

Hix and West Get 1-Year in House of Correction

Judge John Prystalski Passes Sentence on Two Youths Friday Morning

Lois Hix of Barrington and her uncle, Fred West, of Wisconsin were sentenced to one year in the House of Correction by Judge John Prystalski in the Cook county court Friday morning.

Hix and West were also implicated in the burglary of two Barrington places in voluntary confessions given to Chief of Police E. W. Hix, who cooperated with the Park Ridge police in bringing the youths to trial. The young men are said to have confessed entering the R. B. Wells home on West Lake street on October 26 and the Harold M. Keele place on Hart street on October 31.

In passing sentence on Hix and West, Judge Prystalski took into consideration the fact that they were also indicted for carrying guns and had confessed to entering the two houses in Barrington.

Funeral services for Walter W. Seaverns, 135 W. Lake street, engineer of the Illinois Bell Telephone Co. and secretary of the Barrington volunteer fire department, were held at the funeral chapel, 149 W. Main street, Tuesday afternoon. Rev. C. R. Druse, pastor of the First Baptist church, officiated and burial was held in Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Seaverns died at his home here Saturday night, following a lengthy illness. He was born in Miller, S. D., on May 12, 1870 and his family moved to Barrington in 1908, which was his residence until the time of his death. Mr. Seaverns entered the employ of the telephone company at an early age, and on August 16, 1919, received special recognition for three years of property years' service. He was a member of the local fire department for 12 years and 25 years belonged to the local Masonic lodge.

Proposed Zoning Changes Meet No Open Opposition

Reclassification of Property Discussed at Public Hearing Friday

Without opposition from the 13 residents present at the public hearing Friday night in village hall, the board of appeals passed the zoning ordinance. Three of the changes concerned placing of three residences of property now class B in the class C class. Class C permits the erection of three-family or multiple family dwellings.

Two of the districts changed included property between Main and Franklin streets in blocks D and E and the other change concerned the north one-half of blocks 8 and 12 fronting on the south side of Lake street.

The major portion of the public hearing was devoted to a discussion of establishing a building line 20 feet west of the west line of George street, Nolan Workman, Okla.; Cery and J. R. Murphy, who own homes on George street, were present in the interest of having the building line established. George street is 33 feet wide and those property owners on the east side of that street objected to the building line property owners, whose boundary of George street, using their street for alleged alley purposes.
