MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES
AUGUST 26, 1963

Meeting called to order by President Blanke. Present at roll call were Trustees: McCaw, Long, Shultz and Wyatt. (Trustee Jackson reported later). Also present were Atty. Byron S. Matthews and B.J. Zelsdorf, Treasurer. President Blanke reported Mrs. Pinkerman, Village Clerk, on vacation. Whereupon, on motion by Trustee Long, seconded by Trustee Shultz, Miss Mabel M. Schaefer was appointed Clerk Pro Tem. AYES.

MINUTES OF MEETING AUGUST 12, 1963 With respect to Page 5 line 3 Trustee Long reported that all Village insurance policies are to be issued so that the commencement date is October 1st. Trustee Wyatt stated that as to page 1, 4th line from bottom, there should be added that the report also include the basis ~~of the reason by dissenter~~. Motion by Trustee Wyatt, seconded by Trustee Long, that the minutes, as corrected, be approved. AYES.

INQUIRIES FROM FLOOR INVITED: No response.

SPRING & LAKE STREET (Whitney 4-apt.) President Blanke stated he had received a telephone call from Whitney Realtor relating to the 4-apartment building, claiming to have a tenant who will move in August 15th. However, occupancy permit will not be issued until the Village Engineers authorize acceptance and until we have waivers of lien that contractors have been paid in full for the work done. Mr. Townsend was also contacted and stated that the watermain job was not completed. Supt. Johannesen stated that only 1 water sample had been submitted, whereas 2 are required. Mr. Snyder then addressed the Board, stating he is a school teacher and had paid one month's rent for an apartment as of August 15th; that he was presently living in a motel, which was expensive, and wondered if some exception couldn't be made for him to occupy the apartment -- room and no meals. He was advised that the Board has no control over the agent who rented the property. President Blanke again stated that the job was not completed. (Supt. Johannesen stated that a second water sample could be taken tomorrow morning (August 27th) and sent to the State for analysis, which would require 24 hours.) It was felt that ~~restitution should be made to the tenant by the owner; that the owner has a moral, as well as legal, responsibility.~~ *This a matter between the owner and Mr. Townsend.*

TREASURER'S REPORT - JULY 1963 Copies distributed by President Blanke who stated that, as usual, report is in good order.

AIR CONDITIONERS Trustee Shultz reported that this equipment was purchased as part of our Village property; that first floor equipment was not adequate for both floors; three bids were obtained; that \$520.00 covers two (2) air conditioners and installation thereof in second floor offices, by Cuba Electric Shop. Motion by Trustee Shultz, seconded by Trustee McCaw, that the Board authorize purchase of two (2) air conditioners from Cuba Electric Shop for the price of \$520.00 including cost of labor, to be installed in the President's and Building Commissioner's office. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

VILLAGE BOARD CENTENNIAL PHOTOGRAPH Photograph passed around and information furnished that cost is \$1.25 each. ✓

DIRECTORY OF PUBLIC OFFICIALS President Blanke stated that the League of Women Voters has completed list of voters; it is an excellent job and a copy is available for each Trustee. *public officials*

PUBLIC WORKS GARAGE PLAQUE has been installed and looks very good.

TESTING LABORATORY MFT SECTION 21-CS Information was furnished that the State required a testing laboratory for this work. Motion by Trustee Wyatt that Consoer, Townsend & Associates be authorized to retain a testing laboratory for the purpose of making the necessary tests in accordance with State requirements, in connection with MFT Section 21-CS, Paving Improvements, C.T. & A. No. 63-081, cost approximately \$375.00, seconded by Trustee McCaw. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

CONGRESSIONAL RECORD-CENTENNIAL CITATION Copies distributed to Board members.

CIVIL DEFENSE SHELTER MANAGER Information furnished that it is necessary to pass an Ordinance designating a member of the Civil Defense; this should be drafted by the Attorney. Motion by Trustee Wyatt that the matter be referred to Ordinance Committee for study and recommendation, seconded by Trustee Jackson. AYES *Study Managers for Civ. Def. Shultz*

VILLAGE HALL PARKING LOT Reference made to letter August 12th (Village Hall employees) relating to conditions existing in the parking lot in front of the Village Hall. Supt. Johanesen stated he understood a bid had been delivered to the office. Trustee Shultz felt the matter should be referred to the Street Committee. (No motion required) *R 9/14*

EVANGELICAL FREE CHURCH REFUND Reference made to letter August 16, 1963, Carl O. Anderson, Chairman of the Board of the Evangelical Free Church, requesting partial refund of Building Permit fee for the Church parsonage at 411 South Street. Motion by Trustee Shultz that one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the Building Permit fee in connection with the construction of the Church parsonage at 411 South Street be refunded to the Church, seconded by Trustee McCaw. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz and Wyatt. *9/14*

RE-ZONING OF 213 WEST MAIN STREET (Frank Willard) from Residential (R-10) to Business. Motion by Trustee Long, that the matter be referred to the Planning Board and set for public hearing, seconded by Trustee McCaw. AYES

LIST OF BILLS Trustee Long explained the Potter charge (2nd); also that the Roth Landscape Service bill appears to be in order. Motion by Trustee Long that the bills be approved, seconded by Trustee McCaw. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

CENTENNIAL GREETINGS Read by Mr. Zelsdorf.

MFT MAINTENANCE Information furnished that all bid checks have been returned by the Clerk to the bidders. For the record, motion by Trustee Wyatt that all bid checks be returned to the bidders, which were sub-

mitted in connection with 1963 MFT maintenance, seconded by Trustee Long. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

CENTENNIAL CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE President Blanke stated that all certificates are to be returned to the Clerk's file; that the Attorney recommended that same be checked by Insurance Committee. ✓

MAYOR/VILLAGE PRESIDENT ORDINANCE President Blanke mentioned that State law permits Village President to be addressed as Mayor. Ordinance presented. Mention made of Senate Bill 232. Inquiry made as to whether this makes any change in responsibilities, or is it in title only. Attorney Matthews stated it was proper to address the Village President as Mayor. Trustee Wyatt stated he would like to read the statute. Motion by Trustee Wyatt that same be referred to Ordinance Committee for report, seconded by Trustee Shultz. AYES ✓

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY DRIVE Motion by Trustee Long that letter be directed to the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America Inc., advising them that their drive should be held during the first quarter of 1964 to prevent conflict with our own United Drive, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. AYES

SOIL TESTING AT WATER WELL SITE Engineers have submitted plans for soil testing site on Bryant Avenue. Motion by Trustee Jackson that the testing plan as outlined in Consoer, Townsend & Associates letter of August 23, 1963, be authorized by the Board, seconded by Trustee McCaw. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt.

WATER PUMPING CONTROLS AND WARNING DEVICES Inquiry made as to relative costs and time required for installation, etc. Trustee Shultz felt that the Committee in charge should work with Supt. Johanesen; also, that warning device was necessary. Discussion followed and it was felt that the Committee should act on it.

Second order.
BEINHOFF ZONING Fred Beinhoff addressed the meeting, stating he would like to have the matter approved by the Board. Sketch was presented and explanatory statements made.

R E C E S S -- 9:30 P.M.

Discussion resumed relating to density, parking facilities, neighborhood objection and Plan Commission dissension. It was the feeling that the matter should be discussed with the Plan Commission; that for this case, as well as for the future, a procedure should be established to avoid unnecessary delays; that we should get things moving, and moving fast. Motion by Trustee Long that a meeting of the Village Board, Plan Commission and Mr. Beinhoff be held at 9:30 A.M., September 7th, for the purpose of discussing the proposed plan development of the property represented by Mr. Beinhoff, seconded by Trustee Wyatt. ROLL CALL-Ayes: McCaw, Jackson, Long, Shultz, Wyatt. ✓

ELM TREE DISEASE President Blanke reported as to the Roth Landscape Service. (letter dated 8/26/63)

MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT PLAN Mr. Zelsdorf reported on this matter, stating that the representative was on vacation; matter will be taken up after Labor Day.

C&NWRy FENCE PROJECT Meeting to be held soon regarding this matter. Attorney Matthews stated that the Railroad representative will check with him on his return from vacation. Meeting suggested for September 23rd, 7:00 P.M.

REFUSE AND GARBAGE DISPOSAL President Blanke reported that contract is subject to renewal in December 1963. A report is available in his office.

PARKING METERS Inquiry was made as to cost of replacing gates in Lot 2 with parking meters; ascertain what new gates would cost and what repairs have cost on the different gates. Tabulation was prepared by Treasurer Zelsdorf and read by Trustee McCaw. Chief Muscarello stated that every time repairs are necessary at least six man hours are required, and this does not include cars leaving parking lots without paying. Trustee McCaw reported on letter received from Western Industries as to cost of putting gates in condition, stating he was in favor of installing parking meters. Discussion followed as to legality of payment of meters, involving further indebtedness. Attorney Matthews will investigate the matter from a legal standpoint.

ORDINANCE INVENTORY It was the opinion that the Ordinance Committee should study the revised Zoning Ordinances.

ORDINANCE ON PUBLIC BENEFIT-TAX LEVY President Blanke reported that the Village Treasurer has made inquiry relating to an Ordinance on Public Benefit relating to tax levy, whereupon the Treasurer made some remarks. Attorney Matthews stated it was not necessary to pass an Ordinance listing Public Benefit of Special Assessment projects, as requested by Lake County Clerk's office.

POLICE CAR Trustee McCaw reported breakdown of police car. Motion by Trustee McCaw for permission to solicit bids for a new police car; that we immediately advertise for bids and that bids, if possible, be available for next Board meeting, for purchase at that time. AYES

RESIGNATION OF TRUSTEE JACKSON Letter ^{Wright} from Chamber of Commerce read by Treasurer. Motion by Trustee ~~Shultz~~ to accept the resignation of Trustee Jackson, with regret, effective August 31st., seconded by Trustee Long. Feeling expressed by Trustee Shultz that we owe a vote of thanks to Trustee Jackson; that, addressing Trustee Jackson, on behalf of the Village Board and the President we extend our appreciation for your excellent service to the Board and, coupled with the feelings of the community, it gives us great pleasure to present to you a plaque (read by Trustee Shultz); good luck and God speed in your new assignment. Trustee Jackson responded by saying that he will cherish this with pride; that it has been a great pleasure to work with the Board a little over 2 years and I am sorry my term has come to an end so quickly. President Blanke stated he was pleased to have had him on the Board.

ROWE REQUEST FOR ANNEXATION Letter read by President Blanke. Area involves 4 acres in Barrington Hills and 3 acres in Village of Barrington. Trustee Long felt that a letter should be addressed to the Attorney inquiring as to the wishes of the property owner. (President Blanke will write letter)

CROSSING GUARDS - PAID VACATION Letter dated July 27, 1963, signed by Crossing Guards HELWIG and WORKMAN, addressed to Mayor Blanke, was read, requesting vacation with pay in view of five years of service. Chief Muscarello has indicated his approval to this. Motion by Trustee McCaw that the wishes of the two Crossing Guards (Helwig and Workman) be approved, whereupon Trustee Long requested that the Treasurer submit a time report for the next meeting. ✓ G.H.

COMMITTEE REPORTS With respect to the School Crossing traffic survey, Chief Muscarello will follow up with the Clerk. DeARMAS driveway to be installed and this matter checked in the next few days. Regarding the 1936 WATER REVENUE BONDS, they want the accrued interest paid up to maturity date. However, as to the bonds held by the Bank they are willing to sell the bonds back with interest accrued to date of sale. \$1300 interest (roughly), principal amount \$45,000 -- \$25,000 held by Bank and \$20,000 held by Fraternal organization. Money is available. Attorney Matthews stated that if money is available he sees no disadvantage; however, he will review the Ordinance and issue a legal opinion available for next meeting, if possible. Trustee Jackson reported the water situation covered. Trustee McCaw had nothing to report. Trustee Wyatt felt that the Police Department should be commended for the excellent services performed during the Centennial Celebration; that he heard nothing but good comments and they should be commended for the wonderful job they did. Chief Muscarello reported that during the four days 200 hours were put in by the Police.

MEETING ADJOURNED on motion of Trustee Wyatt, at 11:00 P.M., seconded by Trustee Long.



Minimum requirements for one 25,000 pound GVW Truck Chassis

1. Dimensions:

- (a) Back of cab to center of rear axle: 72 inches.
- (b) Gross vehicle weight rating: 25,500 pounds advertised factory rated minimum capacity.

- 2. Front Axle: 7,000 pound rated capacity; heavy duty springs; direct acting shock absorbers w/ power steering
- 3. Rear Axle: 18,500 pound rated capacity; gear reduction of 6.5/9 to 1; heavy duty auxiliary or overload springs; dual rear wheels; Two speed axle.
- 4. Parking Brakes: Orschela, w/adjustable control lever.
- 5. Service brakes: Hydraulic, 16x6" w/ Hydrovac booster, or equal; vacuum reserve tank w/ gauge and low vacuum alarm; brake lining area of 487.8 square inches. (Oversize Brakes)
- 6. Cab: Right and left electric windshield wipers; two 4 bracket extension arm "West Coast" type rear view mirrors; one mounted on each side; Grab handles mounted left and right; two auxiliary head lights mounted on cab roof facing to the front with separate head light switch on dash; dome light; deluxe fresh air heater with twin defroster; separate head light switch (for auxiliary equipment to be supplied by others) mounted on dash; minimum I.C.C. running lights. painted yellow; three safety reflectors and flags mounted in kit under front seat; right side; Beacon ray revolving light, mounted on cab roof.
- 7. Chassis: Conventional cab, all steel cab, complete undercoating; front bumper.
- 8. Clutch: Heavy duty 12" diameter, 15 spring
- 9. Electrical System: 12 volt with 12 volt 70 ampere hour battery; 52 amp alternator; turn signals; automatic cancel with dash mounted to flash all lamps at same time; Front turn signals mounted on top of fenders.
- 10. Engine: Six cylinder regular gasoline fuel; piston displacement of 300 cubic inches minimum; deluxe one quart full-flow oil filter with replaceable cartridge; heavy duty oil bath type air cleaner and Ceramic gasoline filter; sealed type adjustable engine governor; positive crankcase ventilator; engine mounted hour meter; permanent type anti-freeze; water thermostat set at 170 degrees F.
- 11. Frame: Reinforced full-length double channel; two front heavy duty towing eyes; rear loop mounted center rear.
- 12. Fuel System: 31 gallon auxiliary fuel tank and 2 way valve.

13. Steering: Ross T66 or equal.
14. Transmission: Heavy duty syncro-mesh with 5 speeds forward gear reduction of 7.17 to 1 in 1st;; direct in 5th and one reverse; adaptable for power take off.
15. Tires: 825x20-10 ply Fronts; 825x20-10 ply Lugger rears on cast spoke wheels.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR SNOW PLOW FOR BARRINGTON

Snow Plow to be the One-Way Adjustable Angle type, installed. The moldboard shall be smooth rolled 10 gauge manten steel. It shall be heavily reinforced with 5 vertical ribs and horizontally braced at the top by a double flange which is an integral part of the moldboard. Unit shall be boxed formed at bottom of 5/16" material for added strength at bottom of moldboard, which is the main horizontal brace of the plow. Plow shall have 5 plowing positions. Cutting width straight shall be 11'; cutting width at 35° shall be 9'; and width of cut at 42° shall be 8'2½"; Plow shall have a nose height of not less than 30", and a discharge edge height of not less than 50".

A one-piece, replaceable, abrasive resistant steel cutting edge 10' long and 6" wide shall be furnished and attached to the moldboard and shall have a cutting edge wear of not less than 3½". The entire moldboard shall trip by means of 4 heavy duty self-cleaning screw adjustable compression springs including two additional inner springs to provide shock cushion and limit the trip of the entire moldboard to pass safely over obstructions without danger to the top of the moldboard.

A boxed side section "A" reversing frame of 4" x 4" x ½" angle reinforced by ½" material with necessary brackets for screw adjustable skid shoe assembly. Six (6) position pushing plates shall be furnished.

Plow to be furnished with a Universal Heavy Duty Underframe Hitch of heavy structural steel sections. Plowing thrust is transmitted to truck frame through side braces and shall support the 2½" diameter hydraulic lift ram. Push plates mounting on side of hitch so as to chafe sides for extra strength and stability.

Plow to be equipped with spring cushioned mushroom type shoes with adjustment consisting of inner and outer pipe with adjustment controlled by threaded bolt, locking nut and break-down handle. Shoe assembly to have knuckle-type 4 way oscillation.

Cab mounted controls for V-Belt Hydraulic Hydra-Clutch pump, with reservoir, hoses and fittings.

Plow to be 1963 Wausau Model TBA-3050, or equal, and must be interchangeable with currently owned Wausau Plows and Hitches.

Heil Model LH 11 or equal; length 9' long; 7' wide;
22" high. double action tail gate 29" and $\frac{1}{2}$ cab shield.

Hoist: Heil or equal Model 1715 up to 11-tons capacity;
all bearing points lubricated; all steel construction;
flexible trunnion attachment; screwed cylinder head;
independently mounted Perma-pump; Floorboard levers;
Mud guards front and rear of wheel.

Color of paint: Same as cab.


