L. Graham Named Member of County Zoning Committee

Supervisors in Lake County Take Steps to Remove Unsightly Spots

Lloyd Graham of Barrington was appointed a member of the newly organized Lake county zoning board to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings and property at a meeting of the board of supervisors in Waukegan Monday. John J. Hogan, Waukegan township clerk, is chairman of the board with Attorney Harold Tallett of North Chicago, Supervisor David VanPatten of Wadsworth, Ray Dixon of Waukegan, County Surveyor James Anderson Jr., of Lake Forest, Mr. Graham, and T. R. Wyles of Highland Park as members.

Institution of a zoning board is a step toward paving the way for the elimination of unsightly junk yards and "auto graveyards." The movement was proposed following the passage of a law by the general assembly allowing county zoning.

This zoning board, appointed by Chairman Homer T. Cook with the approval of the entire board of supervisors, will prepare a resolution to recommend zoning districts for various purposes in the rural sections of the county, outside of incorporated villages and cities.

Use of this plan, when the zoning limitations as set up by the zoning board in a resolution are approved by the board of supervisors, complaints may be heard against property owners whose land or buildings are used for enterprises contrary to the limitations of the zoning restrictions.

The main purpose of the zoning of county property is to prevent the further use of property bordering state highways for "auto graveyards" and to eliminate dumping and unsightly scenes on land adjoining main highways in the county.
