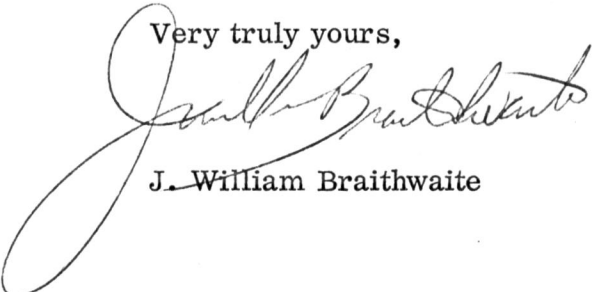

We enclose, in proper legal form for passage, a rezoning ordinance covering the South portion of Mr. Schurecht's West Russell Street development. Mr. Schurecht originally applied for rezoning on two parcels, one lying North of Russell Street and the other lying South on Russell Street. Because he did not then own the Southerly parcel, the rezoning ordinance passed on November 28, 1967 included only the Northerly parcel.

As Mr. Schurecht has now acquired (through a Land Trust) title to the South half of the property, it would be appropriate to rezone this property pursuant to his original petition and the public hearing which was held.

REZONING ORDINANCE
(SCHURECHT'S SOUTH PORTION OF WEST RUSSELL STREET PROPERTY)

WHEREAS, a petition has been received requesting rezoning of the territory described herein; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on said petition was held by the Plan Commission of this municipality, following publication, all pursuant to law;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, that:

Section 1. The statements in the preamble of this ordinance hereby are found to be true.

Section 2. The following described territory within the municipality is hereby rezoned from M-2, Manufacturing District, to R-10 Multiple-Family District, under the Zoning Ordinance of the municipality:

That part of Lot 4 (except the North 33 feet thereof) lying West of a line 780 feet West of and parallel to the East line of Section 2, Township 42 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, and North of the North line of tract conveyed by William C. Dodge to the Evergreen Cemetery by Warranty Deed dated December 3, 1921 and recorded December 10, 1921, also that part of Lot 15 lying North of the North line of said tract conveyed to Evergreen Cemetery and that part of Lot 16 lying South of the North line of Lot 4, extended West, also that part of the North 33 feet of Lot 4 lying West of the East 809.45 feet thereof, all is S. Peck's Subdivision of part of the Northeast quarter of Section 2, in Township 42 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Cook County, Illinois.

RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO ELECTION ON THE QUESTION
OF CONVERSION OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON TO
A PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT

WHEREAS, a special election was held in the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, on the 10th day of June, 1969, on the question of the conversion of the Public Library of the Village of Barrington to a Public Library District, pursuant to law; and

WHEREAS, said election was regularly called and held in all respects, after due notice, pursuant to law, and prior to said election the judges thereof were duly sworn and qualified; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have on this date duly canvassed the results of said election;

NOW THEREFORE, be it and it is hereby Resolved by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois:

SECTION 1. The special election held on the 10th day of June, 1969 on the question of the conversion of the Public Library in the Village of Barrington to a Public Library District was held in all respects as provided by law, the judges of election were regularly qualified, notice was given as required by law and ballots in sufficient numbers were furnished at all times during the hours of said election.

SECTION 2. That the following votes were cast on the question of the conversion of the Public Library in the Village of Barrington to a Public Library District:

For the Conversion	126 Votes
Against the Conversion	13 Votes
Spoiled and Defective Ballots	2 Ballots

SECTION 3. The Corporate Authorities hereby declare that the proposition for the conversion of the Public Library of the Village of Barrington to a Public Library District was adopted and hereby direct the Village Clerk to take all steps required by law relative to this matter.

SECTION 4. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

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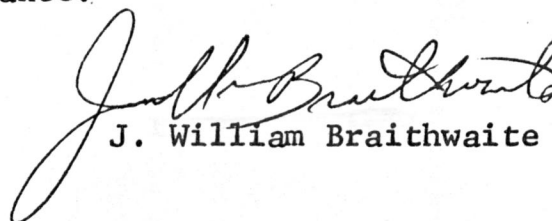

ZONING VARIATION ORDINANCE

(GRZECZEKA CAR WASH - SOUTH NORTHWEST HIGHWAY)

WHEREAS, the question of enacting the variation, herein-
after provided for, to the Zoning Ordinance of this municipality
was referred to the Zoning Board of Appeals of this municipality
to hold a public hearing thereon; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing has been held by the Board of
Appeals, after publication, all pursuant to law; and

WHEREAS, said Board of Appeals has made recommendations
and has submitted findings of fact to the Corporate Authorities
of this municipality; and

WHEREAS, it appears that there are practical difficulties
and particular hardships resulting from the application of the
strict letter of the Zoning Ordinance to the property in question;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and
Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake
Counties, Illinois, that:

SECTION 1. The Corporate Authorities hereby find that
the statements in the preamble to this Ordinance are true.

SECTION 2. The application of the Zoning Ordinance of
this municipality is hereby varied, and a variation is hereby
granted to allow an automatic car wash in an unattached building,
notwithstanding the existing B-2 Zoning District, on the following
described property:

Lots 34 and 35 in G. A. Lageschulte's subdivision
being a subdivision of part of the Northwest 1/4 of
the Northeast 1/4 of Section 1, Township 42 North,
Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian in
Cook County, Illinois.

This Variation shall be valid only while the following conditions, to which this Variation is subject, are complied with: a) The parking area shall be surrounded on three sides by a five foot fence of material to shield the area from sight of nearby property; (b) the car wash building will be set back not less than 41 feet from the edge of the nearest existing pavement of Northwest Highway; (c) height of the building shall not exceed ten (10) feet and the height of the lighting standards shall not exceed twenty (20) feet; (d) the exterior lighting fixtures shall be placed and designed so as not to cast or reflect unusual amounts of light on adjacent property and shall be subject to the reasonable approval of the Village Manager; (e) the premises shall be paved and drained pursuant to the Village Code and the reasonable requirement of the Village Manager; and (f) vehicles shall enter the car wash facility from the rear yard.

SECTION 3. This Variation shall expire unless a building permit is applied for within six (6) months from date hereof.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

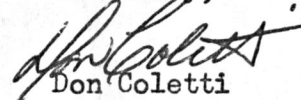
Dear Mr. Heninger:

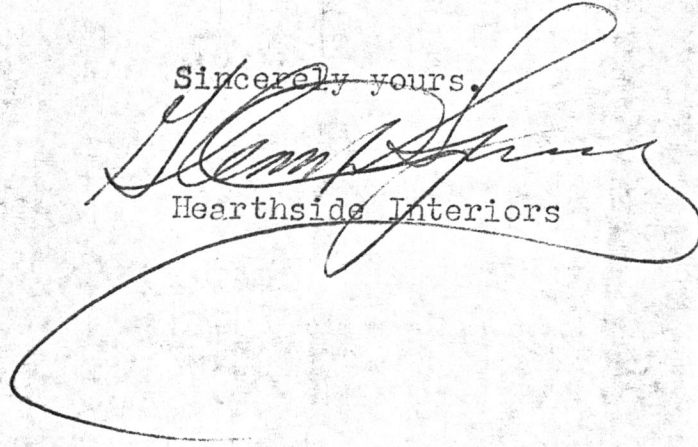

The month of April brought a rash of sanitary lateral services that were plugged. These emergency repair jobs require too much of our time in proportion to maintenance of our trunk lines. Hopefully this program can be evaluated as to the feasibility of the owner assuming responsibility for his own line out to the trunk line instead of to the property line.

Once again heavy rains in early April caused the sanitary sewers in Jewel Park to overflow. This required pumping of the infiltrated water for approximately eight hours.

The catch basin cleaning program has not been continued due to the manpower shortage caused by sickness and the large number of emergency maintenance type work. Hopefully this will be continued in early June. However, the inlets have been cleaned periodically to prevent flooding of streets.

Our street sweeping program progressed on schedule. The Central Business District (CBD) is being cleaned three times weekly on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings. The entire town is in the process of being cleaned for the third time this spring and

will be completed the first week in June.

Several fire hydrants required repair these past two months due to automobiles knocking them over. Other problems in the Fox Point area due to construction use of hydrant water have hopefully been eliminated. You have a copy of my letter to the Kennedy people on the use of hydrants for construction water.

A complete flushing of the water mains in the Fox Point area was completed in April. This seems to have eliminated many rusty water complaints in that area. The next step will be to flush all of the water mains in the village and make a thorough inspection of all fire hydrants. This work will be coordinated with the fire department.

Stop signs were erected at Prairie, Bristol and Russell Street per ordinance No. 1053. However, the "yield" signs for Prairie and Hill Street and other stop signs are in order. Hopefully these will be completed in June.

The street painting program has been greatly curtailed by first a breakdown of our paint sprayer and secondly by the poor weather this last month. This should be well advanced and near completion by the end of June.

A total of 46 tree pots were moved from the CBD to North Park at the end of April. Hopefully this will give the CBD a cleaner look and make maintenance much easier.

Once again, the Bryant Street pump controls for the standpipe level showed a failure. The problem was discovered by Mr. Jablenski and Mr. Hayes before complete failure occurred. The Fisher-Porter people had to replace one small unit before operation of the station could continue. The station was shut down for eleven days.

In mid May, the control float for Well #1 broke and was discovered by the Police Department. A crew was called out to correct the problem. The Police Department surveillance has proved a valuable asset in control of our water stations until automatic monitoring can be accomplished.

The aerator at Bryant Street was repaired and water leakage was reduced by approximately 95%. Complete stoppage of water leakage from around the base of the aerator was accomplished. Some very small leakage still occurs halfway up the aerator. The leakage was caused by either poor design or construction of the complete

aerator. The area of blame cannot be determined at this time due to lack of as-built drawings and adequate information. Repair of the Station Street aerator will be completed the first week in June.

The underground construction for Wyngate #2 was completed in May with only the infiltration tests yet to run.

The traffic signals at Hough and Main Streets are complete, taking only one month to complete. The contractor did a very good job without inconveniencing too many people.

Parking Lot #2 is very near final completion. The landscape work should be complete the first week in June. Once weather permits, the village forces will properly stripe this lot. Some of the existing shrubs and trees were moved from Park Avenue to the Bryant Street Pump Station.

Construction of Parking Lot #5 (behind East Main Street) just south of the C.N.W.R.R. tracks) was started in May. If weather permits, the area should be blacktopped by the second week in June and ready for use by the middle of June.

The East Station Street Parking Lot should have plantings in

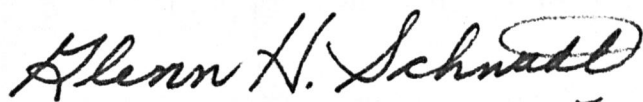

The Secretary's report of the minutes of the Executive Board Meeting held Friday, December 6, 1968, at Starved Rock State Park, were read and approved as printed.

The Treasurer's report for the period June 1, 1968 through May 20, 1969, summarized as follows, was received and approved as printed:

Balance brought forward:	\$ 460.97
Receipts	<u>1,356.26</u>
Total Receipts and Balance:	1,817.23
Total Expenditures	<u>1,385.95</u>
BALANCE ON HAND	\$ 431.28

It was noticed that the Association might be considered in a favorable position, membership dues for 1969-70 to be collected prior to September 1, 1969 at the rate of \$20.00 per community (raised from \$10.00) in accordance with official action taken by the Association in 1968.

Paul A. Reaume, Chairman of the Ethics Committee, discussed the relationship between City Managers and advertising of products for sale, with the admonition that this is a difficult area which should be considered further by the Association, and admonished City Managers to avoid a compromising position relative to the use of their name or position for the competitive advantage of one product or service through endorsement. The Ethics Committee reported no charges against any member during the year 1968-69.

Robert J. Eppley, Chairman of the Legislative Committee, reported that of the ten point legislative program proposed by the Illinois City Managers' Association, two appeared capable of successful passage: (1) that to permit a Professional Engineer to submit plats, rather than only a Registered Surveyor; and, (2) an increase in the acreage from 60 to 120 for annexation by a municipality surrounding or nearly surrounding unincorporated territory adjacent.

Other bills proposed by the Illinois City Managers' Association with reference to revenue, in form altered by the Illinois Municipal League working with various legislative committees, appear favorable to Cities in altered form.

Following Mr. Eppley's brief report, Steve Sargent and Snyder Herrin of the Illinois Municipal League distributed to the membership:

Text of Resolution authorizing a Constitutional Convention (S. B. 193),
Senate Bills, Legislative Information Service - League interpretation,
House Bills, Legislative Information Service - League interpretation,
Selected major Bills, H. B. and S. B., Status and League recommendation.

Following Mr. Sargent's review, President Herring recommended that members of the Association make immediate contact to support House Bill 1241 and others of special interest to municipalities, and to oppose those which appear, if passed, to be detrimental to municipalities, as discussed. It was noted that the Highway Aid program appears destined to defeat as originally proposed, but that we might expect a two cent gasoline tax, a two cent diesel tax, a drop of the road reclassification, resulting in a likely increase of \$2.00 per capita to municipalities if they retain their present 32% proportion to Cities - which the State is attempting to reduce. The Governor's local government package, as modified by the League in accordance with Association review recommendations, is being so emasculated and compromised, that the League may end up opposing it.

Norris Stilphen, Chairman of the Professional Education Committee, was unable to report in person, but President Herring noted that the work of this Committee deserves recognition by the membership for the persistent attention to the development of public administration training in the State of Illinois, and will continue to pursue such development in accordance with Association aims as this is possible.

The Nominating Committee of the Illinois City Managers' Association, consisting of Raymond P. Botch, Chairman, and Howard A. Olson and Leonard M. Carlman, in accordance with By Laws requirements, submitted the following slate of officers for 1969-70, who were elected by a unanimous ballot:

Secretary-Treasurer:	Norris W. Stilphen, Village of Deerfield

Gentlemen:

On Wednesday evening April 16, 1969, a public hearing was held in the Village Hall on the petition of L. J. Sheridan & Co., and L. F. Draper and Associates, Inc., to rezone the 33 acres described below from B-4, Office and Research-Business District, to partly B-2, General Business District and partly R-9A, Multiple Family District.

The Southwest one quarter of the Northwest one quarter of Section 6, Township 42 North, Range 10, East of the Third Principal Meridian, except the West 30 feet thereof, except that part thereof lying South of the Northeasterly line of Northwest Highway and except the West 600 feet of the North 400 feet of said Southwest one quarter of the Northwest one quarter, Cook County, Illinois.

At the hearing the petitioner described plans for creating a shopping center on 14.5 acres and about 216 high quality apartments on the remaining 18.1 acres. At the conclusion of this meeting the hearing was continued to May 14, 1969. A copy of the stenotype transcription covering the April 16 proceedings was received from Attorney Stephen Jurco on May 5, and is available.

On May 14, 1969, the continued hearing was held in the Police and Fire Station at 8:00. Although testimony presented at the first hearing was not repeated, there was a large attendance of property owners, business men, and citizens present and all were given an opportunity to speak. Practically all opinions expressed were in opposition to the proposed rezoning. Petitions opposing the rezoning were received from the following:

Mrs. Paul Quigg - 838 Harriet Lane - presented a petition of opposition signed by 106 residents living in the general area west of Eastern Avenue.

Thomas Hunter - 430 Red Barn Lane, Fox Point, presented a petition of opposition signed by 119 Fox Point residents.

Letters in opposition to the proposed rezoning were also received from the following:

- (1) Barrington East Countryside Association.
- (2) Barrington Chamber of Commerce.
- (3) Fox Point Home Owners Association.
- (4) Robert A. Pohlman, 832 Harriet Lane.
- (5) Walter H. Baumgartner, 144 Oak Court.

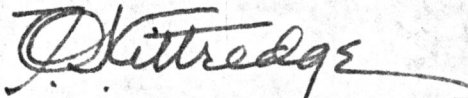
After giving due consideration to all evidence presented at the original and continued hearings, the Plan Commission, by a vote of 5 to 1, recommends that the request for rezoning be denied.

This recommendation is based primarily on two main points:

- (1) The Village is in need of an improved tax base and the Plan Commission does not believe it would be wise at this time to use up for other purposes one of the few remaining pieces of land that is zoned and suitable for a laboratory development such as American Can Co., or Kendall, etc. We believe renewed efforts should be made by Barrington people to attract this type of business to our community.
- (2) The Plan Commission does not believe it advisable to further splinter the business section by creating a large shopping center this far away from the central business section. If this were done it would be in violation with the business growth pattern recommended by our hired professional planners. Further, if apartments were permitted on this property the Village would be in a very weak position to object to some possible future request for a mass apartment development on the land immediately to the east which is outside of the Village and which could drastically change the character of the community.

The dissenting opinion on the Plan Commission believes that the possibility of permitting the shopping center without the apartments should be further explored.

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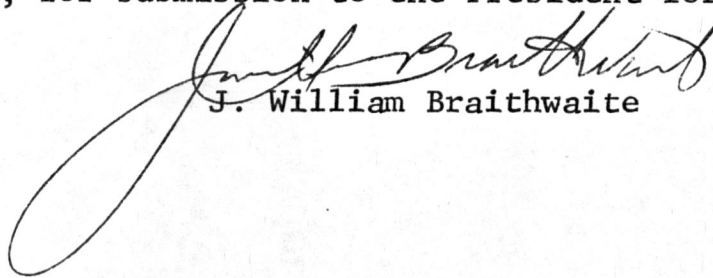

O R D I N A N C E

Ordinance No. 1077

(An Ordinance relative to ninety (90) minute parking for the parking lot South of the C&NWRW between North Hough Street and East Main Street and regulating ingress and egress as to said parking lot.)

(VILLAGE CODE AMENDMENT)

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois that:

SECTION 1: Section 16.1310 of the Municipal Code of Barrington of 1957, as amended, is hereby further amended to add the following paragraph:

"Parking on the leased parking lot immediately South of the right-of-way of the Chicago & North Western Railway, between North Hough Street and East Main Street shall be limited to ninety (90) minutes."

SECTION 2: Article VI of Chapter 16 of the Municipal Code of Barrington of 1957, as amended, is further amended to add a new Section 16.604 as follows:

"16.604 All vehicular traffic entering the leased parking lot immediately South of the Right-of-way of the Chicago & North Western Railway between North Hough Street and East Main Street, shall enter from East Main Street and exit onto North Hough Street."

SECTION 3: Article V of Chapter 16 of the Municipal Code of Barrington of 1957, as amended, is further amended to add a new Section 16.507 as follows:

May 26, 1969, 8 P.M.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER by President F. J. Voss. Present at roll call were Trustees Paul J. Shultz, J. Frank Wyatt, David R. Capulli, A. K. Pierson, Henry G. Sass, Jr. Also present: R. D. Heninger, Village Manager; B. J. Zelsdorf, Finance Director; J. William Braithwaite, Legal Consultant.

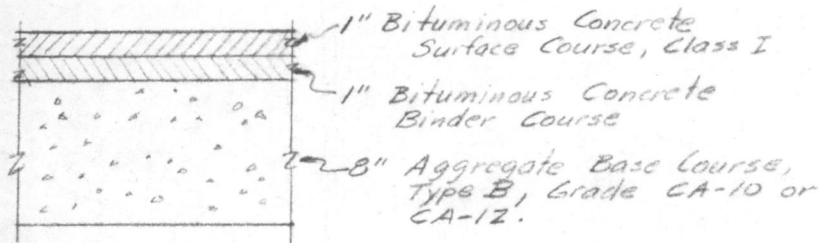

The property described on page 2 of the Ordinance is the Wann property near Wool Street, which is under contract for acquisition by the Village.

Rather than attempting to give you what would be, of necessity, a lengthy explanation of the Ordinance, I urge each of you to read it at least twice - once for general review and then in order to note your particular questions.

I especially invite your attention to Sections 8 and 9 of the Ordinance, pages 10 through 18.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and creating an issue of Motor Vehicle Parking System Revenue Bonds, Series 1969, in the principal amount of \$250,000 of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, providing for the payment, sale and delivery thereof and making certain covenants in that connection.

WHEREAS this Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, in the exercise of its general power and authority to regulate the use of streets in said Village, and further to regulate the traffic thereon, has heretofore created a parking system in the interests of public health, safety, welfare, convenience and necessity; and

WHEREAS this President and Board of Trustees recognizes that existing traffic conditions upon certain streets and in certain areas of the Village are creating additional congestion and disruption of the general use and enjoyment of such streets; and

WHEREAS these conditions necessitate and require that additional parking facilities be acquired and thereafter be maintained and operated by said Village in order that motor vehicular congestion upon certain streets and in certain areas be remedied and effectively controlled for the public health, safety, welfare and convenience and necessity of said Village, including the purchase and acquisition of the following described real estate located in said Village near the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Station and the central business district of said Village in order to provide adequate parking facilities for such off-street parking, viz:

LEGAL DESCRIPTION

Parcel 1. LOT THREE (except the West Five (5) feet thereof) and LOT FOUR (except the Southwesterly Fifty (50) feet thereof) in Nightingale's Subdivision, being a Subdivision of a part of the Northeast Quarter (1/4) of Section 1, Town 42 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Cook County, Illinois, according to the Plat thereof recorded August 26, 1927, as Document No. 9760577 in Book 249 of Plats, Page 1, Cook County, Illinois.

Parcel 2. LOT SIX in Lageschulte's Subdivision of part of the Northeast Quarter (1/4) of Section 1, Town 42 North, Range 9, East of the Third Principal Meridian, according to Plat recorded July 22, 1914, as Document No. 5461938, Cook County, Illinois.

and improve said tracts and other tracts now owned or leased by said Village by grading, draining and surfacing, installing lighting equipment, gates, parking meters, curbs and sidewalks, and all other work, including landscaping, to make all said tracts available for additional off-street parking for motor vehicles to relieve existing and continuing traffic congestion upon the streets of said Village adjacent to the central business district thereof; and

WHEREAS the governing body of said Village has heretofore approved all needful surveys, plans, maps, specifications and an estimate of the cost of the improvements aforesaid, and said proposed parking facilities system has been approved by the Plan Commission of said Village, all of which is now on file for public inspection in the office of the Village Clerk of said Village; and

WHEREAS the total estimated cost as aforesaid is the sum of \$250,000, including legal, engineering and bond discount expenses, and this President and Board of Trustees does hereby determine that it is advisable and necessary that revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$250,000 be issued to pay the cost of acquiring, improving and equipping additional parking facilities in said Village; and

WHEREAS the income and revenue derived and to be derived from the operation of the existing parking facilities of said Village have not heretofore been pledged or hypothecated in whole or in part in any way or for any purpose and said income and revenue will be fully adequate to provide for the payment of the new bonds so proposed to be issued:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That the words "parking system" whenever used in this ordinance, shall be understood to mean and shall include all motor vehicle parking facilities of the Village of Barrington, including specifically, but not limiting the generality of the foregoing, the following:

1. All parking meters or other equipment, machinery or devices for obtaining revenue from on-street parking or from off-street parking.

2. All Village owned or leased or operated parking lots, garages, buildings and other facilities, equipment and accessories used or useful in connection therewith which provide public parking.

3. All real estate and rights in real estate owned or leased by the Village and used or useful in the operation of the motor vehicular parking facilities of said Village.

4. All extensions, improvements, enlargements and additions to motor vehicular parking facilities of said Village which may be acquired by said Village while any of the bonds herein authorized remain outstanding.

5. All intangible property of every nature acquired or used in connection with the operation of the motor vehicular parking facilities, including all franchises, terms, licenses, leases, contracts and agreements.

Section 2. That it is hereby determined and declared necessary for the public benefit, safety and welfare of the Village of Barrington, that its parking system be improved and extended by the purchase and acquisition of additional real estate to provide off-street parking for motor vehicles, by the improvement thereof, and by the purchase of all necessary equipment therefor, together with all necessary legal, bond discount and engineering expenses necessary and incident thereto, all as provided by and described in the preambles of this ordinance.

Section 3. That this President and Board of Trustees has heretofore had prepared an estimate of the cost of such improvements and extensions to the parking system of said Village, and does hereby determine the estimated cost thereof to be the sum of \$250,000, and does hereby determine that the parking system of said Village be improved and extended as described in the preambles of this ordinance, and that all of said parking system be established, maintained, regulated and controlled in accordance with the provisions and terms of this ordinance.

Section 4. That for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring and improving the parking system as hereinabove provided, there shall be and there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued

revenue bonds of said Village in the principal amount of \$250,000, each of which bonds shall be designated "Motor Vehicle Parking System Revenue Bond, Series 1969". Said bonds shall bear date of June 1, 1969, shall be numbered from 1 through 50, inclusive, shall be of the denomination of \$5,000 each, shall bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum, payable December 1, 1969, and semiannually thereafter on June 1 and December 1 of each year and until the principal thereof shall have been paid, and said bonds shall mature on June 1 in the year and in the amount as follows:

<u>Amount</u>	<u>Year</u>
\$250,000	1989

Provided, however, that said bonds shall be callable for redemption prior to maturity at the option of the Village in accordance with the terms and conditions as provided in Section 6 hereof.

Section 5. That both principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank and Trust Company of Barrington, Barrington, Illinois. Said bonds shall be signed by the President and attested by the Village Clerk, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said President and said Village Clerk, and said officials, by the execution of said bonds, shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons. Said bonds, together with interest thereon, shall be payable solely from the revenues derived from the parking system of said Village, and such bonds shall not in any event constitute an indebtedness of the Village within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory limitation.

Any of said bonds may be registered as to principal at any time, prior to maturity, in the name of the holder on the books of the Village in the office of the Village Treasurer as Registrar, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by said

Treasurer and thereafter the principal of such registered bonds shall be payable solely to the registered holder, his legal representatives or assigns. Such registered bonds shall be transferable to another registered holder or back to the bearer only upon presentation to the Treasurer, with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any such bonds shall not affect negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

Notice of such redemption shall be given by registered mail to the registered holder, if known, at the address shown on the books of the Village Treasurer as Registrar, and as to unknown holders, such notice shall be published once a week for at least two consecutive weeks in a newspaper published in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and devoted in part to the publication of financial news, and shall be filed at the place of payment of said bonds. Section 7. That from and after the date that this ordinance becomes effective, the parking system of said Village for the purpose of this ordinance shall be operated on a fiscal year basis, commencing the first day of June and ending the last day of May of each succeeding year, and sufficient revenues derived from the operation of said parking system of said Village shall be set aside as collected and be deposited in a separate fund which is hereby created to be designated as the "Parking System Revenue Fund of the Village of Barrington" which shall be used only in paying the reasonable costs of the maintenance and operation of said system, and paying the principal of and interest upon the bonds of said Village which by their terms are payable from said revenues, and for the creation and maintenance of the several accounts specified in Section 8 hereof, and such Parking System Revenue Fund shall be used for such purposes and is hereby pledged therefor.

Section 8. That there shall be established the following separate accounts in said Parking System Revenue Fund, to be designated

thirty (30) days prior to the date specified for redemption, and said redemption notice shall describe the bonds to be redeemed, the date of redemption, and the place of redemption, which shall be the paying agent as stated in said bonds. After notice of redemption has been given in accordance herewith and funds are on deposit with the paying agent to pay said bonds so to be redeemed, interest thereon shall cease from and after the date of redemption.

Under said Code, and the ordinance adopted pursuant thereto, the revenues derived and to be derived from the operation of the parking system of said Village shall be deposited in a separate fund designated as "Parking System Revenue Fund of the Village of Barrington", which shall be used only in paying the cost of operation and maintenance of the parking system of said Village, paying the principal of and interest on the bonds of said Village that are issued under the authority of said Code and said ordinance, and are payable by their terms only from the revenues of the parking system of said Village, and creating and maintaining the several accounts established by the ordinance authorizing the issue of bonds of which this bond is one.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, have been done and have happened and have been performed in regular and due form of law, and that provision has been made for depositing in said Parking System Revenue Fund sufficient revenues received from the operation of the parking system of said Village to be applied in the manner as set forth in the ordinance pursuant to which this bond is issued; and it is hereby covenanted and agreed that charges and rates will be charged for the use of said parking system sufficient at all times to pay the principal of and interest upon all bonds issued by said Village which are payable solely from the revenues of said parking system and to create and maintain the several accounts established by the ordinance authorizing the issue of bonds of which this bond is one.

This bond may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of said Village in the office of the Treasurer of said Village as Registrar, such registration to be evidenced by notation of said Treasurer on the back hereof, after which no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted hereon, but it may be discharged from such registration by being transferred to bearer, after which it shall be transferable by delivery, but it may be again registered as before. The registration of this bond shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons by delivery merely.

The amounts so deposited shall be used for the payment of interest when due and for the retirement of the bonds

at or prior to maturity and shall be used for no other purpose except moneys in said Interest and Sinking Fund Account shall be used at the option of the Village to redeem the bonds hereunder authorized in advance of maturity or shall be invested in obligations of, or obligations unconditionally guaranteed by, the United States Government yielding income to maturity on the investment of any moneys invested after June 1, 1974, of not less than the interest coupon rate on the bonds. Funds to pay said principal and interest as provided by this ordinance, together with sums sufficient to pay the fees and expenses of the paying agent herein designated, or its successors, shall be transmitted to such paying agent from time to time and at least 30 days prior to the expressed maturity of any principal or interest;

(c) At the time of delivery of the bonds herein authorized the Village hereby covenants to pay into the Bond Reserve Account from available funds the sum of \$20,000 and thereafter, after all payments have been made into the foregoing accounts, there shall next be deposited in the Bond Reserve Account such amounts as may be necessary to maintain said Account in its initial balance of \$20,000, and whenever any money is paid out of said Account payment into said Account shall be resumed and continued until such time as said Account has again been restored to the aggregate amount of \$20,000. Funds held in such Account may be invested from time to time by said Village in United States Government Bonds maturing not more than five (5) years from their date and the proceeds derived from the sale of any such securities and any interest accrued on said securities shall be deposited in said Account;

(d) There shall next be deposited in the Replacement Account such amounts as may be ordered by resolution of the President and Board of Trustees and necessary for the purpose of replacing parking facilities that have ^{been sold or provided - See 977 or name} become obsolete, outworn or unusable except that the funds held in said Account to the extent necessary to prevent or remedy a default in the payment of the interest on or principal of the bonds herein authorized and on such additional parity obligations as may be issued under the provisions of Section 10 hereof shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, and whenever such a transfer is made, the amount so transferred shall be added to the next deposit herein required until full reimbursement to said Replacement Account has been made. Funds held in said Account may be invested from time to time by said Village in United States Government Bonds maturing not more than five (5) years from their date and the proceeds derived from the sale of any such

securities, and all interest accrued on said securities, shall be deposited in said Account; and

(e) All moneys remaining in the parking system fund of said Village at the end of any fiscal year as established by this ordinance after depositing the required amounts in the respective Accounts hereinabove provided for shall be set aside and deposited in the Surplus Account. Not less than 50% of the funds in the Surplus Account shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account for the purpose of accelerating the retirement of the outstanding bonds payable from the revenues of the system prior to maturity and the balance of the funds in said Account may be used for any lawful corporate purpose. Funds held in the Surplus Account may be invested from time to time by said Village in United States Government Bonds maturing not more than five (5) years from their date, and the proceeds derived from the sale of any such securities and any interest accrued on said securities shall be deposited in said Account.

If within any month the revenues of said parking system are insufficient to place the required amounts in any of said Accounts, the deficiency shall be made up the next following month or months after all deposits into all Accounts enjoying a prior claim of revenue have been made in full.

When and so long as the amount held in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account and Bond Reserve Account, from whatever source received, shall be equal to the aggregate principal amount of all of said bonds remaining outstanding, together with interest thereon to maturity, no further payments shall be made in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account.

Section 9. That the Village covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds and coupons hereby authorized that so long as any bond or bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, either as to principal or interest:

(a) The Village will maintain the system in good repair and working order and will operate it efficiently and will faithfully and punctually perform all duties with reference to the system required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and charges for the use of the system, and the segregation and application of the revenues of the system in the manner provided in this ordinance.

(b) That the Village will establish and maintain at all times reasonable fees, charges and rates for the use of all facilities of its parking system sufficient to pay the reasonable costs of operation and maintenance, to pay interest on and principal of all revenue bonds of said Village which by their terms are payable from the revenues of said system, and to provide for the maintenance of the respective accounts as provided in Section 8 of this ordinance and will provide for the collection and deposit thereof, and the segregation and application of the revenues of said system in the manner provided by this ordinance; and that the Village will from time to time make all needful and proper repairs, replacements, additions and betterments to the equipment and facilities of said system so that it may at all times be operated properly and advantageously, and when any parking meter or other equipment or facilities of said system shall have been worn out, destroyed or otherwise unfit for proper use, it shall be promptly replaced or repaired so that the value and efficiency of the facilities shall be at all times

fully maintained, and its revenues unencumbered by reason thereof;

(c) The Village will not permit free parking or service to be supplied by the system to the Village or any department thereof or to any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality, and all persons using any part of the system for the parking of vehicles shall pay for such services the established rate or charge;

(d) That the Village will establish such rules and regulations for the control and operation of said system necessary for the efficient and economical operation thereof, and rates and charges shall be fixed and revised from time to time as may be necessary to produce funds sufficient for all the purposes herein provided;

(e) That the Village will establish such rules and regulations as to the use of such parking system to assure the maximum use or occupancy thereof;

(f) That so long as any of the bonds authorized herein are outstanding the Village will maintain and carry adequate public liability insurance. Said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost;

(g) That the Village will maintain parking meters and collect rates therefrom in the manner required by this ordinance on all public streets where such parking meters are presently located as of the date of the passage of this ordinance, and on such streets and in off-street parking lots where parking meters shall hereafter be located until all of the bonds authorized by this ordinance have been paid in full,

both as to principal and interest; provided, however, this covenant shall not be construed to prohibit necessary changes in the location of such parking meters made necessary by street widening or street closings or substitution or changes in the location of parking meters to provide essential and necessary traffic regulation and control, and which will not materially lessen the then current income and revenues to be derived from such meters and impair the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds authorized;

(h) That the Village will maintain and keep proper books of records and accounts (separate from all other records and accounts of said Village) in which complete entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the said parking system and said Village hereby covenants that it will cause the books and accounts of said parking system to be audited annually by a certified public accountant or accountants and within not more than 60 days after the close of each fiscal year will file with John Nuveen & Co. (Inc.) and the original purchasers of said bonds, complete operating income statements of said system in reasonable detail covering such fiscal year and will furnish upon written request not more than 60 days after the close of each fiscal year copies of such operations and income statements to any holder of any of said bonds and will permit the original purchasers or any holder or holders to inspect at all reasonable times said parking system and all records and accounts and data relating thereto, and to furnish to the original purchasers or any holder or holders of said bonds then outstanding all data and information relating to said system which may be reasonably requested;

Section 10. That it is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any
of the bonds herein authorized to be issued are outstanding no bonds enjoying
a prior claim on the revenues of the system shall be issued; provided, how-
ever, that additional parity bonds equal in all respects with the bonds
herein authorized and payable from the income and revenue derived and to
be derived from the operation of the parking system may be issued if all
of the following conditions are met:

(i) That so long as any of the bonds authorized hereunder are outstanding the Village will not sell, lease, loan, mortgage or in any manner dispose of or encumber said parking system (except as provided in Section 10 hereof) until all of said bonds hereby authorized shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment thereof, and that said Village will take no action in relation to said system which would unfavorably affect the security of the bonds or the prompt payment of principal and interest thereon; provided, however, any of said off-street parking facilities may be leased by said Village in accordance with the provisions of Division 71 of Article 11 of the Illinois Municipal Code, and all income and revenue derived from any such leases shall be deposited in the Parking System Revenue Fund of said Village and applied as in this ordinance provided; and

(j) Any holder of a bond or bonds or any of the coupons of any bond or bonds issued hereunder may either in law or equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceeding, enforce or compel performance of all duties required by this ordinance, including the making and collecting of sufficient charges and rates for the use of said parking system, and the application of the income and revenue therefrom.

Section 10. That it is hereby covenanted and agreed that while any of the bonds herein authorized to be issued are outstanding no bonds enjoying a prior claim on the revenues of the system shall be issued; provided, however, that additional parity bonds equal in all respects with the bonds herein authorized and payable from the income and revenue derived and to be derived from the operation of the parking system may be issued if all of the following conditions are met:

(a) The net revenues derived from the parking system for the fiscal year then immediately preceding must have been equal to one and one-half (1-1/2) times the maximum annual Interest and Sinking Fund Account requirements as scheduled in subparagraph (b) of Section 7 hereof on all bonds then outstanding payable from the revenues of said system and on such additional parity bonds proposed to be issued. The term "net revenues" for the purpose of this subparagraph shall be deemed to be the gross revenues for the fiscal year then immediately preceding after deducting therefrom all operation and maintenance expenses of such preceding completed fiscal year.

(b) All monthly deposits in the Bond Reserve Account must have been made during said fiscal year as required in Section 8 hereof.

Said Village further covenants that if any additional parity bonds are so issued the amounts to be deposited in the Interest and Sinking Fund Account and in the Bond Reserve Account shall be increased in proportion to the principal amount of any additional bonds so issued.

Notwithstanding the above restrictions, if prior to the payment of any of the bonds hereby authorized, it shall be found desirable to refund all or a part of the bonds hereby authorized, said bonds may be refunded notwithstanding the restrictions as to the issuance of additional parity bonds set forth in this Section (with the consent of the holders thereof unless the bonds to be refunded are subject to redemption and provision for call and redemption thereof is duly made) and any refunding bonds so issued shall share ratably and equally in the revenues of said system and the pledge thereof under this ordinance with the portion of the bonds hereby authorized which are not refunded; provided, however, that if only a portion of said outstanding bonds are to be refunded at any time, such obligations shall not be refunded by

bonds bearing interest at a rate greater than the interest rate provided by this ordinance, or maturing at a date earlier than the final maturity of such bonds not refunded.

When the conditions herein specified for the issue of additional parity bonds have been met, then upon the issue thereof any such additional parity bonds, when issued, shall be entitled to the equal and proportionate benefit and security of the pledge of the revenue and income derived and to be derived from the operation of said system, with the bonds herein authorized without preference, priority or distinction as to participation of such pledge or revenue, or in the benefit of one bond or coupon of each of said issues over or from any other issue by reason of priority in execution, issue, delivery or negotiation thereof, or by reason of the date or dates of said bonds, or the date or dates of maturity thereof, or for any other reason whatsoever, the intent hereof being that each and all of said additional parity bonds, as aforesaid, and of coupons evidencing interest thereon shall have the same right and pledge as to payment and security with the same legal effect as if each and all of said bonds and coupons had been executed, issued, delivered and negotiated simultaneously as one proceeding.

Provided, that notwithstanding the foregoing restrictions the Village expressly reserves the right to issue obligations junior and subordinate in their claim on the revenues of the system for the purpose of improving and extending the system, such obligations to mature as to principal not earlier than the final maturity of the bonds herein authorized.

Section 11. That the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and after the issuance of the bonds no changes, additions or alterations of any kind shall be made to this ordinance in any manner except in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, or until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder and the interest thereon shall be paid in full, or unless and until provision shall have been made for the payment of all of said bonds and interest thereon in full.

Section 12. That the sale of the bonds herein authorized to Washington National Insurance Company, Evanston, Illinois, pursuant to contract heretofore entered into and at a price such that the interest cost to the Village of the proceeds received from the sale of the bonds does not exceed 6% per annum based on the annual maturity of such bonds and computed according to standard tables of bond values, is hereby ratified, confirmed and approved and after said bonds have been executed as in this ordinance provided they shall be delivered to said purchasers by the Treasurer hereof and the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds shall be used solely for the purposes herein authorized, all in accordance with plans and specifications therefor, heretofore approved by this President and Board of Trustees, and now on file in the office of the Village Clerk for public inspection. Any surplus remaining after completion of said improvements shall be transferred to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account and applied only toward the payment of principal of and interest on the bonds hereby authorized to be issued.

Section 13. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance.

Section 14. That this ordinance after its passage and approval shall be published once within ten (10) days after passage in the Barrington-Courier Review, being a newspaper published and of general circulation in said Village and shall be in full force in the manner and time as provided by law.
