#### LAROR SINCE THE NRA

Proposals to revive the NRA, to establish a 30-hour w and to extend the back-door NRA represented by the Walsh-Healey government contracts act, combine to make particular-ly timely the study of changes in wages, hours and employ-ment since NRA, compiled by the National Industrial Con-

The gains in volume of production and industrial pros-

The gains in volume of production and industrial proserity since the supreme court declared NRA unconstitutional in May, 1303, are too well known to call for further emphasis. But the gains of labor are also striking.

Under the NRA hourly wage rates were advanced nearly 25 per cent. When the NRA was thrown out, it was widely declared that these gains would be lost. Reports and rumors of wage cuts were frequent. But on the average, there has been no reduction in hourly wage rates since NRA terminated to the control of the con ated. Average weekly earlings, which mean more to workers, have actually increased 15 per cent compared with those in the NRA period. Even when allowance is made for a slight increase in the cost of living since then, the purchasing power of wages in September, 1936, was still 6.4 per cent higher than the average during the period of NRA. ### LAWFUL PURPOSE

The legal status of the simple strike has been definitely settled in favor of its legality if the strike is for what the courts call a "lawful purpose." The supreme court of the United States in 1921 said:

"The right to combine for such a lawful purpose has in many years not been denied in any court. The strike became a lawful instrument in a lawful economic struggle."

There is disagreement, however, on what constitutes a lawful purpose. All courts agree that these purposes include strikes for higher wages, shorter hours and improved work.
