Headings that Are Making History—Information Gathered From All over the World and Given in a Few Lines.

Washington

President Taft extended to Japan through the nation's great Admiral Kato the highest honor, the Order of the Rising Sun in honor of the Japanese ambassador, an invitation to join the United States Great Britain and France, the great world movement for international peace.
