List Rules for Keeping Health in Cold Weather

What the average individual can do to keep healthy during fall and winter is told in a bulletin issued today by the medical committee of the Illinois tuberculosis association.

Rules listed by the association for cold weather health are as follows:

1. Go to your doctor for a physical examination. Beginning ailments may be detected while there is opportunity for early correction.

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2. Eat fat, starches and sugars for body heat, but do not neglect fruits and cooked vegetables and fruits for minerals, vitamins and roughage.

3. Do not "go stale" through lack of exercise. Physical activity for the normal person is just as essential in winter as summer.

4. Get some sunshine, but not strained through glass windows, but directly.

5. Avoid coughers and sneezers, as they spread disease germs. If you catch a cold, do not neglect it.

6. Sleep at least eight hours in every 24. Drink approximately two quarts of liquid daily.

7. Be moderate in all things. Diseases more readily attack the over-tired, the over-fed, and the under-washed.

8. Wash hands, face and feet after meals, after using public places, and after touching anything that may be contaminated.

9. Avoid crowded places, especially in public buildings, and avoid public places where there is a large gathering of people.

10. Avoid public places where there is a large gathering of people.
