MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

A regular meeting of the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held on November 22, 1971 at 7:30 P.M. at Countryside School in the Village of Barrington Hills.

Meeting was called to order by President Thomas Z. Hayward. Roll call.

The minutes of October 25 were submitted to the Board for approval. Mr. Craig noted that on page 5, second paragraph we should strike "providing that the petition is submitted by the owner in fee simple." as our Ordinance does not require that. A contract buyer may petition the Zoning Board, providing the owner is in agreement. A motion was made and seconded approving the minutes as corrected. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: In the absence of both Mr. Welby and Mr. Tucker, President Hayward read the Treasurer's report as sent to all members of the Board. A motion was made and seconded approving the Treasurer's Report. Motion carried.

A motion was heard and seconded approving the bills for payment. Roll call. 5 ayes, no nays 1 absent. (General bills) 4 ayes, 1 nay, 1 absent. (BACOG bill) Motion carried.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress noted two openings by Northern Illinois Gas, which will be checked for proper closings.

Mr. Fentress recommended approval of extension of last years contracts with Sinnett, Freking, and Funk for snow removal, for the 1971-72 season. Motion was seconded. Roll call. 5 ayes, no nays, 1 absent. Motion carried. To date, Mr. Fentress has had no reply from the state regarding the erection of a light at Helm Road and Route 62. However, he is getting a quote so that the Village can proceed when they hear from the State.

Mr. Fentress reported that Liberty Asphalt is requesting more money for the MFT work done this past summer (\$ 7,593.40) due to additional expenses in excess of the original estimate. PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 99 routine calls and investigations, 16 accidents, 3 cases of burglary, armed robbery, and attempted robbery.

A motion was made and seconded approving the promotion of probationary patrolman Daniel Piper to patrolman class 1 @ \$ 630.00 monthly. Motion carried.

A letter of thanks from Mrs. Thomas of St. Marks Day School was read for the talk given the school by Officers Egland and Hickmon.

Mr. Grigsby, Mr. Fentress, and Chief Hummel investigated the curve on Chapel Road and agreed that signs should be installed, which has been done. Arrows will also be placed on the curve. He noted this is the first accident at the curve and that the driver was traveling at an excessive speed. The driver had no license and was not the owner of the auto. The owner said the victim had been drinking, but not to excess. Mr. Grigsby thanked Mr. MacArthur for bringing the matter up.

Regarding the 4 way stop at Spring Creek and Hager's Bend

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Road intersection, he quoted Chief Hummel's report on the matter at the April meeting of the Board of Trustees in 1970: Sec. 30 of the Illinois Manual regarding placement of stop signs was quoted, pointing out that in no way does that intersection qualify for a 4 way stop sign. He then outlined the circumstances of accidents at that crossing from 1964 to date indicating that they were not chargeable to lack of 4 way signs.

Mr. Grigsby then went on to say that he welcomed public interest but that it was not necessary to write "rabble rousing" letters to get cooperation. A telephone call to him to discuss problems is all that's necessary.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. Bateman distributed a preliminary draft proposal of the subdivision ordinance. The Trustees are to review it and come to the next meeting with changes and recommendations. After than it will be necessary to set up public hearings.

HEALTH: Mrs. Thompson stated that Mr. Janura is still checking his files regarding the establishment of the Forest Preserve District.

For those requiring Zoning information, it was noted that the Village Clerk has copies of the latest Zoning maps. It is not necessary to go to the individual counties.

A question arose as to the annexation of unincorporated areas surrounded entirely by the Village. Mr. Craig will check to see if it can be done by resolution, eliminating the need for petitioning.

The proposed developments at Dundee and Barrington Roads were discussed. If it is proposed as an annexation to Barrington, we cannot oppose it. Mr. Bateman noted that the Countryside Association had opposed it as well as the proposed clinic.

BUILDING: No report.

ATTORNEY: Mr. Craig reported that our ordinances only require

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that hunters obtain written permission from owners to hunt their lands. He is going to update it to cover gunshot falling on neighboring property. It is quite possible that State statutes will cover it adequately.

President Hayward read a letter from the Zoning Board of Appeals recommending denial of the petition to rezone the Hamalian property on Helm Road to Industrial. A motion was made and seconded confirming the action of the Zoning Board of Appeals. Motion carried.

Two new subcommittees for Barrington Intergovernmental Relations group are requesting appointment of a representative from our Village. Board will hear recommendations at the next meeting.

President Hayward reported that he had attended the CATS meeting Sponsarres by CNAC and he felt the proposals for subsidizing city transportation would end up subsidizing the suburbs as well under the city proposal.

NEW BUSINESS: Mr. MacArthur replied to Mr. Grigsby that the Village had plenty of latiutde to put up a 4 way stop sign - that there had been 12 deaths at that corner, one being the former owner of his farm and 5 kids on one Memorial Day - he is making a request, and if the Village choose to deny it, his lawyers would communicate with the Village and he would meet them in court.

There being no further business, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn. Motion carried.
