MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills was held December 28, 1970 at Countryside School in the Village of Barrington Hills at 7:30 P.M.

President Thomas Z. Hayward called the meeting to order. Roll call.

The minutes of November 23 were submitted to the Board for approval. It was noted that the Park Board had made a verbal commitment to purchase the nine acres of land owned by the Village

to clarify mention in the November minutes. A motion was made and seconded to approve the mintues. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Mr. Welby said that the Treasury bills came due December 17th and those plus cash in the MFT fund had been used to make payment (less 5%) to Liberty Asphalt for the 1970 MFT work. He noted that the collection of property taxes has been running less than it should be at this time. He will do a county by county check. The disbursements are running pretty much along budget lines. Motion was made and seconded approving the Treasurer's Report. Motion carried. FINANCE: Mr Tucker submitted the following bills for approval;

A motion was heard and seconded approving the bills for payment. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no one absent. Motion carried.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: Mr. Fentress reported nine openings for gas lines. He will keep them under observation to see that they are properly closed. Mr. Freking repaired the cul-

vert on Oak Knoll at no expense to the Village. He has contracted for the snow plowing of Village roads in Cook, Lake, and McHenry counties.

Mr. Bateman was directed to check out the legal boundary of Wichman Road. He is to advise the Board if the northern side of the road is within our jurisdiction or not before the Village can close it.

PUBLIC SAFETY: Mr. Grigsby reported 116 routine calls and investigations, 30 accidents, 2 burglaries, 1 theft and the recovery of a stolen car. He made a motion that effective January 1st Sargent Blau be promoted to Senior Sargent with a pay increase to \$ 905.72 per month, and Patrolman Meyer be promoted to Senior Patrolman with a pay increase to \$ 808.50 monthly. Motion was seconded. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no one absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Grigsby explained the ISPERN Radio Contract to the Board and requested approval of it. In the discussion that followed questions were raised concerning the maintenance of the radios after the two year warranty expired as well as the question of who stands behind the warranty. Mr. Grigsby will have the facts by the January meeting.

The Lake County Radio Contract has increased from \$ 16.67 to \$ 25.00 per month for three cars, which represents a \$50% increase in costs. In discussing the contract it was noted that it is necessary to the operation of our Police Department. A motion was made and seconded approving the contract in the amount of \$ 1,285.00. Roll call. 6ayes, no nays, no one absent. Motion carried.

Mr. Grigsby then announced that the contract for the leasing of the automobiles for the Police Department has increased from \$ 250.00 per month per auto to \$ 275.00. Chief Hummel outlined the costs of leasing as opposed to purchasing cars. He noted that we get a new vehicle every six months and that including maintenance costs owning the cars would cost \$ 5,700 yearly as opposed to \$ 3,300 on the lease arrangement. Mr. Tucker noted that we should be more agressive in turning in our insurance claims and risk the increased rate instead of paying for the repairs ourselves. A motion was heard and seconded approving the lease of the autos at \$ 275.00 per month per auto. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no one absent. Motion carried.

President Hayward instructed Chief Hummel to take no action concerning the abandoned autos in Forest Preserve areas, indicating he will talk to Mr. Janura himself.

ZONING AND PLANNING: Mr. Bateman reported that he will be checking out legal descriptions on various "islands" that are not yet in our Village.se good indestry replace to some solution.

At this time President Hayward introduced Mr. Sydney Craig, the newly appointed Attorney for the Village, who outlined the the report of the Illinois Land Resources Committee (House bill #179 - 1969) on proposed new legislation. The draft report was not widely circulated. They will be meeting one more time to finalize the report on January 15th with a February 1st deadline. In this draft form it creates a state power over local zoning; a state board which could authorize standards which local Boards have to meet; state power over public housing in suburban areas; control over zoning within a one mile radius of the intersections

tollways and freeways. Many municipalities have expressed great concern, particularly opposing the state's "power features". A motion was made and seconded approving the adoption of the resolution prepared by Mr. Craig. In the discussion that followed, Mr. Grigsby requested and explanation of the "open space" requirements. Mr. Craig said that in the draft it refers to the density of land use. Mr. Bateman stated that if passed, it would supercede our zoning and result in the destruction of Village and County planning. It would encourage the spread of low cost housing. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no one absent. Resolution, copy of which is attached, carried.

HEALTH: Mrs. Thompson reported that the Nacy's have been very cooperative in cutting off the spring on County Line Road. There were two dog bites, the same dog bit the mailman and then the Policeman investigating the first bite.

Mrs. Thompson reported that the Illinois Pollution Board is having a hear ing March 15th and will be discussing the requirements on effluents.

PRESIDENT: Mr. Hayward noted a letter to Chief Hummel from a Cook County judge making damages caused by gravel trucks to autos a "must appear" offense requiring the driver post a \$100.00 bond.

At the BACOG meeting Mr. Voss stated that Mr. Zimmerman had not been called in to testify and therefore our legal bills could not be charged off as had Mr. Braithwaite's. At this point Mr. Grigsby expressed his opposition to the payment of the \$ 3,242.00. Payment has been approved, however, the check is being held until the matter of legal fees is resolved.

President Hayward noted that the Illinois Commerce Commission hearing on Hart Road is being continued until January 11th. It is hoped that they will take action on Mr. Braithwaite's resolution to close the crossing and reroute Hart Road along the High School property line. Mr. Hayward read a letter from Mr. C. R. Anderson, President of North Barrington, addressed to Mr. Zigjewski concerning the proposed resolution to close the road. He acted independently and stated that his own solution was better. It was felt this action was not in accord with the goals of the BACOG principles.

President Hayward called for a motion to approve the expenses of Mr. Craig at \$40.00 per hour, with a monthly retainer of \$ 200.00 applied to that billing up to five hours. Motion was made and seconded. Roll call. 6 ayes, no nays, no one absent. Motion carried.

It was noted that Mr. Truninger was now at a Long Grove rest home and visitors were permitted.

There being no further business, a motion was made and seconded adjourning the meeting. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON HILLS IN OPPO-SITION TO PROPOSED ILLINOIS LAND RESOURCES ZONING CODE

WHEREAS, the Village of Barrington Hills, Cook, Lake, Kane and Mc Henry Counties, Illinois, has adopted a municipal zoning ordinance and an official plan; and

WHEREAS, by reason of its geographical size and location, its natural features (including extensive forest preserve lands), its existing land uses and population characteristics, it desires to and can most effectively itself provide for and regulate land uses within its territorial limits; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Barrington Hills, together with certain other neighboring villages, is now engaged in an extensive and significant planning study, with competent outside professional assistance; and

WHEREAS, said Village is advised of the terms of a preliminary draft Illinois Land Resources Zoning Code, dated November 5, 1970, under consideration by the Illinois Zoning Laws Study Commission, which would provide for a State Land Use Commission having extensive zoning powers within local areas throughout the State of Illinois, including the Village of Barrington Hills, and including standards and regulations relating to such matters of local concern as land use near limited access highway intersections, agricultural lands, flood control, open space, watersheds, unique natural features, and highdensity housing;

WHEREAS, the declared objectives of the proposed legislation are diametrically opposed to the long-standing land use policies of our community, as established in its plan and zoning ordinance, including its open space requirements, and also opposed to the concept of home rule as adopted in the Illinois Constitution of 1970; and

WHEREAS, any of the objectives of the proposed legislation which can be physically accomplished within the territorial limits of the Village and which after consideration are found to be appropriate, should be implemented by the Village without State interference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington Hills that said Village expresses its strong opposition to the provisions of the proposed Illinois Land Resources Zoning Code for creation of a State Land Use Commission and for Stateimposed regulation of land use and zoning within the territorial limits of this municipality;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village of Barrington Hills urges the Commission and each of its members, in considering a final report, to reject the Illinois Land Resources Zoning Code in the form proposed in the Preliminary Draft or in any amended form which includes a State zoning board and State control over zoning within municipalities as proposed, especially in Chapter 6 of the draft;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village Clerk shall transmit copies of this resolution forthwith to the Chairman and the members of the Illinois Zoning Laws Study Commission.
