VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

Minutes of October 30, 1978

The regular meeting of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held at 8:00 p.m. in the Village Hall on October 30, 1978. The meeting was called to order by President Hansen at 8:05 p.m. Roll call.

Mrs. Hansen asked for approval of the minutes of September 25, 1978. Corrections were made by Mr. Tucker and Mr. Klein. Mr. Hamill motioned, with Mr. Tucker seconding, for approval of the minutes as corrected. Minutes approved.

FINANCE - Norman Tucker

Mr. Tucker reviewed the Treasurer's Report and motioned for approval. Mr. MacArthur seconded. Motion approved.

Mr. Tucker then reviewed the list of bills submitted for approval in the amount of \$17,646.48 and added \$347.50, making a total of \$17,993.98. Mr. Tucker motioned for approval with Mr. Hamill seconding. Roll call.

Motion approved.

Mr. Tucker then informed the trustees of the letter from the Illinois Comptroller's office noting that we have complied with all requirements and our audit has been accepted by the state.

Mr. Tucker noted that we are still pursuing the sales tax matter and we hope to have some information from the state in due course.

PUBLIC SAFETY - Alexander MacArthur and Chief Schuld

Mr. MacArthur noted that the Director of the Traffic Grant Unit for the state visited our department and was most complimentary of our operations.

Chief Schuld reviewed the monthly activity report of the Public Safety Department.

Communications Grant - Bids have been extended to November 3, 1978.

Joint Purchasing - Chief Schuld noted that we should be on the list for future purchases which might save us some money. Mrs. Hansen read a resolution (I do not have a copy) and asked for board approval. Mr. MacArthur motioned for approval with Mr. Butler seconding. Resolution passed.

CETA - Mr. Craig noted that he has examined the statute and there appear to be no problems of a statutory nature since we would only be seeking one clerk. Mrs. Hansen requested the board's informal approval to pursue this matter further. Chief Schuld noted that the program seems to be highlyyrecommended.

Chief Schuld informed the trustees of our response to a fire outside of our jurisdiction in which we were the first to arrive on the scene. He noted that while the house was lost, Officers Jones and Kunz were responsible in a great measure towards saving a life.

PLANNING - Jonathan C. Hamill

Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance - Mr. Hamill moved adoption of this new ordinance which would require site development permits to be issued to monitor and control erosion and sedimentation during the development process. He noted that the proposed ordinance has been prepared by Mr. Lenzini and that it had been modified to include suggestions made by the Plan Commission and Mr. Craig. Mr. MacArthur seconded the motion. Roll call.

Ordinance 78-14 adopted.

Subdivision Moratorium - Mr. Hamill suggested that this matter be deferred to a special meeting in a week or so to permit trustees to review Mr. Marlin Smith's detailed letter on the subject which was delivered this afternoon. Mr. Hamill suggested a special meeting for Monday, November 6, 1978 at 8:00 p.m. A poll of the trustees revealed that everyone except Mr. Klein would be available. It was suggested that all trustees obtain a copy to study before the special meeting, and that Mr. Smith be invited to attend.

Spring Creek Hills - Final Plat - Mr. Hamill suggested that this matter be deferred until the November meeting in order to give the board members more time to review this controversial subdivision. He noted that such a delay is permissable under State Statutes and Village Ordinances. Mr. Ronald Berns, attorney for the developers, noted that they were present for the purpose of proceeding on this matter and had hoped the board would act on it.

Conroy Preannexation Agreement - Mr. Craig noted that a satisfactory preannexation agreement has been received by the village for the annexation of 19 acres (two lots proposed at five acres each and two at four and one-half acres each), contingent upon the granting of a lot size variation by the Zoning Board of Appeals. Mr. Craig noted that no signatures were necessary at this time and that the agreement should rest with the board until notification has been received from the Zoning Board of Appeals that a variation has been granted. Mr. Conroy was instructed to file a petition with the Zoning Board and, if approved, the board will conduct a public hearing at 8:30 p.m. on December 18, 1978 and take action at that time. Mr. MacArthur motioned for approval, with Mr. Hamill seconding. Motion passed.

White Oaks Subdivision - We have been informed that they would like to change the location of the road in an effort to preserve some trees. They have been advised that it will be necessary for them to submit a new plat.

Comprehensive Plan - Mr. Hamill requested board approval of an ordinance to officially place the plan in the Village Code by amending Chapters 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Title 6 of the Code. Mr. MacArthur seconded. Roll call.

Ordinance 78-13 adopted.

Mr. Hamill noted that our contract calls for 100 printed copies to be furnished by Teska and Associates. 100 additional copies will also be purchased by the Barrington Country-side Association for distribution to its own members. Mr. Hamill then requested board approval to authorize 100 more copies to be paid for by the Village; making a total of 300 copies available for interested persons. The cost of the extra 100 copies is estimated not to exceed \$250. The trustees agreed.

ZONING AND ENFORCEMENT - James A. Kempe

ZBA Report - (1) The Rykoff petition for a variation was granted; and (2) The Eddy petition for a special use (pond) permit was referred to the agenda of the November 6 special meeting for action. Mr. Kempe noted that all requirements of the Zoning Board have been met. Mr. Rik Anderson, Zoning Board member, noted that it is the function of the Zoning Board to review prints and other material, and not the Village Board. Mr. Kempe noted that all required material has been received.

Building Department - Mr. Kempe noted that for the period of 9/16/78 through 10/15/78, twelve permits were issued. They included 3 houses, 2 additions, 1 stable, 1 pool, 1 remodeling, 2 storage building, 1 garage, 1 porch and 1 deck.

Paganica complaint - Mr. Kempe will have a report for the next meeting.

ROADS AND BRIDGES - Louis J. Klein, Jr.

Ridge Road striping - Mr. Klein reported that the striping was not done this year; however, he asked for approval to sign and send in the agreement for approval of our plans as required under the Federal Highway Safety Act. He noted that the bid for two miles would cost \$550.and indicated that the village would wait until spring.

Snowplowing - Mr. Klein noted an increase in cost for McHenry County (Funk Contractors) which is more than it costs us in Lake County (Freking). Sinnett will be contacted for his prices for the Cook County portion of the village.

Mr. Klein informed the trustees that some realty companies have been posting signs illegally in the village. These signs have been removed.

Mr. Klein noted that the federal government will not allow the state to improve Route 68 unless they have a resolution prohibiting parking within the right-of-way. Mr. Klein then asked for passage of the following resolution: "Resolved by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills pursuant to Section 9-3-6 of Barrington Hills Village Code that parking be and it hereby is prohibited on the right of way of state highway 68 from Route 59 to the Barrington Hills village limits. Mr. Tucker seconded. Motion passed.

Commonwealth Edison fence - They have been instructed to go before the Zoning Board of Appeals for a variation permit.

Mr. MacArthur noted that another sign is needed at Chapel and Church roads. This is a bad intersection, according to Mr. MacArthur.

LEGISLATION, INSURANCE AND HEALTH - John L. Butler, Jr.

Tr. Butler noted that the trustee insurance we have now includes the President and the rustees with coverage up to one million dollars per incident, in the aggregate.

We have been informed that changes will be taking place soon in the coverage and the premiums on the employee medical insurance. Mr. Tucker will check with our agent to determine, if possible, the additional premiums involved in disability coverage, for the police department.

ATTORNEY - Sydney G. Craig

The request for commercial zoning on Route 25 (Healy, Blood, Booze) will be up for trial on November 13, 1978.

In both of the Osran cases, further investigation is in progress.

The Hart Road matter will be reported upon in November.

Mr. Craig then referred to an ordinance amending sections 8-1-2 and 8-1-3 of the Barrington Hills Village Code relating to the Chief of Police. After some discussion, Mr. Tucker motioned for adoption of this ordinance, with Mr. Hamill seconding. Roll call.

Ordinance 78-15 adopted.

ADMINISTRATION - Barbara P. Hansen

Mrs. Hansen thanked Messrs. Hamill and Tucker for their efforts in getting out the newsletter in her absence.

BACOG - BACOG has voted to intervene in the Poplar Creek Theatre suit and also to assist in a traffic study.

Poplar Creek Theater - Mrs. Hansen asked the trustees to ratify the filing of the notice of appeal on behalf of the Village of Barrington Hills. Mr. Tucker motioned for ratification and Mr. Hamill seconded. Motion approved.

Mr. Hamill reported that Mr. DiMucci is not trying to annex his property to the Village of Inverness.

Fox River Grove annexation - The President of Fox River Grove has not yet responded to the suggestion of an intergovernmental agreement.

Grid System - Mrs. Ruth Moor of the BADC (Barrington Area Development Council) informed the board that the Countryside Fire Protection District would like to be assured that everyone wants the system before proceeding further on it. It is anticipated that all areas requesting same will be gridded by June of 1979. The tentative price of \$16.00 per sign includes installation. Mrs. Hansen asked for permission to request that Lake County grid that portion of Barrington Hills which lies in that county. Mr. Kempe motioned that Mrs. Hansen be given permission to contact Lake County and the Countryside Fire Protection District and request that we be included in their uniform system. Mr. Hamill seconded. Motion approved.

In the meantime, Mr. MacArthur will work with Mrs. Moor in an effort to coordinate the McHenry County portion of the village in this system.

Special Public Safety Committee - Mrs. Hansen stressed the importance of implementing the recommendations of the study draft, complimented the committee on its performance thus far and asked for approval of an extension of the life of the committee to work on implementing the recommendations. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval with Mr. Butler seconding. Motion approved.

HUD Community Block Grants - Mrs. Hansen noted that we have always "opted out" of this program and asked for board approval to notify HUD that we will again "opt out".

Mr. Butler made the motion and Mr. Hamill seconded. Motion approved.

<u>Plan Commission</u> - Mrs. Hansen asked for approval of her appointment of Constance Bischof to the Plan Commission to fill out the term of H. James Douglass until April 1980. Mr. Hamill motioned for approval and Mr. Kempe seconded. Motion approved.

The meeting was adjourned by President Hansen at 11:29 p.m.



At a hearing of the Zoning Board of Appeals held at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, October 16, 1978, at the Village Hall, Barrington Hills, Illinois, at which meeting a quorum was present (Chairman Mr. Julian R. Hansen was absent), the Zoning Board of Appeals heard the petition of J. M. Eddy and Judith C. Eddy for a Special Use to permit the construction of a pond on the property described in the attached Exhibit A.

The matter had been properly published and after hearing testimony from the petitioners and engineers, Novak, Dempsey & Associates, Inc. Palatine, Illinois. Apparently the proposed pond will be constructed by digging out approximately 5 feet below the surface of a low area and damming up the natural waterway but with a spillway on top and a pipe to control the level of the pond from the pond area downstream on the property of the petitioners returning to the natural overflow waterway. The pipe at the present time is installed and is an eyesore but Mr. Eddy and his engineer said these would be unobtrusive on the construction of the pond. According to the testimony, no larger or smaller amount of water would pass through the natural waterway (which is dry most of the time), than the current conditions provide except that in times of storm, water will be retained for a period of time and there will be some loss due to evaporation of the surface of the pond. The members of the Zoning Board of Appeals noted that the amount of construction and the water retained would probably be no greater than required by a swimming pool approximately the size of that at the Country Club. The members of the board were concerned that no plans and specifications were present, that there was no landscape plan, and there was no written provision for the avoidance of erosion and sedimentation during construction. Mr. Eddy and his engineer described these matters orally and agreed to furnish these matters in writing to the village in adequate time for consideration by the time of the next meeting of the Village Trustees which is to be held on October 30, 1978. The Board noted that it normally requires such plans, specifications and engineering prior to the recommendation of the special use permit for a pond or lake but in view of the small scale of the pond that it would recommend the approval of this special use, provided the appropriate plans, specifications, etc. were delivered to the village in time for adequate consideration by the Village Trustees prior to the next meeting.

In granting this Special Use, by a vote of 5 ayes and 1 may, the recommendations are as follows:

- 1. That the establishment, maintenance or operation of the Special Use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, confort or general welfare;
- 2. That the Special Use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood;

- 3. That the establishment of the Special Use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property for uses permitted in the district;
- 4. That adequate utilities, access road, drainage, and/or other necessary facilities have been or are being provided;
- 5. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide ingress and egress so designed as to minimize traffic congestion in the public streets and roads; and
- 6. That the Special Use shall in all other respects conform to the applicable regulations of the district in which it is located except as such regulations may in each instance be modified by the Board of Trustees pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Provided that the petitioner shall furnish to the Village for timely consideration by the Board of Trustees appropriate plans and specifications for such pond including vertical cross sections of the pond and the earthen dam at its lower end, the overflow pipe, and of plat plan drawings showing the location and elevation of the pond, the earthen dam and the natural water course, suitable plans for landscaping the completed project, and plans for the control of erosion and sedimentation during construction.
