

OPEN OCCUPANCY RESOLUTION adopted unanimously by CITY COUNCIL
of FREEPORT, ILLINOIS, on Tuesday, November 5, 1963

"RESOLVED: That discrimination in the sale or rental of housing or residential property on the basis of race, creed color, or national origin is contrary to the best interests of this city; that it is the policy of the City of Freeport that all persons financially able to buy or rent housing or residential property, in any area within the jurisdiction of the city, shall not be denied on the basis of their race, creed, color or national origin.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That social progress is, whenever possible, best achieved by voluntary, enlightened action on the part of all parties concerned.

"THEREFORE: We, the members of the City Council of the City of Freeport, a municipal corporation, do hereby call upon any and all persons engaged in any operation of the sale, rental, financing or construction of housing or residential property to take positive, immediate steps to implement the aforesaid policy;

"More specifically, we, the members of the City Council of the City of Freeport, a municipal corporation, do hereby respectfully request that any and all persons engaged in any operation of the sale, rental, financing or construction of housing or residential property abandon and repudiate any and all practices, either legal or extralegal, which discriminate against, or differentiate between, prospective buyers or renters on the basis of their race, creed, color or national origin."

- (3) REALIZING FOR MORE CITIZENS THE GREAT URGENCY FOR REMOVING COSTLY EFFECTS OF HOUSING SEGREGATION - THE ACTUAL INCREASING DIVISION - THE DIRECT RELATION TO POVERTY AND WORLD PEACE;
- (4) PROVING THAT THE ONLY PRACTICAL WAYS OF REMOVING RACIAL HOUSING BIAS ALTOGETHER FROM THE AMERICAN SCENE ARE FOR ALL PEOPLE [BLACK AND WHITE] TO DO IT TOGETHER (IN PROJECTS IN THE TEAMS) AND FOR ALL PEOPLE TO IDENTIFY THEMSELVES PERSONALLY (IN PROJECTS LIKE THE TOURS, FIRESIDE FORUMS, FACT FINDING, AND OTHER FEATURES OF THE F O R PROGRAM).

Dear John:

We have read with interest your report to the Village Board of November 8, 1965 relative to the sidewalk improvements in Hillside Ave. and East Main St. Although the report's subject is "Statement of Position by Village President Blanke on Signing Specification Documents for Project 26-CS," the majority of the items contained therein have no connection with this project at all. These comments refer to situations which exist at various locations in the Village and deal with consideration of Village policy and have no relationship with matters of engineering judgment or performance. Similarly, no relationship exists between these subjects and the improvements on which we were authorized by the Village Board to perform engineering services.

Remaining items which refer to engineering aspects of this particular project were of such little significance that little would be gained by reciting them here. Past correspondence from us relative to the submission of estimates of cost, submittal of plans to the Village Board, contacts with the Chicago & North Western Railway relative to the crossing at Hillside Ave., etc., are available in the file to provide all the necessary background for this project. Comments concerning the index map on the cover sheet of the plans and criticism of us for the omission of the estimate of cost in the specification booklet, which, in fact, is specifically prohibited under new State requirements, are of minimal significance.

We have become aware of an apparent difference in opinion between you and the members of the Village Board relative to this project and it, therefore, appears to us that your report was intended to embarrass the Village Board by leveling unjustified criticism of our firm for the services which we have rendered on this project.

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The decision on financing of any public works improvement being a matter of Village policy rests, of course, with the governing body of the municipality. The Village Board has, by past action, made a decision on the means of financing of this project and after deciding on the scope of the work to be done authorized us to proceed with the necessary engineering services. This we have done to the best of our ability. It is extremely distressing to us to be made "a victim of circumstances" by being the recipients of public criticism when your apparent differences on this project are, in fact, with the Village Board.

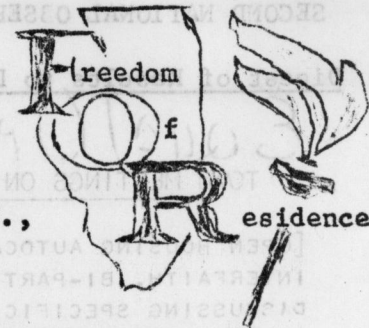

Gentlemen:

In accordance with our recent discussions, Motorola is pleased to provide this proposal for one Communications Control Center.

This complex will consist of three console desks connected by two 45 degree angle fillers. The center desk will have two 3-drawer pedestals; the left hand desk will have a drawer pedestal on the left side with a drawer mounted 40" typewriter extension containing a stationery storage rack mounted therein, and the right hand desk will have a 3-drawer pedestal on the right side.

Seven of the eleven panels created by this console complex will be blank. Of the four remaining panels, one will be pre-punched to accept 48 switch/light elements for burglar and fire alarms. (The switch/light elements and the wiring of same is not included in this proposal.) There will be one radio control panel in the complex which will include a direct reading cyclometer clock, speaker with volume control, V.U. meter, selector switches for four frequencies (Police, Point-to-Point, Fire, and Local Government), call/mute switches for four receivers, automatic pre-timed "All-Speaker Mute" switch, intercom switch, alert tone switch, transmit indicator, transmit bar, and P.L. Monitor bar. In addition, a high quality microphone and dual pedal footswitch are included.

One monitor panel will be provided which will include three speakers with volume controls, one call/mute switch for the State Police receiver, one siren control switch, two electric door lock control switches, and one lobby alarm switch with buzzer. (The above switches will be furnished and connected to your existing functions--our proposal is based on your supplying the actual siren control, door locks, and alarm circuits to which these switches will be connected.)

Operation of the control center will be such that the audio from all receivers will normally emanate from the monitor panel speakers except the receiver of the selected station. This audio will be on the speaker of the radio control panel.

The third panel of the main console shall contain one fifty-leaf quick reference rand and one drawer of each console desk will contain one tray for 3 x 5 cards.

This entire facility, completely installed, can be furnished, as described, for a total of \$9,788.77. Shipment will be f.o.b. Barrington, Illinois; and complete installation can be accomplished within six months after receipt of firm order.

Five year "Conditional Sale" terms are available, and on this basis, the monthly payments would be \$212.09 per month for sixty months beginning after complete installation. Pre-payment privileges are available with this contract as outlined in the attached schedule.
