sent an inquiry to both Mr. Rowland Roth and myself, dated July 1, 1963, concerning our experimental tree injections with Shell Oil's SD 3562, I told Mr. Roth I would answer for the both of us incorporating his information with mine.

Mr. Roth, of Roth Landscape Service, has conducted our Village Dutch Elm Disease program since 1956. He was able to obtain the Shell Oil chemical for us both last year and this year. Under the aegis of Dr. Dale Norris of the Univ. of Wisconsin who is heading the Shell Oil experimental program, Mr. Roth injected a row of 50 parkway elms we chose for experiment. We are using 50 adjoining elms as the control elms.

Mr. Roth sent specific data and check dates on each elm to Dr. Norris. Our 50 injected elms did quite well during the summer of 1962. None were lost but 25% of them suffered leaf droppage, marginal burn, and cupping.

This spring the injected elms, and especially those which showed toxic symptoms during the summer of 1962, contained an abnormal amount of dead wood. We trimmed them not only for sanitation but to better observe any changes which may occur this summer.

Mr. Roth met Dr. Norris in Delavan, Wisconsin early this spring to exchange and compare notes and ascertain the revised dosages for our experimental elms for 1963. The apparent health of the tree and the crown classification determine the proper number of ccs. to be injected into the

injection sites. However, from their experience and observations, the existing toxicity of wetwood disease seemed to enhance the toxic reaction to the injected chemical since the tree is already somewhat undermined. This condition seems to definitely warrant a lesser dosage than would be generally given. On the whole, most dosages for 1963 injections were somewhat reduced.

To date, our injected elms (with the exception of two) show no adverse symptoms from being injected.

Mr. Roth tells me Shell's latest developmental advance of SD 3562 is called plasticized BIDRIN. Its break down is slower thus giving longer protection as its release into the sap stream covers a longer span of time. There should be little, if any, occurrence of phytotoxicity.

Since SD 3562 hasn't been commercialized for the prevention of Dutch Elm Disease, I don't think its price has yet been established. The present procedure of injection is a two-man job if efficiently performed with the proper equipment. Where a number of trees are to be injected, the cost for injection of each good-sized average elm tree would probably be \$7.00. Mr. Roth is registered with the State as a tree expert and his services are available.

If you would care to come to Barrington, I invite you to inspect our injected elms, asking Mr. Roth to join us.

The provisions pertaining to the adoption and observance of this official manual are contained in Article III of the Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on Highways which requires that all highways in Illinois shall conform to the State Manual and Specifications.

The intention of this legislation is to promote the use of uniform methods and devices of traffic control throughout the State of Illinois with a minimum amount of variation throughout the country. Consequently, this official manual follows the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways, adopted jointly by the American Association of State Highway Officials, the Institute of Traffic Engineers, the National Committee on Uniform Traffic Laws and Ordinances, the National Association of County Officials, and the American Municipal Association. In addition, the Federal Highway Administrator has officially recognized the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways as the Standard for determining compliance of traffic control devices with the national standard.

Orders for traffic control signs, either from the Illinois State Penitentiary at Pontiac, or from private suppliers, should specify compliance with this manual.
