The citizens of communities furnishing work pay certain expenses connected with that work as for example the cost of materials used. The citizens are doing this to provide employment for their unfortunate neighbors.

From a common sense viewpoint it is an economic waste to spend part of the relief funds transporting men from Chicago to Nilos Center to do relief work when there are idle men living in Niles Center. Under the system now followed, Chicago men may be sent to Barrington when there is work to be done here, Barrington men to Des Plaines when there is work to be done there, Des Plaines men to Edison Park, and so forth on a regular merry-corporated.
