YOUTH'S SAD DEATH

Prank Jahnholtz, Twenty-two Years Old, Flet Death in Horri-ble Manner When Caught in Fly Wheel.

and killed instantly.

The tragedy took place on the MoGraw farm occupied by Andrew Grom.
The engine, which was one of the

room to shut it off. An instant later a
yeninger brother, Fred, who was passing the door, saw him whireld around,
and rushed in to find him lying on the
door, dead. It is presumed that he
disconnected the batteries, and, attempling to remove the belt before the
engine had lost momenteum, was
caught in the belt or fly wheel. His
head was bruised, his skull crushed,
and an ankle broken, and it is evident
what he was killed almost instantly, as,
if he had cried out, his brother would
have heard him.

The body was brought to Barrington
that afternoon and taken to E. M.
Blocke' undertaking rooms where an
inquest was held by Lake County
Deputy Coroner Courad of Wankegan,
and a verdict of accidental death in
accordance with the above fastes returned.


