# MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

April 8, 1968

A rescheduled meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held Monday, April 8, 1968 at Community Consolidated Countryside School in the Village of Barrington Hills at 7:30 P. M.

Meeting was called to order by President Thomas Z. Hayward. Roll call.

President Hayward suspended the regular order of business in order to hear Mr. William Caldwell, representing Lakehead Pipe Company and Mr. Snyder of Bechtel Corporation, General Contractors.

Mr. Caldwell presented a resolution requesting authority to lay pipe under three Village roads, coming down the Commonwealth Edison right of way.

Mr. Zimmerman stated that the Board would want to be assurred that the property owners have given their consent and secondly, that the Lakehead Pipe Company would have to put up a two year bond with a guarantee that the roads would be restored to their proper condition beofre the Board would consider approving the request.

The question of explosions and fire from ground circuits was raised to which Mr. Snyder replied that their specifications meet the standards of the United States Bureau of Testing. He also stated that there would be identification posts every mile above ground. He also pointed out that in as much as the pipeline would cover three miles in the Village, that the Village would recieve approximately \$ 1,500.00 per mile, per year in revenue.

The following legal questions were raised. Within our Zoning Ordinance there is no such permitted use. It would require a Public Hearing. Secondly, does Commonwealth Edison have a legal right to grant use of their right of way?

President Hayward stated to Mr. Caldwell and Mr. Snyder that Mr. Truninger would take it under advisement and refer his findings to the Board. He also requested that Mr. Caldwell have all the answers to the questions raised at this time.

At this time Mr. William Hurley and Mr. Howard Lampman, property owners and residents of the Village, presented a petition signed by 30 property owners stating five points where Commonwealth Edison has ignored the basic rights of property owners.

 Damage to property of owners adjoining the right of way.

2. Cutting of trees without owners consent.

3. No public utility can operate lines and pipes in Illinois if not under the statutes of Illinois.
4. t is not in accordance with our Zoning Ordinance.

5. Improper proceedure.

The petition was referred to counsel in conjunction with the Lakehead Pipe Company request.

Mr. Hurley stated that Commonwealth Edison procurred the additional easements under false pretenses, that they failed to

give full representation to property owners and that he and Mr. Lampman are not prepared to honor the easements under those conditions.

Regular order of business was resumed.

The minutes of February 26 meeting were presented for approval.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: In the absence of Mr. Smith, Mr. Tucker reported that our reciepts are in excess of the forecast. We are in excess in four items on the budget which will be adjusted at the April 22nd meeting.

Inquiry has been made of all four counties about the tax levy. There will be no incresses in two, one has lowered it, and no reply has yet come from Cook County. Therefore, that makes our 1966 levy our maximum.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the bills for payment. Roll call. 5 ayes, no nays, one absent. Motion carried.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress announced that public notice to bidders for the Motor Fuel Tax Fund work on the roads has been published. Sealed bids are to be in Mr. Wight's office by 2:00 P.M. April 22, 1968.

Mr. Fentress reported he had contacted a private individual from Elgin to come in and do the mowing of Village roads three times during the summer.

A scavenger has been contacted to do clean up on the Village roads. Many community minded people have been doing some clean up of the roads.

Mr. Grigsby is going to estimate the cost of posting antilitter signs. The legal committee will check to see if there are any statutory regulations regarding posting.

Mr. Fentress reported that the police have been watching and stopping overloaded trucks on the Village roads. He presented the following temporary resolution.

The present ordinance be amended to allow a maximum of 33,000 pounds per vehicle, distributed not to exceed 11,000 pounds per axle and that the vehicles be operated at a speed not to exceed 15 MPH. The trucks could use the roads for delivery or removal from building construction sites within the Village. Motion was seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Tucker will investigate the costs of running a census to find out how many people now reside in the Village since the last census in 1963. It was pointed out that it would mean an

\$ 7.00 per person over the 1963 population of 2,301.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 105 routine calls and 16 accidents. He complimented Chief Hummel on the traffic survey he ran for the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing. He also reported traffic fines are up for the months of January and February 1968.

Chief Hummel noted that the speed limit on Route 62 has been raised to 55 MPH.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. McLaughlin presented the new Zone Map of the Village prepared by Wight Engineering.

A legal description of Mr. Donahue's property was given to Mr. Truninger in order that he could draw up a petition for annexation.

Mr. McLaughlin presented an ordinance annexing the Sally Row property. It was moved and seconded that the ordinance be approved as submitted. Roll call. 5 ayes, no nays, 1 absent. Motion carried.

Plans for division of the E.K. Hardy estate into Ridge Croft Lane Subdivision were submitted to the Board. They were referred to Zoning and Planning.

Mr.McLaughlin announced that there will be a public hearing in the Carpentersville Village Hall on April 10, 1968 to hear a petition for a conditional annexation of approximately 100 acres along Route 25 to the Village of Carpentersville for the purpose of opening up a gravel pit.

HEALTH: No report.

LAW: Mr. Zimmerman was asked to have the law committee draft an ordinance relating to installation of wires, cables,

pipeline in, on, over, or under any public place in the Village of Barrington Hills. It will compel all future installations to be made underground with hopes that within a reasonable period of time all existing cables will be underground in any recorded subdivision. Motion was seconded. Discussion.

Mr. McLaughlin stated that it was not applicable to pieces of land not as recorded subdivisions. He amended it to say everything in metes and bounds sales, including individual sales be made to put all cables underground. It was moved and seconded to amend the resolution to meet Mr. McLaughlin's objection. The resolution was then referred to the legal committee for further drafting.

ATTORNEY: Mr. Truninger reported that the Kuranz case is still pending.

In regard to the Magnum airstrip, we have made a request for a public hearing and have been assured that we will get one.

PRESIDENT: President Hayward read a letter requesting a person to serve on the Municipal League Plan Commission. It was referred to Mr. McLuaghlin.

A Civil Defense booklet was sent out. The Chair noted the responsibility was to be assumed by the Police Department.

Northern Illinois Gas Company requested permission to lay piplines on Burning Oaks Trail and Saville Row. Request approved.

President Hayward is interviewing Russell Reese who has been FHA building inspector in Chicago about doing work for the Village.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
