### Youth Mission Trip 2003: Kentucky

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outh Mission Trip June 14 – 21, 2003: Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church, Lexington, Kentucky.

Maxwell Street hosts youth and young adult workgroups throughout the summer months for an Urban Workcamp. Fifteen youth and five adults from our congregation will arrive on Saturday night. On Sunday, we will assist with the <u>sandwich ministry</u>, attend worship service with the Maxwell Street congregation, and then take the rest of the day to get to know Lexington a little better (or just rest up from our bus trip). On Sunday night, we will participate in

a "simulation" that is designed to prepare us for the week's work by introducing us to some of the obstacles faced by those whom we will be serving.

During the week, small groups are dispatched to various social agencies throughout the city, including the <u>Hope</u> <u>Center</u>, <u>Kids' Café</u>, and <u>God's Pantry</u> (a local food bank). Occasionally, the groups help



Maxwell Street renovate the properties in which Mission work is done, such as the East 7th Street property and D.J.'s. We will also conduct our own devotional time, which this year is based on 1 Corinthians 13.

Evening activities include a cookout, a pool party, and an end of the week banquet on Thursday night to celebrate the week's work.

The team will give a report to our congregation at a Sunday Worship service in August.

Please keep these young people and their adult chaperones in your thoughts and prayers as they live our Vision as a welcoming, caring family of faith as they Worship, Serve, Support and Share.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Each morning, I read several newspapers in an attempt to remain current with the news from the international, national, state and local scenes. Often, having read reports about Chechen bombings, mass graves in Iraq, terrorist actions in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, another murder trial for Terry Nichols in Oklahoma City, and student suspensions for hazing in Glenbrook School District, I find myself asking this question in a variety of ways. Is there any hope for a better world without war, without

threat of terrorist bombings, without crime and delinquency? Is there any hope for a world without human folly and cruelty, without hostility and animosity in human relationships, without the unhappiness and anxiety that now prevail in so many lives?

Different people, of course, give quite different answers to this question. A few flatly say, "No! There is no hope for a better world. The world has always been in trouble and will always be in trouble. War will always exist; mass murders will always take place, adult and juvenile crime will always be part of our social dealing with one another." The people who make these statements believe that human beings lean toward perversion and are always capable of iniquity. Therefore, the world will never be any better. You are wasting your energy. You might as well try to make winter into summer, or a dark, dreary day into a bright, sunny day. The best you can do is to survive with as much grace and fortitude as possible.

I would like to suggest that the Christian answer to this question is very different. Christians passionately say, "Yes! There is hope for a better world. We hope for a new world. We hope for our world to be completely transformed and transfigured, not by us, but by God!" Christians understand this hope in this way. Take a person. You saw her two years ago and, when you saw her, there was no light in her eye, no spring in her step, and no lilt in her voice – just a blank look in her face. Then you saw her yesterday. She was alive, alert, bright and full of interest. She wasn't another person; she was a new person! You ask "How? What did you do?" And she simply replies, "When I least expected it, something happened to me; something was done to me. I saw what life was all about for the first time. I am new!"

Christians believe that real changes, the vital and radical changes, come through people who themselves have been changed. We are not asked to make the world better, but to be better people, and consequently do what we can to make a better world. In the last book in the New Testament, St. John reminds us of this high calling, "And I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away."

**April 28 – Finance**: we are a little behind on pledges. Statements are sent out three times a year; they will be sent out in early May.

**Presbytery** – Mr. Spike recapped the meeting where the moderator of the General Assembly spoke.

**Communication** – Several new members have been added to the committee. Plans have been formulated to address a web site upgrade, brochures, letterhead and the bulletin and Carillon as well as some advertising in the Yellow Pages.

Mission – Approved a Mission Trip to Costa Rica in 2004 to the same church as was visited this year, to help build the church and have fellowship with the congregation. Approved the annual San Marcos golf outing. This committee is exploring having a garage sale in September.

**Music Search** – Phase II will begin, asking for feedback from the congregation and Session to allow all who wish to provide input to do so. Phases III will be the recruitment of a Music Ministry Staff.

**Personnel** – The Personnel Policy Manual was finalized and approved.

Nominating – Laura Semmen has accepted a position as Deacon, class of 2005. A Congregational Meeting will be held on June 1, 2003 at 10:00 a.m. to elect her.

**Chancel Guild** – will be selling magnolia wreaths and swags for the 2003 Christmas holiday season.

Building Use – approved District 220 Educational Foundation's use of the parking lot on June 18 and 19 for a fund raising event in the area.

**Building** – Finalized the 4-year plan for building repair needs for the Stewardship Committee meeting.

### **Nominating Committee Seeks Potential Officers**

The congregation's Nominating Committee invites your input as they search for people to be nominated to serve as church officers. The officers will be elected in October 2003 to take office in January 2004. These are three-year terms with officers serving until December 2006.

The Nominating Committee will review all suggestions as they select nominees to be presented to the congregation for election in late October. You must submit your recommendation no later than AUGUST 31, 2003.

The following officers are being sought to serve for a three-year term:

- 7 Elder Nominees: Elders serve on the Session, which is the governing board of the congregation. The Session has oversight of all church programs, budgeting, and use of the church building. Elders chair the church committees. Elders are ordained to this office.
- **6 Deacon Nominees:** The Board of Deacons, working under the direction of the Session carries out ministries of pastoral care and hospitality. Deacons are ordained to this office.
- **4 Trustee Nominees:** The Board of Trustees, under the direction of the Session, oversees the maintenance of the church buildings and property. Trustees manage the church finances. Trustees are installed to this office.
- 5 Nominating Committee Members-at-Large from the congregation to serve a one year term. The Nominating committee meets annually to consider new officers. They also provide initial training for new incoming officers each November. The Nominating Committee also maintains the security and data integrity for the Skills Database in the church computer.

You may submit your own name for consideration. Please keep the following guidelines in mind as you suggest potential nominees. **Each nominee must:** 

- ♦ Be regular in Worship attendance
- ♦ Faithfully pledge to the annual operating budget
- Be able to make sound decisions for the welfare of the entire congregation
- Be the only person in his/her family presently serving as a church officer

### Growing Our Stephen Ministry Program

On May 18th at the eleven o'clock service, five more Stephen Ministers were commissioned following the completion of 50 hours of training. They join our existing 12 Stephen Ministers, and our Stephen Leaders, Nancy Dolan, Linda McGurer and Nancy Nadig, bringing the total of equipped and caring Stephen Ministers to 20. \*The people with an asterisk before their names are our newly commissioned Stephen Ministers.

Each Stephen Minister is equipped and eager to do as Paul asked us to do in Galatians 6:2 Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ. As we strive to follow Christ in this way, it is helpful to reflect that the words "one another" or "each other" are used over 50 times in the New Testament. What this tells us is that God did not create us to be independent. He created us to be interdependent. We are made in his own image - to be loving, caring, and forgiving. He created us to need one another. "It is not good that man should be alone." (Genesis 2:18)

Also note that these passages do not simply say "bear other's burdens" or "love other's." The "one another" or "each other" phrase gives them a reciprocal meaning: I will bear your burdens, and you will bear mine. In this sense, an openness to Christian caring is not just being willing to care for and help others. It is also being willing to be cared for and be helped by others. For many that part can be much more difficult.

Stephen Ministers care for people experiencing divorce, the death of a loved one, hospitalization, loss of a job, a terminal illness, a relocation, the birth of a child, an empty nest, the transition into retirement, loneliness, a spiritual crisis - the list goes on and on. Many of these needs might otherwise go unnoticed or slip through the cracks because we would have lacked the staff to meet them. With Stephen Ministry, we have a team of well-trained Christian caregivers who can provide care in these situations.

We encourage all members of our church family to experience the love of Christ through a Stephen Minister whenever life becomes too difficult, whatever the cause. To quote Curt Baxter from his sermon on May 18th, Stephen Ministry is a magical wonderful experience that takes place within the challenging and mysterious realm of loving human relationships. When a Stephen Minister shares the love of Christ with a person, not just the ordinary coffee hour concern that takes place between church people, but REALLY share the love of Christ, then care giver and care receiver become REAL to one another. In that process, care giver and care receiver are magically changed and transformed by the love of Christ.

### Summer Reading

Is there anything better on a lazy summer day than a good book? Check out our Church Library for books you've been meaning to read and look for our interesting new acquisitions.

Desire Of The Everlasting Hills: The World Before and After Jesus, by Thomas Cahill. A beautifully narrated book-on-tape which paints a picture of the Greek, Jewish and Roman world in the time of Jesus. Cahill presents the life of Jesus by examining the Gospels in light of the particular perspective of each of the Gospel authors. Particularly interesting is the portrait of Paul, who he was and who he became. Cahill makes an effort to dispel some previous ideas about Paul's alleged misogynism.

Whose Land? Whose Promise?--What Christians are not being told about Israel and the Palestinians, by Gary Burge, Wheaton College Professor of New Testament. This book examines the crisis in the Middle East from a Christian perspective; how to balance commitment to Judaism, injustice and the plight of Arab Christians and Muslim Palestinians.

Modern Physics And Ancient Faith, by Stephen M. Barr. "A physicist at the University of Delaware deploys his scientific expertise to challenge the dogmas of materialism and to assert his belief that nothing explains the order of the galaxies better than divine design. Neither religiously sectarian nor technically daunting, this is a book that invites the widest range of readers to ponder the deepest kind of questions."

### Music Search Committee Progress Update

The Music Search
Committee has been working
diligently to lay the groundwork
for conducting the search for a
permanent Director of Music and

a permanent Organist. We have been focused on the following:

- Learning the scope of responsibilities for each position.
- Reviewing and updating working position descriptions.
- Creating a set of working goals that will point us in the right direction

- Gathering information from same-size churches to understand the many models that exist in our vicinity
- Informing Session of our progress

The three goals we have established to begin our process are:

- To maintain the elements, at a minimum, of the current music ministry
- To evaluate the potential and realistic growth of the music ministry program
- To increase the level of participation of congregational volunteers in creating and supporting new music programs

In late April, Session approved our proposed goals, position descriptions and action plan. Our next step is to seek input and opinions from the Congregation through use of informal conversation and feedback groups and a short survey. This input will be used to form the foundation of our strategic plan for the Music Ministry going forward. In soliciting input, we bear in mind that we are a diverse Congregation with varied needs and opinions, and the Committee's goal will be to implement as many ideas shared as meet the most needs of our members.

After receiving Congregational input, we will compile the data and share with Session our results prior to actions being taken. The final step will be the actual search and recruitment of permanent Music Ministry Staff.
