New Law Charges \$25 "Investigation Fee"

Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes announced this week that under the provisions of a bill recently passed by the legislature, a motor vehicle which is purchased in this state for the purpose of being taken out of the state for a period of 90 days or more, shall be required to pay an investigation fee of \$25 in addition to the fee for title and license.
