## Judge Dismisses Motions in School and Village Suit

In a letter addressed to the village board, D. R. Maloney, village attorney, reported on progress of the case of the village of Barrington versus directors and trustees of schools and the school treasurers of districts in Cuba and Barrington townships. The case was opened for hearing before Judge Nimmer in the superior court of Cook county Tuesday as result of a motion by attorneys representing directors of school districts to dismiss the suit. It is on the claim that they are not proper parties to the suit, and as result of a motion by attorneys for the remaining school trustees and directors to quash service and dismiss the suit.

## The treasurer turned over to the schools all funds shown to be to their credit on his books, so that the treasurer is not on his own responsibility sought, to save the schools from any loss for money deposited in the State bank which was required to absorb the entire loss resulting from the funds which had been deposited in the State bank. You will recall that the audit of the school funds prepared by an auditor who at that time had no previous connection with the village of Barrington showed that the schools had deposited in the First State Bank of Barrington a sum greatly in excess of the amount of money withdrawn for school purposes and that the schools had drawn out of the First National Bank more money than had been withdrawn.

## It therefore would seem that this case is one of whether or not one municipality can spend the funds of another municipality.
