Blanke Defends Repair of North Hough St. Sewer

Reads 11 Page Report on Gjelefeld Line at Board Meeting

The village of Barrington is morally obligated to maintain and repair the Hough street sanitary sewer main and its lift pump which is a connecting outlet for sewage flow from the Jewel park system to the village sanitary sewer main near Hough street and the K. J. & E. tracks, according to an opinion expressed by Trustee John Blanke at the regular board meeting Monday night.

Mr. Blanke's opinion was read in conclusion to a lengthy report on the status of the Hough street main which was installed by the Gjelefeld Construction Co. in 1929 for the purpose of giving the Jewel park system an outlet.

There has been considerable discussion about that sewer which was installed by the engineer without a definite contract from the village and without the due legal process of spreading a property assessment to pay for it.

The sewer was planned by the village engineers of Suhr, Berryman, Peterson, and Suhr as part of a comprehensive extension of the village system to include service to property at the outlying edges of town. The comprehensive system was abandoned later because of the pending law suit against the village in which Barrington Hills Country Club et al were complainants. However, the Jewel's private system was under construction when the plan was dropped and without the village sanitary sewer extension, it would not have an outlet. A "gentleman's agreement" was said to have been reached by which the Jewel's private system was to be paid later from property assessment by which the Gjelefeld Construction Co. would install the connecting link and would be paid later from property assessment by which the sewer system extension program was carried out.

The court injunction against Barrington using Flank creek as an outlet has greatly dimmed the prospect of the proposed extension ever being put in, with the result that the Gjelefeld Co. is in a peculiar situation in regard to getting remuneration for its work. It has filed a bill against the village for \$15,021.10, but no village board has acknowledged this debt.

Several trustees (during the last few years) have taken the stand that the village does not own the sewer, did not order it and should not pay for it. Elden Gliske, president of the present board, believes that the village should not take such steps as improving the system or replacing the worn out lift pump as this might be interpreted as legal acknowledgment that the village owns the sewer and is obligated to pay for it. The main was installed to serve certain property and should be paid for by assessment on the property it serves according to this viewpoint.

Trustee Blanke as chairman of the sewer and water committee has taken the attitude that in repairing the pump, the village does not alter its status relative to the Hough street line. He summarized his eleven page single spaced report on the subject as follows:

"An application of the law cited above to the North Hough street sewer and sewer lift proves conclusively that the village of Barrington has a duty and is obligated to maintain, repair and operate the Jewel park sanitary sewer, the North Hough street sewer."
