As friends of Mrs. Jerome A. Straka, former resident of Barrington, will be pleased to learn she and her two children fled safely from Warsaw, Poland, in time to avoid any of the dangers of war which broke out on September 4. Mrs. and Mrs. W. N. Threlwell of Barrington received a letter this week from Mrs. Straka, informing them that she and the children left Warsaw on the Wednesday before August 23 and landed in Copenhagen on the 25th.

Mrs. Straka will be in Warsaw at the time the letter was written. Mrs. Straka expected her husband would be able to leave the country. He is in charge of sales for the Palmolive-Post Co. According to the Poland foreign office, government officials had promised assurance would be exerted on the week-end of August 23th, but they did not anticipate many would begin a military campaign.

Mrs. Straka fled the country in company with a group of other American women and children. When she left there were four American women left.

Food for Children

As long as children are growing, they need more food in proportion to their size than grown-ups need. Children need the most food for their size when they are growing the fastest and when they are most active; that is, when they are babies and again when they are in their teens. Thus, too, some of the most common foods that are good for all ages should be prepared differently for children than for grown-ups.
