In <u>Pursuit of Happiness</u>, psychologist David G. Myers made some surprising discoveries. Among his findings was the realization that "we act our way into a new way of thinking" far more than thinking our way into a new way of acting. Marriage counselors make the same point by advising clients to "fake it until you make it."

Myers concludes that most people are as happy as they make up their minds to be. Abraham Lincoln, a man who suffered melancholy came to this same conclusion. I am not talking about chemical depression that must be treated with pharmaceuticals. I am talking about the vast majority of people who do not have such a barrier, but live with the "up to us privilege of choosing" the direction of love and happiness.

C. S. Lewis also considered this issue and wrote about his "rule of love." "The rule for all of us is perfectly simple. Do not waste time bothering whether you 'love your neighbor;' act as if you did. As soon as we do this we find one of the great secrets. When you are behaving as if you loved someone, you will presently come to love them. If you injure someone you dislike, you will find yourself disliking that person more. If you do them a good turn, you will find yourself disliking the person less. Whenever we do good to another self, just because it is a self, made like us by God, and desiring its own happiness as we desire ours, we shall have learned to love another a little more or, at least, to dislike them less."

Jesus taught us "to love [our] neighbor as [ourselves]." His words were not so much a command as they were an instruction which in the end is the best favor that we can do for ourselves.

Session and Deacons

Notes from the Joint Meeting of Session and Deacons on August 23.

Deacons Report: At the October meeting Deacons



will, for the first time, incorporate prayer during parts of the agenda besides just at the beginning and the end of the meeting. Prayers during meetings can be sung, or even subliminal, so that we are mindful of the hand of God working in our presence. When difficult decisions are being made, many times it makes sense to pray before making a decision.

One new program the Deacons will be offering is a "Rides" program to transport members to church. Insurance cards of potential drivers will be copied to ensure that there are no insurance issues.

It was suggested that the number of Deacons be expanded from 18 to 24, in order to continue the services they offer: Hospitality, In-Home Communion, Welcome gifts. This would also allow the Deacons to increase the services they could offer, such as calling congregants that have missed 3 services in a row, for example. If the number is increased, it should be done over 3 years (2 additional Deacons each year). It was recommended that the youth get involved in the work of the Deacons, to further increase the ability of the Deacons to meet the needs of the congregation.

Trustee Report: Kris Howard reviewed the June/July financial statements and said that we are on budget and that there are no outstanding issues to be concerned about. The Trustees are in the process of consolidating the accounts to one bank – Harris Bank. Kris said they are becoming much more efficient, saving time and money.

The newly-developed Financial Policies and Procedures manual was discussed and approved for implementation. These guidelines will be used in the future to manage the finances of the church. One addition to the manual was a process to follow when bids are given. **Christian Ed**: There is a need for more volunteers to help with the Christian Education programs. During the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services, committee members will solicit the congregation, asking for more support for these programs in terms of much-needed volunteers.

Personnel: Our Sexton, Peter Schmidt, will begin a 20 hour work week while student teaching. A cleaning service has been hired to clean 20 hours a week. Peter expects to complete his student teaching by mid-December, after which he will work at the church on a full time basis until August 2005 when he expects to have a full time teaching job.

Worship: Anna Armstrong presented the 2005 Communion Schedule which was approved.

Finances: The 2005 Budget was presented. It was put together by the Trustees based on input from the individual committees. For purposes of our Stewardship campaign, a \$715,000 goal was approved. This represents a 6% increase in giving from 2004.

Trustees

At the September meeting, the Board of Trustees reviewed church finances through August 30, 2004. Expenses are within budget but there is a revenue shortfall. This is not unusual at this time of year as busy families who are often out of town during the summer get behind on pledge payments. The Trustees ask members to please bring pledges up to date as soon as possible as lack of receipts has a negative effect on necessary cash flow to pay monthly bills!

The Trustees continue to review and act upon current building needs. During the past month, flooring was changed and additional railings added to the choir loft to bring it up to code. This was a safety issue. The Trustees are also volunteering their services as painters! The choir room has been completely repainted and work is underway to repaint all the colorful classroom doors, inside and out, on the lower floor. Additional painting projects are on the horizon. Major building and grounds challenges still face us and are under review.

Donations Of Stock

Each year some church members choose to make generous contributions to our church by donating appreciated stock. The church office is prepared to handle these gifts and, of course, they are most welcome! However, in order to properly track donations of stocks by specific donor, it is critical that our accountant, Patty Griffin, receive written or emailed (pgriffin@pcbarrington.org) notice from you providing details about the gift. On August 30, 2004, we received two stock donations whose origins are unknown: 75 shares of Walgreen stock and 70 shares of Credo Peter Corp. stock. If you donated either of these, please let Patty Griffin know. For the future, if you donate stock, please include your name, the type of security, number of shares, and estimated date of transfer. Stephen Ministry

Caring Ministry Workshop

Saturday, November 6, 9:00 a.m. - Noon

Are you interested in learning how to be an active listener, providing care in a distinctively Christian way? If so, you are invited to attend a Caring Ministry Workshop sponsored by Stephen Ministry St Louis. The workshop is scheduled for Saturday, November 6, from 9:00 am. to 12:00 noon in Fellowship Hall and will be led by Kevin Scott, a member of the Stephen Ministry executive staff.

Invitations have been sent to churches in the surrounding area. The fee is \$15 per person, or \$50 per congregation (4 or more). All members of our congregation are invited to attend free of charge. Members of the Session and Deacons are especially encouraged to attend so that they may enhance their caring gifts as they perform their duties as church leaders. However, the content of the workshop is geared to any individual who is in a care-giving role or would like to become a more caring Christian.

In the first session of the workshop, "Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief," participants learn about the grief process - the stages of grief and how to minister in each of those stages. They will gain the skills and confidence to care better for individuals who are grieving.

The second session provides an in-depth look at the Stephen Series, including Stephen Ministry, which has become an integral part of Christian caring in our congregation.

The final session of the workshop defines "How to Care in a Distinctively Christian Way." Participants learn what makes Christian care-giving unique and how they can use such resources as prayer, blessings, and Scripture in their caring for others. In addition, there will be a resource table allowing those attending to look over and/or purchase books which may be helpful in developing their Christian caring skills.

22nd Annual Barrington Area CROP WALK



Calvin Institute for Worship and Arts Symposium

Concert at Fourth Presbyterian Church


The choir of St. Giles Cathedral, Edinburgh, will present a concert at Fourth Presbyterian Church, 126 East Chestnut, Chicago, on Wednesday, October 20 at 7:30 p.m. Music by William Byrd, Thomas Tallis, Edward Elgar, Charles Stanford, James Macmillan and Benjamin Britten will be performed. A freewill offering will be received. The Cathedral Choir is made up of thirty adult singers drawn from a wide variety of walks of life from the City of Edinburgh and



beyond. Their main task is singing of the two Sunday morning choral services under the direction of The Master of the Music, Michael Harris. Parish Life

Organ Dedication – Joy Hague



Most in the congregation are aware of the extensive restoration that took place on the organ in the first part of the year 2004. The Möller organ, built and installed brand-new in 1966, was donated by the Henry and Maude Beard and the Nosler Families, parishioners at PCB. In 1984 as part of a major renovation of the church, Maude Beard contributed funds for some additions to be made to the organ. Upon the her death in 2002, PCB was given a memorial gift from the Beard estate in the amount of \$48,000. It is to be expected that in the space of almost 40 years, there would need to be some major repair and restoration of the organ. The Session and Trustees chose to honor the Beards for their talents and musical gifts to the church by using the funds to address

those repair issues with this timely gift.

The work was done by Ericksen, Christian & Associates and took approximately three months to complete. This was a major job, which included replacing electronic circuitry, and adding solid state combination action, which eliminates the need for leather, magnets and various other parts of the old electropneumatic system. It also included installing a midi system, which was provided with the solid state system. A multi-level memory system was installed, and six more general pistons added. Many have mentioned that the organ sounds very wonderful, while some have commented that they hardly noticed any changes. I can certainly attest to the fact that the instrument is much more reliable and easily managed than before, not to mention my pleasure at having a whole new rank of viola celeste pipes. Thank you to the Trustees and Session for making it all happen.

In commemoration of the completion of this task, the Church will have a special service at 10:00 A.M. on October 31 to rededicate the organ. The Ministry Team has spent time and effort to plan just the right kind of program, designed, of course, to praise, thank, glorify and honor God.
