MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

A regular meeting of the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills, Illinois was held on November 27, 1972 at Countryside School in the Village of Barrington Hills at 7;30 P.M.

Meeting was called to order by Acting President John J. Mc-Laughlin. Roll call.

Minutes of the meeting of October 23 were submitted for approval. Mr. Tucker noted he was not present. A motion was made and seconded approving the minutes as corrected. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: In the absence of Mr. Welby, Mr. Tucker presented the Treasurer's report to the Board for approval. He noted we are over budget in the areas of building inspector and printing and publication. The proposed moratorium on state taxes would present a problem for our Village. Income has remained at about the same level. If inflationary trends continue we will be forced to cut back on spending.

A motion was heard and seconded approving the bills for payment. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no-one absent. Motion carried.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress reported that the MFT work on Hart Road has not been completed. Four foot shoulders are needed as well as guard rails on the south bend. Renshaw, Wight, and Freking are all keeping after Lakeland to complete the job.

Northern Illinois Gas has made several openings, which will be checked for proper closings.

The new rails have been installed on the Cuba Road bridge. New signs are needed at both ends of the bridge. An Ordinance 72-14 was presented authorizing the erection of the signs. A motion was made and seconded approving the Ordinance. At first, Mr. Grigsby requested it be talbled until December, but upon noting of the placement of the signs, he withdrew his objections. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no-one absent. Ordinance was adopted.

Mr Fentress noted that after the air crash, the clean-up job was done by public minded citizens at no cost to the Village.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 165 routine calls and investigations, 33 accidents, 46 citations, lattempted burglary, 3 cases of burglary, 4 missing persons, and 1 recovered stolen vehicle.

Mr. Grigsby announced the appointment of Mr. James Herd from McHenry as a Patrolman at a starting salary of \$800.00 monthly.

Mr. Grigsby has authorized the purchase of two new squad cars under the umbrella of Arlington Heights. Doing it this way will put us back \$ 466.00 as opposed to the estimate given by Roselle Ford which was a great deal higher.

The Countryside Association authorized and paid for a security study of the Village. Oak Security Division prepared a comprehensive study, 1000 reports, which were then mailed to the head of each household in the Village.

A letter of thanks was read from James Conlisk, Superintendant of Police of Chicago regarding the letter of Police Deptartment sent after the help received in the Corbett case.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. Bateman stated that the Subdivision Ordinance is not ready but would be for the December meeting.

A letter of recommendations was read regarding changes in our 11/27/72

Zoning Ordinance. A committee consisting of Mrs. Thompson, Mr. Bateman, Mr. Knouff and Mr. MacArthur, was directed to go over the the clarification of the definition of "agriculture" and have it completed before the December 18th meeting.

HEALTH: Mrs. Thompson noted her objection to the "exclusion-ary phrase" regarding agriculture in the Zoning Board's recommendation.

Mrs. Thompson requested that this Board adopt a resolution protesting the exhorbitant taxes imposed on the farmland in our Village. She felt it is discriminatory and could force farmers to sell their land to developers.

A question was raised concerning the "visual pollution" that Commonwealth Edison is creating along our northern boundaries with the new towers. Mrs. Thompson presented a resolution protesting the erection of the towers and the visual pollution that they cause to those living on the northern areas of the Village and that the cables be placed underground if at all possible. Seconded. Resolution carried unanimously.

The logo for the Village has been completed. Mrs. Thompson will check out printing costs for Village stationary and envelopes.

Mrs. Thompson then recommended three new ordinances be adopted by the Village.

- 1. All multiple dwellings be completely soundproofed. That our Building code be so amended. (A decible rating established)
- 2. All commercial buildings provide rooftop or underground parking.
- 3. Burnable solid wastes of carbon shall be oxidized to water dioxide by the producers of the waste.

BUILDING: President McLaughlin read a summary of building permits issued for the months of October and November.

ATTORNEY: Mr. Craig stated that legal proceedings under the state demolition statutes has been instituted against the Surrey Lane 11/27/72

property owned by Terrance Johnson. To date nothing has been heard from the owners.

A suit has been filed against the owners of the land on Rt. 59 leased by the Western Development Corporation regarding the violation of the Zoning Ordinance by encouraging the dumping on this piece of land. The Village is asking a substancial fine. It was suggested that Mr. Renshaw get a quote on clean-up costs with the thought in mind that the Village get it cleaned up and get reimbursed for the costs of doing so.

President McLaughlin real a letter from a Mr. Krall concerning the tax on the utilities.

PRESIDENT: Mr. McLaughlin outlined the BACOG plan of a traveling manager for our Village. "In principle, I favor it, but the details need to be worked out." In the discussion that followed, several Villagers commented. Mrs. MacArthur, "A part time man will solve only part of the problems. You get what you pay for...."

Mr. Warzak, "Idea does have merit...." Mr. MacArthur, "I'd like to see the body before agreeing.....does Barrington get an overwrite on him...." Matter will be thoroughly investigated for future discussion.

Mr. Warzak appeared on the behalf of the Barrington Lakes Homeowners Association regarding the problems they have with hunters and
fishermen along the public accessway (Route 59) to their lakes. He
requested a resolution for our Village Board to erect no parking
signs all along Route 59. Mr. Craig is to check out the legality of
such a resolution. It was requested that Mr. Warzak get a copy of
his request and send it on to Mr. Craig.

Mr. Jack Lageschulte appeared in regard to annexation of land off of Buckley Road. To date, the request had reached neither the Village attorney, nor the clerk.

Mr. Craig noted that a 10 day notice to the Fire Protection District and the Library District was necessary before annexation was possible. All should be accomplished before the December meeting.

There being no further business, a motion was heard and seconded for adjournment. Motion carried. Meeting was adjourned.
