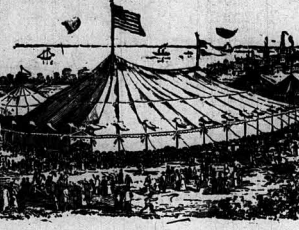

MUST HAVE LICENSE. THE CROWD WAS LARGE. What Others Say of Terry's Uncle Tom's Cabin Which is Coming Here.

Barbering was brought under state regulation on an act of the state legislature and the governor has signed the measure requiring the examination of all persons who share other trades and will trim others behind their own.

Within 90 days every barber in the state will have to pay a license fee of \$1, and secure a certificate of registration, which he must renew annually. Every one practicing the art and business may obtain their certificate without examination.

The barbers coming along hereafter will have to stand a test before the examining board which is created by the act, and a fee of \$1 will be required. Hereafter an applicant will be obliged to show that he has worked three years as an apprentice, that he has studied three years in a barber school or that he has practiced for three years in this or that state. His work demonstrates his ability to use the straight razor, and must prove that he has sound knowledge of the ordinary barbering work.

The passage of this law, which became effective July 1, will work quite a change in the barbering business. It will require that barbering be done in a sanitary condition and it permits the closure of a shop in which a disease has been communicated to a patron. The examiners are also inspectors and are authorized to enter a barbering establishment in business hours and advertised list.
