

H. Kropp, Native of Elka Township, Is Buried Monday

Funeral services for Henry Kropp, life-long resident of Elka Township, were held at St. Peter's church in Lake Zurich Monday afternoon with Rev. E. J. von Esling, pastor in Lake Zurich, officiating.

He was 82 years of age and died at his residence Friday of a heart ailment from which he had suffered for some time. His condition had grown worse several days before his death.

Henry Kropp was born on Feb. 27, 1854, at Elka, in Lake Zurich. He married Miss Sophia Albert at the home of his bride in Prairie View April 7, 1883.

He is survived by Mrs. Della Large of Chicago, Mrs. Rose Paul of Elka and Mrs. Lydia Sandman of Elka, his three daughters. Fred Large, William Koder, of Palestine and Mrs. William Schmitt and Mrs. William Koder, of Palestine and Mrs. Sophia Schmitt of Mundeville, Illinois, are his grandchildren.

Unusual Accident Takes Two Lives

Two men are dead as a result of an accident in a motor car which occurred under strange circumstances on Route 1, near Grove road, about three miles south of Palestine, Monday afternoon. The fact that there were no witnesses to the accident, under conditions arising from it, adds to its unusualness.

The man killed was Jack Taylor, 12 1/2 of Millard avenue, Chicago, a medicine salesman, who had been covering this territory for several years, and Louis Benhart of Rome, Illinois, an employee of the freight department of the Milwaukee railroad.

Taylor's body was found about 60 feet from the scene of the crash in a field at the southeast corner of the intersection. The body was about 18 feet from his car, which had not been overturned.

Benhart's body was found near his car, which had apparently been lifted from the body by some one unknown.

The accident, as reconstructed by County Officer Peter Krawkowski on the appearance of the wrecked cars, was caused by the two cars creating together on the intersection. Taylor was apparently in the rear seat on Pine Grove road and Benhart was headed east on Route 1. Apparently both drivers had tried to swerve out of the way of the other, but were too late in their efforts.

Dr. Alfred Wolfarth of Mt. Prospect and another surgeon were apparently the first persons to come upon the scene. Dr. Wolfarth saw a car about a half a mile from the tip of his at the intersection, the doctor also stopped. Both men were dead when Dr. Wolfarth reached them and Benhart's car was resting upon its side.

Dr. Wolfarth and another surgeon near the scene of the accident and notified county highway police.

Other Krawkowski testified on the inquest that some farmer named Prind had called the police and that he had been unable to locate him as yet. Relatives of Benhart attended the inquest at Arlington Heights, Tuesday morning.

Arlington Heights Man Released From Maulaughter Suit

Walter Loren, North State road, Arlington Heights, was released from a charge of maulaughter in his original case in Cook county February 17. Last September 1936 Loren was driving a car on North State road which struck William Schmitt, who was crossing the road on his way home. Mr. Schmitt died in the Palestine Community hospital six weeks later.

The case had been kept alive largely through the efforts of the family and Officer Bock, who at first assigned from the Arlington Heights police department. It was reported.

The defense of Mr. Loren was handled by Attorney Frank P. Talabi of the Palestine, who attributed the injury to Mr. Schmitt as having been accidental.

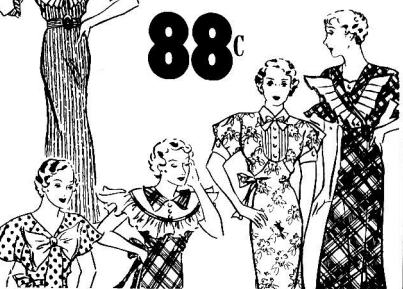
