

Suburban Residence Construction Gets Off to Good Start

Home building in the Chicago suburban region got almost as good a start in 1939 as it did in March of last year, according to figures compiled this week by the National Bureau of Economic Research. Permits were issued for 151 homes in the Chicago area in January, 1939, as compared with 143 in January 1938. The total value of permits issued for 1939 homes in the Chicago area was \$4,146,456. The January total for 1938 was \$3,850,000. The better start in 1939 was due in part to the fact that the winter months were less severe than in 1938.
