The Barrington Country Day school held the Christmas exercises in the new building on the country line road here beyond the village limits. The six great windows and open fireplace in the dormitory made a festive scene for the Christmas home warming. During the reception, goods were moved in and regular work began this Saturday.

The school children respond to the color and beauty of the new building. Its spaciousness and air-conditioned sanitary setup. The Episcopal Sunday school uses the big play room at 9:10 a. m. every morning. On Monday afternoon this reception room is used for dancing class.
