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Mission Trip 2004: Wapato, Washington The Campbell Farm June 19 – 27, 2004



“Caring for God’s World – From the Ground Up”

The Campbell Farm is a Mission Station, small conference/retreat center and a 40 acre working farm on the Yakama Reservation sponsored by Central Washington Presbytery. A group of our youth and parents met and searched for sites that would provide the ministry opportunities they were seeking. After careful consideration of several sites, the Campbell Farm in Wapato, Washington was chosen.

The Campbell Farm has several missions:

- To build bridges of understanding between multiple cultures, as well as providing hands-on experience and training in mission.** The Yakama reservation is comprised of one third Native American, a third Hispanic and a third Caucasian, Asian and others. Each culture has its own history, struggles and gifts that add to the wonder of this place. Our youth will be involved in providing a Vacation Bible School program, assisting in the Campbell Farm’s teen mid-week outreach BBQ, facilitating park district-like programs and light construction/painting to residents of the reservation.

- To provide space for individual and group spiritual reflection.** Through a combination of program already provided, as well as our own youth developed and led evening devotions, this trip will allow for the deepening of faith for all.

This is the first in a series of articles that will appear in the Carillon to help inform you of the upcoming mission trip. A parent/youth informational meeting is being scheduled that will outline further trip details, as well as explain the point system and the fund-raising schedule. Watch your mail for more details.

Yakama Nation Facts: The Nation is made up of fourteen bands/tribes who live on 1.4 million acres of land.

Notes from the meeting on July 28

A Session Training Seminar, led by Dr. Reynolds, will be held on September 13 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall.

Expenses remain behind budget and pledging is somewhat ahead of plan.

Pledges that are received via Visa/MC cost the church \$3.22 per \$100 pledged.

Building: Gutters and downspouts are being repaired or replaced. The water in the south corner has also been rerouted to help stop the puddles in the front of the church in the upper parking lot. Planned are the painting of the north quadrant of the building and the purchasing of the Minolta copy machine.

Bequest: Trustees discussed used of funds from Maud Baird's estate.

Christian Ed: A revised Sunday CE program was presented.. It includes: a nursery program at 8:45 to noon; a program for 3-4 year olds at 9:00 – 10:20; a program for kindergarteners at 9:20 – 10:20; a program for 1st – 4th grade at 9:20 – 10:20 using a purchased rotational curriculum.; a traditional classroom setting for 5th – 6th graders using I Know My Bible at 9:20 – 10:20. No CE program will be provided at the 11:00 service.

Deacons: Members will be divided into four parishes based on the alphabet instead of location. One focus is elder care and attention, visiting those unable to attend church on a regular basis.

Music/Worship: Dan Spike gave an overview of Extended Communion Service in which Communion is extended beyond the confines of the church and given to those unable to attend church. The intent is to begin offering extended communion to congregants for the first time on September 7, 2003. Training will be held sometime in August. Possibly all future elders should participate in this training and this service would be part of their responsibility as elders.

Future Meetings: Session will meet August 25, September 22 and October 20. There will be a Congregational meeting on October 26.

Trustees

The meeting scheduled for August 11 was cancelled due to a lack of a quorum. Trustees will meet on September 8 and October 13.

Outreach Is Everybody's Business

When newcomers visit a church, they weigh numerous factors in their decision to join. An important issue is the worship service and quality of the preaching. A simple "I don't believe we have met" and an introduction does not make assumptions about a person's membership status, it might even help our members to get to know one another better! If you identify a visitor, please make sure that they meet Dr. Baxter or Rev. Spike. And, if you are going to coffee hour or Adult Ed., consider inviting them to join you.

Crossroads



Our church is at a crossroads. We completed a challenging Visioning Process which revealed our hopes for the future. Collectively we said we wanted the Presbyterian Church of Barrington to be:

- A church which provides meaningful worship experiences and guidance as we individually seek to grow in Christian faith
- A church with a vibrant youth ministry for the benefit of our children
- A church which is visible in the community, active in mission work at home and abroad

As you all know, we are moving ahead with the Stephen Ministry, the Discipleship program, expanded youth programs, new Christian Education curriculum, worship and mission initiatives. Budgetary constraints, however, are a roadblock to future success. The results of this year's pledge campaign will determine which fork in the road we take.

We ask you to prayerfully consider what God wants us to do. Our gifts of personal time and talents and our financial support of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington will determine the nature of our congregation. Are we going to remain a small, resource-starved church on the hill, focused inwardly and offering only basic services, or are we going to meet our Christian responsibilities with the energy and excellence that our Visioning Process forecast?

Each of us is an important part of this decision. What does God require of us? What personal effort can we contribute? Are we bringing our talents and our fair share of financial support to the church? Are we proactive or do we sit back and wait to be asked?

Ask yourself if you are currently giving at least your fair share of \$3,000 per family of four, or \$1,800 per couple. Then consider increasing your pledge for fiscal 2004 by 10%, which is what our budget requires if the church is to move toward its vision. If you are unable to give at the suggested level, please decide how much you can increase your pledge.

Also think about your service to the church and its beneficiaries. Volunteers are needed to serve on church boards, in Christian education, on building upkeep, and in Parish activities such as Shepherds for new members and Prayer Partners. Our mission activities also are carried out primarily by volunteers.

The future vision for the church is our responsibility now.

Home of the Sparrow Kitchen Kits

On Thursday, October 2nd, at 10:45 a.m. BPW will gather to assemble "kitchen kits" for the women at Home of the Sparrow who have successfully completed the rigorous program whose cornerstone is education, job training and employment. The goal is to transition homeless women and their children into permanent housing and provide them with an opportunity to improve their life-style and well-being. For nearly the last five consecutive years less than 1% of the clients who completed the HOS program have returned to homelessness.

The mission of HOS is "to eliminate hunger, homelessness and joblessness by guiding individuals and communities through a continuum of comprehensive, compassionate programming designed to enhance self-respect, independence and self-reliance."

Home of the Sparrow has assisted over 2,000 women and children since its creation in December of 1986, and has assisted countless others, including intact families and men, in seeking ways to overcome their homeless dilemma. Home of the Sparrow continues to be a model transitional shelter project throughout the state of Illinois with facilities in Palatine, Crystal Lake, McHenry, and Woodstock.

Concerns were also expressed about the appropriateness of some music, the need for help learning new hymns and a wish for the music at the beginning of the service to be more conducive to meditation and preparation for worship. The worship committee and ministerial staff will give a great deal of consideration to these concerns as well as others.

We are now ready to move forward with our search and interview process and hope to have a permanent music director and organist in place in the not to distant future.

Deacons Reorganize into a Parish Ministry Program

Over the past several months, and with much prayer and discussion with the Ministry Team, the Deacons elected to transition into a Parish Ministry Program. This program will be phased in over a period of several months.

Parish #1: Members A-E: Mark Layne – Leader, Nancy Bohren, Tom Burke, Sally Hilgendorf.


Parish #2: Members F-L: Ruth Shepard – Leader, Ginger Glantz, Ralph Menick, Lou McCloud.


Microsoft Word Template Experts Needed

New Church Logo Unveiled

Recently the Session approved the introduction of a graphic identity program for all church communication that includes the use of a new church logo. You'll soon see redesigned versions of the Sunday Bulletin, Carillon, web site, and other church communication.

The Communications Committee of the Session reviewed all the Church's current communication with the intent of designing materials to make them more consistent in appearance and easier to read. The logo was created so that we have a simple, visual religious symbol to begin using in our congregational and outreach communications.

The program being introduced also will include templates making it easy for committees and others to create materials using the standards and logo.

The logo itself is a Celtic cross with radiant beams of light shining forth representing our Presbyterian heritage (and the focal point of the sanctuary) and the vision of our Church to "worship, support, serve, and share." Here you see the black and white version. A color version exists as well and will be displayed on a poster in the Church.

What about the illustrative depiction of the Church that has been used on the bulletin and other materials? We intend to continue using the illustration where appropriate, however its size and detail make it difficult to use as a "logo". We intend to find ways to weave the best of what we have with the new materials being developed.
