## SULLY'S RAPID RISE.

Incidents in the Deposed "Cotton King's" Career.

### AGGRESSIVE IN HIS METHODS.

...FELTON Bull Leader a Picturesque Figure in the Market—Was a Paragon of Making Money Friends, and Making Enemies, and was a Victim Due to His Performance, Striking Features of his Business Career.

...Daniel J. Sully, the deposed "cotton king" is probably the most picturesque figure that ever entered the cotton market, says the New York Times. A man of commanding appearance, he possesses the face of a conqueror, and his manner and it was to a great extent owing to his aggressive methods, that he was able to rule the market as he did. He was born in Providence in 1861 and has been in some branch of the cotton trade ever since he first entered that trade in 1880. He began as a clerk with Ripley M. Wood & Co., who were then in the lead, but who later were ousted to New York. From that firm he went to the F. W. Hurdine company in Providence, who do a large spot cotton business. He traveled for them as a salesman among the mills of New England, and his wide acquaintance in the cotton trade dates from that time. After he began as a clerk with the savings and small profits in cotton he was able to buy out the firm of his own firm, which he turned into a company, whose president he became. He was in the market in 1892, that time came to New York. He had then become convinced that the crop of that year would be a very small one, and that price in the market. In early January he entered the market, within a few days he had accumulated profits of \$50,000 and he thought it was about time to "take his money home." Mr. Sully, who is now a well-to-do man, has since then stayed on the ground, that he had a good thing. Mr. Sully stayed and soon began to trade for himself. Before long he was enjoying a good sized lot of cotton futures and was beginning to make money for himself. His operations were aggressive and quite different from those of the other kind well known before. He was attracted to a new way, and with his support he found it not difficult to bid the market up. Before any one was aware of it he had succeeded in cornering the May option in the New York market. He was in a position to take all the shorts, and it was then that his general partner, who was a small man, was killed by his partner's gun. So it was that when the news of the general partner's death was given, the market was tilted over to the other side there were everywhere sounds of groups for the million leader.

After engineering the May corner in 1893 Mr. Sully for the time being withdrew from the market. He had made a fortune variously estimated at from \$400,000 to \$500,000, the true figure being probably correct, but what is more, he had made a reputation which served him in good stead in his later operations.

In August of last year he formed a partnership with R. P. M. Moran and went to do business as a broker as well as for his own account. He soon conceived the idea that the present crop would be a small one, and he started out not only to take in the cotton market, but also to take in the world that his idea of a corner was the right one. His very steady did not wait during the last few weeks his theory proved some hard knocks, which rather undermined the faith of his followers.

In December last Mr. Sully got out a crop estimate which placed the crop at
