UNION BECOMES HOUSECLEANING

"Scores of millions of dollars have been lost to the workmen of the Chicago area in the last 20 years through the medium of a small number of men... H. Macy, general manager of the Lands Avar in a statement today...

"The present Wildobist strike is an instance of the kind of terrorism that has brought about the stagnation of the building industry in Chicago. In one year recently there were over twenty hotels leased in Miami, Florida, than in Chicago. What does Chicago labor gain from that situation? Empty pockets seems to be the answer."

"We lose place to a foreign racketeer who often never did a honest day's work in his life. Some of our Chicago men of the old Capone mob have found soft berths as heads of labor unions. They gouge the monthly dues from the pockets of the honest workmen by glittering promises of high wages (how many workmen have ever had a chance to spend any of those high wages in the past seven or eight years) and they use their shagbriers to drive more men into the unions so they can get there."

"There's been a lot of talk in the papers the last few days about an election among the Wildobist employees. There ought to be several elections... among the unions where the union members could elect their own officers, with an honest judge to preside and a platoon of police to protect him. Honest union leadership would do much for Chicago. It would be tough, but it would be honest."

"The supreme court's decision that government employees may sue for a government job is known by all Chicagoans, opens the way to stopping the issuance of any additional tax-free government bonds, by Congress will pass a bill to that effect. According to the legal expert, the principle is identical and there is no question in the minds of those who hold that governments securities must be always tax free."

And, as matters stand now, when private industry issues into the money market for the capital needed for expansion and improvement, it cannot compete with the tax-free issue. More and more of the nation's wealth is going into non-productive channels—at the expense of private employment and opportunity."

The court decision making possible the taxation of government workers on the same basis as private workers is a long step in the right direction. The next step should be a referendum by congress to permit the issuance of any more tax-free securities.

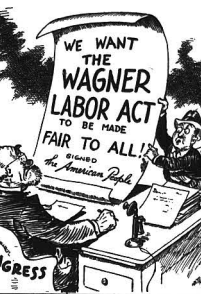
