The Barrington public library has just received its first shipment of books purchased with the funds appropriated by the last general assembly for state aid in the state of Illinois, for the second year.

Through the Library Relief Fund, it has been able to add to the shelves a group of 84 new books, including a set of Dickens in readable type. This is the second shipment of the Barrington library's share of the fund which was divided into a sum to be used by the library for two years.

Last year the main purchase was a set of the new World Book Encyclopedia. This year an especial effort had been made to buy books for high school reading, and to build up the children's and adult shelves with some of the classics in a readable attractive print.
