Public Interest Now Centered In Village, Township and County Contests for Office.

Village Primary.
The same political contest of this spring are more than compensated for by the village primary election, which now occupies the center of the stage. The primary will be held on next Monday morning, the polls opening at 7 o'clock and closing at 8 o'clock. The editor of the Review, Miss T. Lamy, is a candidate for reelection to the office of president of the village board of the three outgoing trustees. George J. Hager, H. J. Lagacinski and Wm. Peters are also candidates for reelection. Henry Dunlop is also a candidate for office of trustee. Mr. A. P. Hawley is opposing Mr. Lamy for president and is opposed by Mr. J. B. Johnson in both instances and is very active in his campaign. The names will be filed, Mr. Lamy's name preceding that of Mr. Hawley and Mr. Johnson following the latter in the following order: Hager, Lagacinski, Dunlop, Peters, Mr. Johnson, Mr. Lamy, Mr. Johnson, Mr. Dunlop, only changing his mind at the last minute. It is under these conditions, Mr. Dunlop states, that he contemplates running for office. Mr. Peters has been a candidate but would not have been a candidate had he not expressed a desire to be a candidate. He has allowed his name to be placed on the ballot as it is determined to make a fair and equitable contest. The opinion of most people that the race, as far as the trusteeship is concerned, is between Mr. Lamy and Mr. Johnson.

County Interest is being taken in the primary and a large vote is being cast. It is impossible to make predictions but in two days should be removed.

Barrington Township Election.

To the Voters of the Village of Barrington:
It appears that a story is being circulated that the selection of a candidate for president of the board Saturday is to settle the sewer question. As a candidate for that office I do not understand that the president of the board is to decide that important question.

Here is what has happened during the past year:
The board of trustees by unanimous vote directed the board of local improvements to secure the services of an engineer to make an estimate of the cost of such a system and submit it to the taxpayers of the village.

The engineer was employed and the proposition submitted to the people at a public hearing. The majority of the taxpayers appeared to be against the building of a sewer system. The board of local improvements, a James Hager and Plagge reported to the board of trustees, that under these conditions they would not recommend the passing of an ordinance in accord with the work. There was the sewer question rest.

Personally, I am frank to say: I believe that Barrington needs a sewer system. However, I am a local engineer, if not tall enough, to not let my personal opinions influence me in spite of the wishes of a majority of the taxpayers on questions of public improvement.

I have served you for several years and am willing that you should look into my record and if you find that it will permit of your support Saturday I shall be pleased to have your vote.
