

Christmas Mailing Gets Started at Local Postoffice

L. B. Paddock, Postmaster Reports Gain After Quiet November

The first heavy influx of Christmas mail was received at the Barrington post office early in the morning of December 6. L. B. Paddock, postmaster, reported after an inactive period during November that the volume of mail was well up to normal during November. Paddock said, "We probably brought about by the fact that little of our shipping of parcels to Europe is being carried out."
