

"Dancing Co-Ed" Is Coming to Catlow Screen on Sunday

"They Shall Have Music" for Scout Cabin Fund, Here Christmas Day

In "Fast and Furious" showing at the Catlow theatre Friday and Saturday, Ruth Hosmer and Mary Beth Hudson at last settle the screen battle they started in "The Women." Library report for the month of November, 1933:

Book Collection — During the month the library added a total of 84 books to its shelves. Among these were 20 adult books added, and 17 gift books added. There were also 47 children's books purchased this month, for Book Week children's displays. The library now has a total of 8984 books.

Registrations—A total of 19 new children's cards and nine new adult cards were issued, making a total of 1233 borrowers now taking circulation.—There was another

fine record shown in book circulation in the library the past month with 3743 books borrowed. Out of these 1212 were adult books and 1531 were children's books. There were 128 adult magazines and 26 children's magazines borrowed. The largest daily circulation was 243 books and the smallest 193. The monthly gain was 231 books.
