Dear Friends in Christ,

The summer is a good time to re-think what you are doing, and no less for me and for my thoughts of our church family's life. As I think about the arrival of September, I give thanks for the Adult Choir and Handbell Choir and appreciate how important they are in giving us the music of heaven.

At a conference on worship that I attended, I heard a presenter say that the only announcements worth making are the ones worth praying. The conviction arises from the understanding that everything about worship is directed to God, and is not directed to the worshippers. It was a strong statement and one that got me thinking about the kind of announcements we make in our worship and how essential or unessential they may be at times. Do they in fact serve as a prayer? Perhaps as a member of our Ministry Team leads us in prayer, we need to lift before God and God's people the life of our church family as we carry our worship to the life of the larger community in Barrington. I like that approach to that part of worship service we call "Common Concerns."

During the discussion about announcements, I also thought about what kind of welcome people receive as they visit our services. Therefore, I asked the presenter, "Isn't it appropriate to announce that visitors are welcome and tell them where coffee is available after the service?" The presenter looked at me as if I had said something foul. "People know whether a church is friendly within the first three minutes they are in the building." I've been pondering that statement ever since.

Every Sunday there are visitors in our pews. Some will never return, some are looking for a church home, some have been here many times and are still not sure whether commitment to membership is the right decision. Regardless of the reason for being here, it's important for us to express a warm welcome and a genuine interest in all who worship God among us.

So, please join me in doing all you can to be a part of the warm welcome and hospitality that everyone should experience at The Presbyterian Church of Barrington. We are, after all, all visitors in this, God's house, sojourners on earth and fellow pilgrims seeking strength for the journey of faith. Be kind and welcoming of one another in Christ's name.

Stephen Ministry

Caring in Aisle #7



In addition to meeting regularly with a Care Receiver, a Stephen Minister often encounters situations in day-to-day life in which he or she uses Stephen Ministry Skills. In the following account, a Stephen

Minister from a church in another state tells about a chance encounter in which she used her Stephen Ministry skills with a neighbor.

Last week in the check out line at a store near my home I ran into a woman from my neighborhood. I did not know her all that well; mainly we crossed paths from time to time when we were each taking our morning walks. It had been a month or so since I had last seen her, so I said, "I haven't seen you in a while. How are you?" When she looked at me, tears suddenly welled up in her eyes, and she then told me her husband had died 2 weeks ago.

Immediately my "Stephen Ministry instincts" took over and I began caring for her. The clerk caught on to what was happening – my neighbor and I were the only two in line – and he said, "Take all the time you need." He put the chain across the line and moved to another register. My neighbor and I stood there talking for about an hour. She did most of the talking while I

listened and when we got ready to leave, I told her that if she needed to talk more, she should give me a call. I also told her about Stephen Ministry at church and the possibility that we could match her up with someone to meet with her and care for her on an on going basis.

Afterward I realized again how valuable my Stephen Ministry training was. When you ask someone, "How are you" you are really never expect much of a response. Prior to becoming a Stephen Minister, I know what I would have done. Probably I would have stumbled along a bit and then come up with a reason to cut off the conversation. Since I have had my Stephen Ministry training, I knew what to do, and I had some level of confidence jumping in and doing it. I have no doubt this was one of those God-things – that God planned for our paths to cross at the checkout line. I'm so glad that I was able to be there and listen to her when she needed me, and I felt I made a difference.


Deacons

Deacon's Corner, Gus Leep

My introduction to my spiritual walk began at my "beginning". My parents were committed Christians, as were all other members of my family. My earliest memory of "formal" instruction was in the Sunday School class for 4 or 5 year olds, taught by my Grandmother, at the Broadway Christian Church in Louisville, KY. I progressed through succeeding Sunday School classes, some of them taught by other relatives, until ending my Sunday School experience in the High School class, taught by my father. It was there I met Bernice.

After our marriage, years later, in whatever city we found ourselves, and there were many, our first "order of business" was to find a church. As opportunities presented themselves, we both served in various capacities, offering our gifts in the service of Christ and the congregation. When here I was asked to serve as Deacon, I saw an opportunity, once again, to serve Christ as best I could.

A Deacon's responsibility is not a complex, mind-boggling task. It is a fabric of simple, loving expressions of Christ's love: taking flowers to the sick, a rose and food to new parents, sending cards of congratulations to new graduates, remembering



birthday and wedding anniversary dates with greetings, arranging for Sunday morning greeters and coffee hosts, visiting the sick and first-time visitors and serving communion.

One of the first mentions of the office of Deacon is in Paul's letter to the Philippians, written about 60-63 A.D. The earliest significant outline of Christian worship is found in Justin Martyr, 1st Apology, about 155 A.D.:

"And on the day called Sunday an assembly is held in one place of all who live in town or country, and the records of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read for as long as time allows. Then, when the reader has finished, the president in a discourse admonishes and exhorts us to imitate these good things. Then we all stand up together and send up prayers and when we have finished praying, bread and wine and water are brought up, and the president likewise sends up prayers and thanksgivings to the best of his ability, and the people assent, saying Amen; and the elements over which thanks have been given are distributed, and everyone partakes; and they are sent through the deacons to those who are not present."

Those of us who serve, or have served, as Deacons are members of a great galaxy of Christians who have served Christ in loving service to others.



Christian Education

Monday Morning Lectionary Bible Study For Adults



Each Monday morning, starting at 9:30 a.m., a Lectionary Bible Study is held in our Parlor. Depending on who is preaching on the upcoming Sunday, either Dr. Baxter, Mr. Spike or Ms. Armstrong-Hansche will discuss and explain the readings for that particular

Sunday to help make your worship experience more meaningful. We took a hiatus in August, but will start again Monday, September 12, the Monday after Labor Day. All members of the congregation are encouraged to attend, and bring an interested friend.

Sunday Morning Adult Education

There will be opportunities every Sunday at 10:15 a.m. for adults to expand their Christian knowledge. On the 2nd and 3rd Sundays, we'll present "Pathways to the Holy." The program on the 1st, 4th and 5th Sundays will be "An Understanding of the New Testament." All Adult Education classes will be held in the Parlor.

2nd and 3rd Sundays

Our new season starts off with two lectures by Mr. Lucas Livingston, the Senior Programs Coordinator of Museum Education at the Art Institute of Chicago.

On **September 11**, he will present "Longing to See God: Exploring paintings, sculpture and carvings."

On **September 18**, the topic will be "Longing to Touch the Holy: Exploring relics, tapestry, icons, and mosaics."

We will examine the didactic and narrative qualities conveyed through Christian art while drawing parallels from the Old and New Testaments. In our investigation of the iconography of God and our

aniconic symbolism for Him, we draw parallels from past and present religions of the world and delve deep into the origin of our beliefs and faith. We will also examine the impact of the Reformation and Counter-Reformation on our notion of the Lord as expressed through art and see how modern and contemporary artists are tackling this issue that has incensed, confounded, fascinated, and inspired us for centuries.

1st, 4th, and 5th Sundays

Starting **September 25** on the 1st, 4th and 5th Sundays, we will be presenting a series entitled, "An Understanding of the New Testament." This video course will focus on the books of Mark, Matthew, Luke and John. A facilitator will guide you through the program, which was designed by Professor Bart D. Ehrman, Chair of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He received his Ph.D., which focused on early Christianity in its Greco-Roman environment, magna cum laude from Princeton Theological Seminary. Our first class will feature "The Earliest Traditions of Jesus."

Wednesday Evening Adult Class

Beginning on October 5 and continuing through November 16, from 7:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m., Dr. Baxter will present a class on Prayer. This class will be suitable for people who are new to prayer as well as people who have been praying for decades. Participants will have the opportunity to explore what they believe about prayer and what their image of God is, and they will be introduced to different kinds of prayer. Another exciting Wednesday Night Live session begins on September 21st. WNL provides an opportunity for children and youth in Kindergarten through 8th grade to enjoy fellowship, dinner, Bible lessons, and creative activities. The schedule runs in coordination with the public school year, with meetings on most Wednesday nights in each of the autumn, winter and spring semesters.

K-6th grade children attend from 5:15 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and 7th-8th graders from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The entire group gathers at 6:30 p.m. for a wonderful dinner prepared by adult volunteers. On a typical night we have 25-40 children and 8-12 adult volunteers, all coordinated by Melissa Armstrong-Hansche, Director of Christian Education. K-6th graders enjoy a variety of games, music, bible lessons and other activities. 8th grade Confirmants and 7th graders gather after dinner for social time in the Youth Lounge, followed by a bible lesson. This year the 7th and 8th graders look forward to expanding our successful “Llama Project” where last year we raised funds to send 2 llamas, 1 rabbit, and a flock of chicks to a needy, rural family overseas through Heifer Project International.

We also are looking for additional volunteers to work with the kids. You can lead games, art projects, music, or Bible lessons. We have lots of excellent material to work with, so don’t feel you have to be an expert in education or the Bible. Dedication of Banners, September 11

The Worship Study Task Force, seeking ways to encourage and enhance connections with God through our worship services, attended Calvin College's Symposium on Christian Worship in January. With the knowledge gained, the team has made bringing visual arts to our worship

services a priority. The first project is the creation of seasonal banners, which are a contemporary tradition used to create a visual connection with God. Designed by Marla Florio, and sewn by over fifty members of the congregation, the first set of banners celebrates Psalm 150, which calls us to praise God in his sanctuary. The image of the up-stretched hands, with the support of the congregation demonstrates the growing strength of coming together to praise God through Jesus Christ. The magenta pillars are the growing strength. The circles rising up are the congregation. The green up-raised-hand shape out-lined with black and gold is the praise. The shimmery area opposite the blue field is the Lord. The black and gold out-lined circle is Christ.

In the coming months, Marla and the Worship Study Task Force will solicit ideas and help from members of the congregation to design and produce additional banners that will ultimately inspire our church members during all of the seasons of the church year. With great joy, we will dedicate these beautiful banners on Sunday, September 11, at both the 9:00 a.m. and the 11:00 a.m. services.

Just drop it in the green wheelbarrow.

You might have noticed canned goods in the wheelbarrow as well as fresh produce. Our surrounding Food Pantries have anywhere from 10 to 400 families receiving food each month, with the range of 20 to 1600 visits per month. The system doesn't work without our support. There's got to be some extra nonperishable goods in your pantries to share. Both of these opportunities to give are new directions for PCB. Let's show each other that we are willing to share with others less fortunate in our neighborhoods. We will be collecting the fresh produce until September 11. It is hoped that we will be collecting the canned goods ~ for the foreseeable future.

CROP WALK/Church World Service

Save the Date: October 16th is the day for this year's CROP Walk. The walk is either 6.2 miles or 1 mile (you choose). The purpose of the walk is to raise money to alleviate hunger; 25% of the proceeds stay in the area of the Walk.

One of the local recipients of the last few years is the FISH Food Pantry. It's open from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings. During these six hours each week, they have nearly 1650 visits; 350-400 families count on FISH to provide food.

During the week of August 8th, Church World Service (CWS) is providing emergency assistance to families in Niger, who have been affected by severe food shortages due to drought and locusts. In addition, CWS is responding to the floods in India and Pakistan. They are continuing to provide emergency assistance to families in Sudan, while encouraging peace there.

Golf Outing, Monday, October 3 To Benefit Nueva Esperanza Scholarship Program




