

Urges Immediate Payment of Cook County 1936 Tax

These figures are in sharp contrast to those of the two preceding years. The 1934 tax sale disposed of only 17 items the total delinquency of \$534.36, while the sale of 1935 taxes disposed of only 13 items which taxes amounted to \$457, and these figures are for both city and country town tax sales.
The sales in the country towns will continue for another two weeks and Mr. Lindheimer strongly stressed the point that property owners can avert the sale of their property only by paying the delinquency. The treasurer has no

power to stop the sale or grant extensions of time after the order of sale has been entered by the county court.
In order to retain the property after the tax buyer has a tax lien against it, the owner must pay interest at the rate of 12% every six months to the holder of the lien, which is the rate of interest received by the county.
At the end of two years if the lien holder has kept up the tax payments on the property he may receive title to it, and the owner must then pay the holder of the lien any price asked in order to retain the title to his property.
A New York syndicate, with strong financial backing, has been doing most of the buying throughout the sale, Mr. Lindheimer said.
