Power of It Is Just Church

as Vital as It Ever Was

Perhaps, from the point of view of a journalist who has lapsed into personal neglect of his early training, and does not go to church, there is an impression abroad that people do not go as much as they used to, but the church attendance is just as big and universal as it was when—well, when we were boys. The religious sprint is increadicable, as permanent an element of our lives as the air we breathe, or the ideals we appire to, or the love of good that is in us. All history shows it, all modern conclusions show it, the law of the land stands firmly by it.

The church is just as availing in its spiritual

law of the land stands firmly by it.

The church is just as availing in its spiritual power over those who do not attend it as over those who do. Its subtle influence, ministering in universally complex forms to men and women, critized and uncivilized, is a profound undercurrent of modern

uncivilized, is a profound undercurrent of modern living.

Precedent is our chief ally, in spite of ultramodern prediction, and there is no power in all the history of the world that has taken precedence over the people so great as the world and spiritual doctrines of the church. Christendom is inborn, fabred in human nature, and its holy places are the supremely tender judiciaries of human defects. There is always a reverse side to quality, which are its defects, but these spots are the clean impulses of human aspiration and do not destroy the quality; they merely emphasize its value.

There seems to be every indication that we are approaching a time when the Protestant church in America, England, New Zealand, Australia, Africa, Ropert's Land will be united in one vast denomination.

But, in any event, the religious instinct in human nature the world over is undying, undaunted. People may belong to one church or another, or they may wander away from existing denominations entirely and create a sect-or creed or some other worshipful impulse entirely new and heretafore unknown, but the human aspiration toward a divine quality in character is universal.

I believe that so long as clergymen preach in a manly, straightforward, simple way, bearing always in mind the spiritual significance of their calling, they will always have congregations. I see no necessity to adopt sensational methods, to make any unusual or startling appeal from the pulpit. Christendom needs no advertising, the Christian spirit is modest and undemonstrative, the strength of it lies in the dignity of unshaken faith. It is indestructible, unimpeachable.

Laws That Govern Man's

When experience and reason have When experience and reason nave proved to a man that a stone always falls to the earth he regards the law as infallible, and always expects it to be accomplished. But when he is taught in the same way that his will is subject to laws he does not believe it, and cannot believe it.

**Experience and reason may prove to man time and again that under the same conditions and with the same temperament he always will act in the same way, but when for the thousandth time he begins to act under the specified conditions with temperament unchanged, he is just as sure as he was in the first place to act in accordance with his own will.

Every man, whether he be a philosopher or a savage, may know by experisance and reason there cannot possibly be two different actions under precisely the same conditions, and yet if he did not believe in the absurd-possibility, which is the essence of free will, he would believe life itself to be impossible.

Although it seems impossible, he feels sure that it is true, for if he cannot have free will he cannot understand life, and he cannot live

According to ethics, man is dependent upon his natural temperament and the influences with which he is surrounded, and the question is, What is the faculty developed by consciousness of free will which enables man to distinguish between good and evil?

New state conservation commissions have been reported to the national conservation commissions are and four a week, and many national organizations devoted to special lines of progress are coming forward with conservation committees of their own.

Various bureaus of the federal government are rapidly pushing work on the inventory of resources in order that a preliminary report may be placed before the national conservation commission at its meeting in December. Inquiries have gone out to special agents in the several fields of government service, to bureaus of astatistics, to county and town authorities, to manufactures and dealers, to transportation companies and to farmers. The inquiries relate to farm, timber and mineral lands, to crops and crop production, to trigation, navigation and water power, to land and water transportation, to timber and mineral resources and even to the condition of the country's live stock, game and flab. 
