A regular meeting of the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held on August 28, 1972 at 7:30 P.M. at Community Consolidated Countryside School in the Village of Barrington Hills.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as corrected.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Mr. Welby noted the change in account numbers in July report. Copies of new account numbers were distributed to all Board members. A motion was made and seconded approving the Treasurer's Report. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded approving the bills for payment.

Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, noone absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Tucker then presented the 1972-72 Levy Ordinance to the Board for approval. After hearing an explanation of it's function, a motion was made and seconded approving the Ordinance (72-8).

Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, noone absent. Ordinance adopted.

A second Ordinance, that dealing with the addition al levy for Roads and bridges was presented. Motion made and seconded approving the Ordinance. (72-9) Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays,

noone absent. Ordinance was adopted.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress noted that the Illinois
Commerce Commission had granted the requested extension for the
work on Hart Road. It is to be completed by November 15th, 1972.

Bids for the MET Contract on Hart Road will be opened at 11:00 A.M. on August 31. A motion was made and seconded to authorize acceptance of the low bid at that time so that work can begin. Roll call. 6 ayes, no mays, noone absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Fentress gave an interim report on the Merri-Oaks Cuba Road bridge. Mr. Fentress and the Cuba Township engineer loaded a truck to capacity and crossed the bridge with no visual effects. Lake County has agreed to re-examine it and send another report.

Mr. Grigsby suggested a survey of users and personally recommended retaining the narrow country feeling.

Mr. Fentress expressed his thanks to Mr. Kieckhefer and Mr. Denton for their efforts in coming up with a cleaner that works on the sprayed signs throughout the Village.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 234 routine calls and investigations, 27 motor vehicle accidents, 71 citations, 3 thefts, 1 multiple homicide for the month of August.

He announced the promotions of Robert Mohr, and Karolus.

At present there has been no solution to the crime at Corbetts. The IBI, the FBI, and the Cook County Sherrifs office and the Chicago Crime Lab have all been working of the crime. He expressed our thanks to the officers of all four counties and the state for their additional protection.

Chief Hummel is investigating the possibilities of using new equipment to put identification of resident's personal property to aid in identification in theft cases.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. Bateman announced that Jack Train is the new Chairman of the Plan Commission. Martin Cassell will continue as Secretary. The Plan Commission hopes to have the Subdivision Ordinance ready by September.

He presented some maps from the Take County Plan Commission which were of poor quality printing. It was suggested that the Plan Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals coordinate their efforts on the Village maps. Also, they should be dated.

President McLaughlin read a letter from Mr. Knouff of the Zoning Board of Appeals regarding their recommendations of changes in our Zoning Ordinance. The Zoning Board of Appeals was directed to hold a Public Hearing on the recommendations.

HEALTH: Mrs. Thompson noted that fees for building permits for barns were \$ 6.00 per each \$ 1,000 cost of construction.

Lake County Health Department sent a complete report on the drainage at the Gardiner residence, noting that repairs had been completed August 21st.

Mrs. Thompson requested that Mr. Craig be authorized to study the ordinances recommended by the BACOG study groups dealing with land use and environment. It was hoped they could be coordinated with the new Subdivision Ordinance. She asked Mr. Craig to send copies to her with his recommendations.

ATTORNEY: Mr. Craig made a routine request to have Mr. Paul Layton substitute for Mr. Grelle in his absence. Request granted. 8/28/72

NEW BUSINESS: Mr. Denton reported that he had discussed our insurance policies with Mr. Moeller. The "umbrella policy" would cost \$ 333.00. (It means a \$ 200.00 saving on the comprehensive) and gives the Village \$ 1,000,000.00 coverage. A motion was made and seconded approving the new policy. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no-one absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Craig read the Vehicle Tax Ordinance. A motion was made and seconded to approve. Discussion. Company owned cars are taxed from their "point of domicle". Tractors would be exempt. Mr. Helfrick felt that due to the recent tragedy, it would be negative identification. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no-one absent. Ordinance 72-10 was adopted.

At this time Mr. Bob Silhan of McHenry County Plan Commission spoke to the Board noting a Community Assistance Program available.

President McLaughlin noted that Mr. Fentress and the Police
Department had handed in their 5 year forecast. Mrs. Thompson's
ordinance suggestions were in the hands of Mr. Craig for review.
Mr. Bateman's was not ready. Mr. Denton's on administration was
handed sent to Mr. McLaughlin, but had not reached him before the meeting.

At this time Mr. Craig reviewed various grants and aids available to the community. Bridge funds - road must be a federally aided secondary route - we don't qualify. Parks - some funds for "outdoor recreation program" and acquisition of land for open space. 50% participation required of Village. Police protection funds - half salary of one officer from 1 to three years if traffic safety work includes enforcement of laws.

The surveysindicate the trend of future spending, results of which will be made to the public. Possibilities of a referendum 8/2/872

will be investigated. The village should not be run on the basis of spending more than is taken in as has been happening in the past five years. The surplus is no more. Steps need to be taken to accumulate a surplus. An alternative to a referendum to increase real estate taxes, is a utility tax, which is fairer. Mr. Mc-Laughlin recommended the utility tax be considered for adoption this evening.

Mr. Denton presented the information he had from the gas, power and phone companies. He noted that the average monies spent per resident, is now \$ 112.00 and our income amounts to \$ 78.00 per resident. He noted that it takes 120 days to put the tax into effect. The Village is paid 60 days after each quarter closes. Also noted that the tax can be reduced or removed as needed. Mr. Denton moved adoption of the utility tax ordinance. Mr. Grigsby seconded the motion. Discussion. Mr. Helfrick noted that the Cook County reassement should make a change in our imcome. Mr. Tucker stated that it would not be nearly enough. Mr. Notke asked that the Village make it for Police protection only in as much as that seems to be where the bulk of the money is spent. Mr. Tucker noted that costs in all areas were increasing, particurlarly roads and that it would be restrictive to limit funds for Police protection only. Mr. Brandt asked what the collection charges were. Answer, .016%. Mrs. Cooke stated her objections to accumulating the money for the purchase of property, a Village manager, a Village Hadl and other "frills". Requested that the rdinance specify use of the funds.

Mr. Craig read the Ordinance infull. Roll call. 5 ayes, 1 nay, no-one absent. Ordinance 72-11 adopted.

Mr. Newman of Surrey Lane then requested that the Board in-8/28/72

vestigate and take action on an unfinished house that has been sitting there over a year. Construction was stopped over a year ago, the high winds had blown some of the walls down. Dirt piles have sat. The owner has neither the ability nor the inclination to finish it. He distributed pictures for the Board to see.

Mr. Craig will look for a course of action.

There being no further business, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Motion carried.
